Season over for Kagawa

Japan international forward Shinji Kagawa will undergo surgery on the right foot injury he suffered at the Asian Cup and will miss the rest of the season, his Borussia Dortmund club said on Thursday.

The 21-year-old was substituted in the 87th minute of Japan's penalty shootout victory over South Korea in the Asian Cup semifinals on Tuesday in Qatar and a scan on his return to the German league leaders confirmed a broken metatarsel.

"Surgery is needed and Shinji cannot play again this season," said a Dortmund spokesman.

I will hope to use the experience of the previous World Cup to good effect," he said.

Daily Star Sport (DSS): How did it feel when you heard that you would play the 2007 World Cup?

Tamim Iqbal (TI): The team was to be announced at 2pm in the afternoon and I was waiting anxiously for the news at a friend's place.

I felt really big, as if I've done something in my life. It was a great feeling, absolutely fantastic.

DSS: What was your plan behind the 51 against India? Was it your idea to go for it?

TI: There wasn't any plan as such. I was actually wondering how I'd play a 140kmph ball! I had never faced that sort of face locally, sometimes from Mashrafe bhai but I never faced this kind of pace on a regular basis.

DSS: Any frustrating part of the World Cup...

TI: Before the World Cup, there was a tri-nation tournament but I failed in both matches there. I asked myself, 'Do I really deserve to be here?'

But Faruque bhai came up to me and told me not to worry and that I'd play all the matches. It was huge coming from a chief selector and it

gave me a lot of confidence. DSS: What was your best memory during

the tournament?

TI: During the 2007 World Cup, the best

A depleted Mohammedan had a dream start to the league winning their first three matches but they went off the rails by going down 2-0 to Rahmatganj MFS, then suffered an identical 2-0 reverse to Brothers Union before conceding the single-goal defeat to a rejuvenated Muktijoddha Sangsad, who are now on top of the table with 15 points from

six matches, two ahead of holders Abahani. Mohammedan are in fourth place with nine from six games.

Mohammedan coach Shafiqul Islam Manik blamed the bias of the referees for the defeats and pointed fingers are the poor squad Mohammedan had formed.

"After the harassment of referee Mizanur Rahman [by Mohammedan supporters], referees are taking revenge by blowing the whistle against us. Today we were not given a genuine penalty despite handing the ball by defender Saikat inside the box and there was also an off-side goal against us," claimed Manik adding that Mohammedan were part of a conspiracy, both in and outside the club. Mohammedan, who lost most of their last

season's players during the transfers this season, had the lion's share of possession but they could hardly break the stiff backline of Muktijoddha and they only mustered their first shot on the target in the 80th minute.

Muktijoddha Sangsad played with a packed midfield from the word go, keeping striker Kanchan up front on his own as they thwarted all Mohammedan attempts from the midfield.

However, the veteran striker Kanchan squandered a good chance on 10 minutes floating a Alamu Bukola header over the cross bar from close but the former national striker did not mistake to head a rebound home on 34th minutes when it came his way after a Zahed Chowdhury shot was parried by Muktis goalkeeper Titu.

MSC hit new depths Windies target semifinals

West Indies coach Ottis Gibson believes his unpredictable team can defy the odds and reach the World Cup semi-finals, something ICC Cricket World Cup they haven't achieved for 15 years. The West Indies tackle Sri Lanka in three

ODIs from Monday, a crucial opportunity for the Caribbean side to get used to the South Asia conditions ahead of the World Cup which takes place from February 19-April 2.

"I think we have a team that can win the World Cup. We'll go there with the expectation of doing very well and putting ourselves in a position that we can reach the semi-finals, which is a very realistic possibility," said Gibson.

"We would love to win and we will try to win. The aim is to reach the semi finals and put ourselves in a position to capitalise from there."

"The World Cup is one of the biggest stages in international sport and we want to make sure we feature during the tournament. We are not listed among the favourites and that could work in our favour."

The West Indies haven't reached the semifinals since 1996 when they lost to Australia by just five runs in an agonising loss.

Gibson was speaking before the squad left for Sri Lanka where the West Indies played to a 0-0 draw in the threematch Test series in December.

The ODI series was to be played in December but was

rescheduled due to bad weather. "It is a good opportunity to put some of the plans in place that we are going to take into the World Cup," said the coach.

"When we went for the Test series we did really well as a team and we made progress. We also had a chance to get used to the conditions. Now we are heading back to Sri Lanka for these three ODIs and we will be looking to put in place the plans that we will be taking into the World Cup.
