HC asks for report on Feb 6 blast

The High Court yesterday directed the chief inspector of Directorate of Explosives to submit a report by February 6 on the explosion at a ship-breaking yard in Sitakunda that killed four people on January 18.

It also ordered the director general of Department of Environment to submit a report within the same deadline on whether the ship that exploded had obtained any environmental clearance certificate from his office.

Earlier on January 19, the HC bench of Justice AHM Shamsuddin Chowdhury Manik and Justice Sheikh Md Zakir Hossain issued a suo moto rule asking Master Abul Kashem, owner of the ship, to explain why he should not be penalised for contempt of court for dismantling a ship defying HC restrictions.

The court issued the rule following a report published in The Daily Star on the same

The bench yesterday kept Abul Kashem, owner of Mak International Corporation, standing in the courtroom dock for around five hours on charge of contempt of court. In addition to that, the court asked him to appear

before it on February 6. The bench also directed the officer-in-charge of

Sitakunda Police Station to notify the court on the same day whether any case had been filed in connection with the ship explosion in Abul and if so, the development of the case so far. Sheikh Fazle Noor Taposh

appeared in the court for Kashem, while Syeda Rizwana Hasan and Iqbal Kabir Lytton, both leaders of Bangladesh Environmental Lawyers Association, argued against ship breaking.

Rebel candidates from AL won 22 and those from BNP

Fresh from a moraleboosting performance in the local body polls, the main opposition has dealt a blow to the ruling party by wining Habiganj-1, traditionally an ALstronghold.

AL leader Dewan Farid Gazi had been elected from this constituency in 1973, 1996, 2001 and 2008. Jatiya Party candidate won the seat in 1991 election.

In the last parliamentary election, Gazi defeated his rival BNP candidate Sheikh Sujat by 72,592 votes. As a grand alliance candidate, he polled 1,52,080 votes against Sujat's 79,488. Yesterday it was a different

election day for Sujat. He got 81,330 votes, while AL candidate bagged 80,045. Abdul Munim Chowdhury of Jatiya Party, a component of AL-led grand alliance, bagged 22,220 votes helping Sujat prevail on Mushfig. On the other hand,

Brahmanbaria-3 constituency had been a BNP bastion till the last parliamentary election. The party won the constituency in 1979, 1991, 1996 and 2001. It did not contest the polls in 1986 and In 2008, Lutful Hai of AL

won the seat by defeating BNP-led four party alliance candidate. In yesterday's byelection, Muktadir of AL got 1,25,141 votes and BNP candidate 84,631. POLLS HELD PEACEFULLY Earlier in the day, voting in

the by-elections and municipality polls went off peacefully except for a few stray incidents. The Election Commission

has expressed satisfaction at the conduct of the polls. But the main opposition BNP, which had repeatedly

called for army deployment in the by-elections, has demanded re-voting at five polling stations in Brahmanbaria-3. The party will come up with a formal reaction to the

by-polls through a press briefing at the Jatiya Press Club in the capital at 10:30am today.

Talking to reporters at the EC Secretariat vesterday afternoon, Election Commissioner Brig Gen (retired) M Sakhawat Hossain said, "The elections under the present government have been freer and fairer than those under the previous political governments."

Referring to the balloting yesterday, he observed it proves free and fair election is possible by deploying regular law enforcers.

Besides, he added, depending on the army for elections does not always go with the spirit of democracy.

The same afternoon, BNP alleged rigging and violence at five out of 126 polling centres in Brahmanbaria-3.

Briefing journalists at its headquarters in the capital, the party's standing committee member Nazrul Islam Khan claimed the ruling AL men and law enforcers had beaten up many of their activists and ousted agents from different polling stations in both Habiganj-1 and Brahmanbaria-3.

Yesterday's elections were considered a crucial test for the EC as well as the two major political parties that fought a close battle in the countrywide municipal polls a week ago.

Meanwhile, voting in 12 municipalities--Parbatipur in Dinajpur, Magura, Charfashion in Bhola, Madhabdi in Narsingdi, Jajira in Shariatpur, Madan in Netrakona, Madaripur sadar, Daganbhuiyan in Feni, and Cox's Bazar sadar, Chakoria, Moheshkhali and Teknaf in Cox's Bazar--went off without any untoward incidents, our local correspondents report.

Our staff correspondent Najmul Alam Nobin from Habiganj reported low voter turnout in the area.

Locals and the election officials said the thin presence of the voters might be because of their lack of interest in the by-election and many being busy in Boro

cultivation. Both AL and BNP candidates have accused each other of influencing the

elections.

Returning Officer Mohammad Emran, however, said the voting was cent percent peaceful, and there have been no incidents of rigging or violence. He said though rival can-

didates had raised allegations of voter intimidation, no evidence of that was found. Earlier, BNP's election agent Abdul Khalek told The

Daily Star that voting was going on peacefully. Voters too said they faced

no obstructions while coming to the poling centres. AL candidate Mushfiq

International in a press release yesterday said Rab must stop extrajudicial kill-

The press release also called on the British government to raise concerns before Sheikh Hasina about reports of torture, extrajudicial executions, and excessive use of force by Rab.

More than 600 people are thought to have been killed by Rab personnel since 2004 when the battalion was created, it said, adding WikiLeaks sources have recently alleged that the UK police have been training Rab.

