# Bracken quits

Australian limited-overs specialist Nathan Bracken announced his retirement from cricket in Sydney on Satur-

The New South Wales left-armer, a key member of Australia's World Cup-winning team in 2007 in the West Indies, played 116 one-day internationals and five Tests, plus 19 Twenty20 internationals.

excelled in the shorter forms of the game, Bracken played his last game for Australia against England at Nottingham in September 2009 and cited knee injuries for his decision to call it quits at the age of 33. Bracken said he had inves-

tigated ways to continue playing, but received medical advice that he should retire.

"I really have enjoyed my cricket both internationally and domestically, but unfortunately knee injuries have taken their toll," Bracken said.

"I have had a strong rehabilitation from my last operation and have also looked at altering my bowling action to reduce any further damage in my knee and which would have enabled me to continue playing, but it hasn't responded.

"My doctor has advised that I may require further surgery to stabilise my knee and to enable me to have good use of the knee in the future, but to continue playing first-class cricket is now not an option that I have." Bracken made his debut for Australia in a one-dayer

against the West Indies in 2001 and took 174 wickets at 24.36 in ODIs.

He was the Australian ODI player of the year in 2009.

# Pakistan draw level

A maiden century by Mohammad Hafeez and a blistering 65 by Shahid Afridi set up Pakistan for a 43-run win over New Zealand in their one-day cricket international Saturday.

The batting heroics, which rescued Pakistan from a disastrous start, were complemented by the fielding exploits of Umar Akmal who featured in three crucial New

Zealand dismissals. The result levelled the six-match series at 1-1, with one game washed out and three to play.

It was a sharp turnaround in fortunes from the first match, which New Zealand won by nine wickets with more than 32 overs to spare.

They showed the hallmarks of that domination in Christchurch when they won the toss, put Pakistan into bat on a green-tinged wicket, and had them two for eight by the fourth over.

But from there Pakistan worked their way up to take control, compiling 293-7 in their 50 overs, with Afridi starring in a 126-run charge over the last 10 overs.

New Zealand made a bold reply and were ahead of Pakistan in the run rate until the final slog, but they lost wickets at regular intervals and were hanging on grimly at the end to be 250-9.

They were unable to take advantage of the short boundaries at AMI Stadium which Afridi plundered at will in a telling innings that included five fours and five sixes and saw him reach his half-century in only 19 deliveries.

The stage for the late charge was set by Hafeez, who was partnered by Younis Khan in a 48-run stand for the third wicket, then featured in a 94-run partnership with Misbahul Haq before putting on 52 with Umar Akmal.

After Tim Southee, the form bowler for New Zealand this season, removed Ahmed Shehzad and Kamran Akmal early, Hafeez turned the tables on the New Zealand bowlers.

He belted two fours off Southee's third over, then a four and six off Hamish Bennett's opening over as he worked all corners of the boundary untroubled by the New Zealand bowlers who had difficulty maintaining their lines in blustery conditions.

Hafeez, who survived a dropped catch by Brendon McCullum when on 49, reached his century in the 42nd over, cutting New Zealand spin debutant Luke Woodcock to point for a single.

But he was undone on 115 two overs later when he sent a top edge to Ross Taylor at midwicket while trying to hit Kyle Mills out of the ground.

At the height of Pakistan's late onslaught

Afridi and Umar Akmal put on 69 in 4.2 overs before both were removed by Bennett who returned the figures of two for 54 while Southee took two for 57 and Mills two for 61. The New Zealand batsmen were unable

to find the boundaries with similar ease to the Pakistanis in part because of Umar Akmal's fielding. He caught opener Jamie How (24) with a

catch on the boundary while looking into the sinking sun, leapt in the air and landed just inside the rope to catch Scott Styris and stop a six, and ran out McCullum with a pin-point throw from backward point. How and Guptill (39) gave New Zealand a

sound start to their innings but while the New Zealand batsmen were able to get starts no one was capable of establishing a sound innings. Styris top scored with 46.

For Pakistan Umar Gul took two for 31, Wahab Riaz two for 43 and Sohail Tanvir two for 56.

The fourth match in the series will be played in Napier on Tuesday.

# missing is Cup glory

Over the last two decades, there is very little missing from Sachin Tendulkar's list of achievements as a batsman but the absence

of a World Cup in his trophy cabinet continues to rankle the Indian runmachine. The 37-year-old, with more than

32,000 runs and 97 centuries in international cricket, came closest to ending that quest when he was the highest scorer in the 2003 World Cup in South Africa, where Australia beat India in the final.

The February 19-April 2 World Cup in the sub-continent represents, in all

probability, Tendulkar's last chance to set the record straight and the batsman is all too aware of the event's importance.

"I still want to achieve something and everyone knows that," a smiling Tendulkar said at an award ceremony on Friday, adding that India's rise to number one in the world Test rankings has given him confidence to believe a Cup victory was possible.



"To get there was not easy, we had to work very hard," he added. "There were lots of challenges but we stood together, backing each other, trusting each other and achieved various things as a team.

"When we got there [in 2009] many people thought that it was maybe a matter of 30-40 days as the South Africa series (2010) was coming up and no one expected us to do well to be honest.

"After losing the first Test in Nagpur, we got to hear that soon we will lose the number one spot. But here I am standing today after almost a year and we are still number one. To get there is wonderful but to stay there for a year in this competitive era is just fantastic."

India are currently number two in the one-day rankings and Tendulkar singled out coach Gary Kirsten for special praise for the team's improved performance.

"Gary Kirsten has brought a remarkable change in our side," Tendulkar said about the former South Africa opener. "I found the atmosphere in the dressing room quite dif-

ferent and that has brought all the changes. I think all batsmen have performed well since 2007."

# Canada want visa issue solved

Canada have pleaded with the International Cricket Council (ICC) to help their three Pakistan-born players obtain visas to enter India for the World Cup which gets underway on February 19.

Vice-captain Rizwan Cheema, Khurram Chohan and Hamza Tariq are all still waiting for their India visas.

The delay has prompted Cricket Canada to demand that the schedule, which has the team playing four of their six group games in India, be altered so that matches are switched to co-hosts Bangladesh and Sri Lanka if the problem persists.

Canada president Ranjit Saini requested that all efforts be made to solve the impasse. "We seek your kind help and attention to this matter in assisting our players to obtain their visa in Dubai, Dhaka or

For the last three years, the man who has played his semifinal second has gone on to win the Australian title. Murray, Roger Federer and Jo-Wilfried Tsonga have all fallen victim to the Thursday curse.
