

### Park follows Lee into retirement

Manchester United midfielder Park Ji-Sung has retired from international duty with South Korea after winning his 100th cap, his national coach Cho Kwang-Rae announced on Friday.

Park, 29, reached the milestone in his team's penalty shoot-out defeat by Japan in the Asian Cup semifinals in Qatar this But he was left out of the squad for

Friday's 3-2 victory over Uzbekistan in the third-place play-off match. Cho praised Park, his captain, and former Tottenham Hotspur defender Lee Young-Pyo, who had already announced his own decision to bow out from international football.



## Clijsters breaks Sino hearts

Belgium's Kim australian 🤼 open Clijsters came back from a set down to beat Li Na 3-6, 6-3, 6-3 in the Australian Open final Saturday, dashing singles title.

After a shaky first set, three-time US Openwinner Clijsters fought her way back to overhaul Li in a thrilling final in front of 15,000 fans at Rod Laver Arena.

The 27-year-old Clijsters went into the tournament as the firm favourite but was made to battle all the way by China's Li, who was hoping to complete her own fairytale and become the first Asian player to win a Grand

Li had been on the front cover of many of China's major newspapers as the world's most populous nation looked to the 28-yearold from Wuhan to create a piece of tennis live.

But despite looking the likely winner in the first set, Li faded in the third and became increasingly agitated as the match slipped away, complaining about comments and flash photography from the crowd.

"Tell the Chinese [fans], don't teach me how to play tennis," she fumed to the chair umpire, after being broken in the second set.

Clijsters had opened in fine style as she won the first eight points of the match, but once Li settled down and found her range with her dominant groundstokes, and her forehand in particular, she steadily took control.

After convincingly winning the first set Li began to struggle on serve and Clijsters took her chance to drag her way back.

The Belgian broke Li four times in the second set and twice in the third to wrap up a tense final in 2hr 5min.

It was the 27-year-old Clijsters's fourth Chinese hopes of a first ever Grand Slam Grand Slam singles title and her first Australian Open, adding to her three US Open crowns.

Remarkably, three of those titles have come after she returned to the sport following her retirement to have her daughter Jada. Li, 28, has already made history by becom-

ing the first player from China to reach a major singles final, which made her an overnight superstar on a par with idolised basketball player Yao Ming and hurdler Liu Xiang. China's state-run media were awash with

pictures and praise for the star, promising huge audience numbers in the giant nation of 1.3 billion, where the match was screened Despite a chequered history with state

Association head Sun Jinfang hailed Li as a "pioneer" who had already secured her position as one of the country's all-time sporting greats. Li, whose tales of her husband's snoring and her shopping sprees have delighted fans

in Australia, also reached last year's Australian Open semifinal before being beaten by eventual winner Serena Williams. Li is projected to reach a career-high world

number seven in next week's rankings, while Clijsters will rise to second behind Denmark's Caroline Wozniaci.

Mashrafe Bin Mortaza was a tearaway fast bowler in the 2003 World Cup, slowly moulding himself into the senior bowler in the 2007 event. Mashrafe Mortaza DSS: You played two World Cups. How would you com-

MM: 2003 and 2007 were totally two different tournaments for us. Both were World Cups but our performance

was totally the opposite. I would say that the 2007 World Cup was better than the one in 2003. DSS: How would you explain the atmosphere of 2003 and 2007 World Cup?

MM: In the 2003 World Cup we had a very poor experi-

ence. We lost to Canada in the opening match and went on to lose every match in that tournament. I would say our practice was alright but not up to the mark. Lack of confidence was another issue for the poor atmo-

sphere we had that time.

## Bhullar overcomes Siddikur challenge

AMERICAN Bangladesh golf sensation Siddikur Rahman played a sublime final round in the American Express Bangladesh Open at the Kurmitola Golf Club yesterday, but still fell two strokes short of Indian Gaganjeet Bhullar, who took the trophy after holding on to his slim lead.

Siddikur's (71-68-71-66) six under par score elevated him from the sixth position that he occupied at the end of Round Three, to overall second with a cumulative score of twelve under par. The defending champion provided Bhullar with a stiff challenge on the final day as he made a charge with a brilliant bogey-free round studded with six birdies. He even came agonisingly close to a hole-in-one on the sixth where his shot hit the flag and landed four feet from the pin.

"I played very aggressive golf today but didn't putt well. I missed a number of birdie putts within 10 feet. Nonetheless, it was a good final round effort and gives me a lot of confidence going ahead into the Asian Tour season," said Siddikur.

It was however a different story for eventual winner Bhullar (68-71-64-71), who played a steady round of one under par to keep a

grasp on his lead, ending with a cumulative score of 14 under par. The foundation for the win was laid in the third round when he played a brilliant round of eight under par, giving him an overnight lead of three strokes. Yesterday, he made his first birdie of the day on the fifth courtesy of a good chipputt. He converted another chip-putt for birdie on the 14th. Gaganjeet dropped a bogey on the 15th but then held on to his two-stroke lead with pars on the last three holes, making the 22-year-old the first Indian to win the Bangladesh Open. It was also his 10th professional title and seventh on the Aircel PGTI "I was confident of coming through today.

However, I knew I had to play a steady round and let the others, especially Siddikur, do all the chasing. I stuck to my strategy of going for pars, particularly on the back nine, as the pins were quite tricky. I just aimed to make the fairways and greens and then follow that up with two-putts, said an elated Bhullar.

Siddikur was happy with his final round effort but was a bit disappointed with his putting. India's Shamim Khan finished third with an even par score in the final round.

#### FIFA windfall for BFF

Bangladesh Football federation will receive 3 lakh US dollars as profits for the football's regional governing body. FIFA will distribute the additional net profit for the 2007-2010 period between all of its member nations. Earlier, FIFA gave away 2.5 lakh dollars to each federation last year. The confederations will each receive 25 lakh. The decision was taken in the latest FIFA congress held in Samoa.

The total amount of net profit for the period was 340 crore dollars, a lion's share of which was generated from hosting the 2010 World Cup in South Africa.