Abbas Faiz, Amnesty International's Bangladesh researcher, said, "Suggestions that these deaths in custody are just unrelated random incidents, as opposed to targeted executions, are simply not credible. The chance of this same fate befalling so many apprehended individuals defies belief and contradicts eye-witness testimony. These deaths amount to

extrajudicial executions." Hasina, however, said whenever allegations of extrajudicial killings were raised the government investigated those and took action. "We

believe in human rights." Asked if Islam will remain in the constitution as state religion, she said secularism does not mean absence of religion.

Hasina said a parliamentary committee is working to amend the constitution in

light of a High Court verdict. On confrontational politics, the premier said her government has ensured all facilities to opposition leader Khaleda Zia and her party since assuming office in 2009.

Unfortunately, Hasina said, BNP is not joining parliament. "I hope the opposition will return to the House."

Replying to a query on government's relation with Pakistan, she said, "At present, we are enjoying good relations with Pakistan."

Hasina also said India contributed significantly during Bangladesh's LiberationWar in 1971.

"True that we have some problems with India such as sharing waters of the common rivers but we're working together to find solutions," she said.

In response to a writ Justice Imman Ali and Justice Sheikh Hassan Arif also asked the government to take appropriate actions against the companies for the production of low quality medicine.

The HC bench passed the order after government officials submitted a labora-

tory test report of 48 drugs. On November 3 last year, the bench had ordered the government to collect and test samples of all the medicines available in 20 specific areas under 10 police stations and submit a report within five weeks.

In the report the government said the authorities collected samples of 174 medicines from the mentioned areas but could only manage to test 48 items due to shortage of lab equip-

Full report of the test would be submitted in "near

future", it said. The court yesterday also directed the inspector general of police and the director general (DG) of Rapid Action Battalion to extend necessary assistance to the health secretary and the DG of the Directorate of Drug Administration (DDA) in complying with its direc-

The government was given four weeks to submit the full report.

Human Rights and Peace for Bangladesh, a nongovernment organisation, filed a public interest litigation on November 2 last year following newspaper reports on drug adulteration and the victims of it.

Manzill Murshid appeared for the petitioner, while Deputy Attorney General Motahar Hossain Saju, and Awasafur Rahman Bulu argued for the government.

Microcredit's mega feat

political and non-political critics' claims that the initiative, championed by Nobel Laureate Muhammad Yunus, has failed to deliver and pull people out of poverty in a country where about 40 percent of 16 crore

people live on less than a dollar each day. The report of the Microcredit Summit Campaign closely reflects the findings of official country-level research in Bangladesh with the national Household Income and Expenditure Survey (HIES) that estimated 1.062 crore Bangladeshis languishing under the poverty line between 1990 and 2005.

Zohir said their estimate seems quite in line with the national level findings.

He said the study however made no attempt to establish causality between microcredit and poverty alleviation. Instead, it simply estimated the change in the status of microcredit-client households during the time -- before and after any family member received the first loan.

"While the survey for Bangladesh was not designed to assign causality, it is very significant that the number of successful microfinance clients closely links to the national data on poverty reduction," said Sam Daley-Harris, director of Microcredit Summit Campaign, in a statement of the organisa-

'The majority of poverty cases in Bangladesh is in rural areas and so are the majority of micro-finance clients," he said.

The survey report came at a time when the microcredit sector is under pressure in Bangladesh, its origin, and the rest of the world. In Bangladesh, politicians, particularly of

the ruling party, and many economists and experts censured micro-finance practices, with the prime minister accusing microlenders of "sucking blood of the poor". In India, micro-lenders are now strug-

gling to survive after a crackdown in the state of Andhra Pradesh, where the authorities accused the lenders of seeking hyper-profit from the poor through high interest rates and coercive debt collection tactics.

There are quite a few people who believe that micro-finance has lost its way," said Alex Counts, president of Grameen Foundation,

adding, "This survey on Bangladesh reminds

us that even in the most difficult circumstances, major progress can be made."

He said Bangladesh is not the "bottomless basket" as it was termed 35 years ago by the then US secretary of state Henry Kissinger. It is instead a teacher to the rest of the world with its civil society leading the way, he added.

The survey was conducted at 72 villages

under 36 districts in four divisions between

February and August 2009. It included a large number of clients of Brac and Grameen Of the households surveyed, 94 percent were in non-metropolitan areas and six

percent in metropolitan slums. The study said in some years a large percentage of clients came out of poverty, but in years coinciding with the floods in 1998 and food and fuel crisis in 2008 many households, including those which were not as poor when they joined microcredit, slid

Sajjad Zohir said timing is also important "People taking loans in the early and mid 90s have moved up the ladder than those who received loans after the floods. We have even found negative growth after the flood."

below the \$1.25 earning threshold.

The economist said people should consider the contribution of microfinancers in education, health and insurance sectors rather than seeing them as lender agencies.

He, however, said there are room for improvement. "The microcredit organisations cannot continue the way they are operating, or else there will be a decline in its progress. They must be allowed to mobilise funds on their own rather than depending on bank loans at high interest rates," Zohir told The Daily Star yesterday.

Launched in 1997, the Microcredit Summit Campaign committed to creating the will to eliminate poverty. In 2007 surpassed its original goal of reaching 10 crore poorest families with credit for selfemployment and other financial and business services.

In Bangladesh, about 1,200 microlenders, including government institutions, banks and charities, have around Tk 15,000 crore in outstanding loans to some 3 crore borrowers.
