British finance minister George Osborne insisted Sunday he would resist pressure to drop his deficit reduction plan, saying to abandon it would unleash "financial turmoil" within minutes.

Osborne said he did not like having to raise taxes and slash spending, but said the measures were necessary to give Britain financial stability as he bids to rein in the massive budget deficit and pay off the country's debts.

Speaking from the World Economic Forum gathering of the global business and political elite taking place in Davos, Switzerland, the chancellor of the Exchequer made the comments to BBC television.

"If on Monday I went to parliament and got up in the dispatch box in the House of Commons and said I am abandoning the deficit reduction plan that Britain set out last year, what do you think the reaction would be?", he said.

"Within minutes Britain would be in financial turmoil. I am not prepared to let that happen.

"It requires tough, difficult decisions. No politician likes cutting spending and increasing people's taxes, but I was delivered a mess by the previous

#### China central bank says inflation still high

China's central bank governor warned Sunday that inflation is higher than expected and that banks' reserve ratios could be tightened further to soak up excess liquidity in the economy.

People's Bank of China Governor Zhou Xiaochuan said that although the rise of prices slowed slightly last month, it was stronger than anticipated, Dow Jones Newswires reported.

"Inflation is still higher than many people expected. It may be still going up a little, so we should keep vigilant on that," Zhou said on the sidelines of meetings in Kyoto, Japan.

Asked whether China needed to again raise banks' reserve requirements due to the excessive liquidity conditions, he answered: "Maybe we need to continue our efforts."

Ever fearful of inflation's historical potential to spark social unrest, China's leaders have been pulling on a variety of levers to rein in consumer prices

## 80pc of Irish want bailout

renegotiated: poll

An overwhelming majority of Irish voters want the terms of a 67.5 billion euro (\$92 billion) EU-IMF bailout renegotiated, according to an opinion poll out Sunday.

The terms of the deal have become an election issue with Fine Gael main opposition leader Enda Kenny travelling to Brussels on Friday to tell European Commission chief Jose Manuel Barroso that he would be seeking changes in the deal if, as expected, he becomes prime minister after the forthcoming election.

A MillwardBrown Lansdowne poll in the Sunday Independent newspaper found 82 percent want a renegotiation of the bailout forced on embattled Prime Minister Brian Cowen last November.

The broadsheet says the public "are clearly outraged" that the European Union funds are being lent to Ireland on a much higher interest rate than the bloc itself is borrowing it for, and are demanding that an incoming government set about amending the terms.

Some 11 percent of those polled said the next government shouldn't attempt to renegotiate the deal.

#### China seek maximum fine for Carrefour

China price regulators are seeking to fine French retail giant Carrefour 2.5 million yuan (\$380,000) -the maximum fine for overcharging customers, state media reported Sunday.

Municipal regulators fined three Carrefour stores in Shanghai and two in southwest China's Yunnan province 500,000 yuan each on Saturday, the official Xinhua news agency reported.

However, the final fine will be decided only after a hearing where regulators said Carrefour representatives will be able to respond to the charges, the report said. It gave no further details about the hearing.

A total of 11 Carrefour stores were accused of charging more than the price they displayed on products ranging from cotton underwear and tea

### DCCI demands stern action against stock manipulators

The Dhaka Chamber of Commerce & Industry (DCCI) yesterday demanded stern action against stock manipulators and insider traders for proper growth of the country's troubled stockmarket.

The demand came at a roundtable held on the current capital market situation in the country at the auditorium of the chamber in Dhaka. DCCI President Asif Ibrahim moderated the discussion, the chamber said in a statement.

To ensure economic development and proper growth of its capital market, the government should establish some short-term, mid-term and long-term rules and regulations to streamline the stock market operations, discussants said.

Reforms and professionalism amongst stakeholders, awareness creation of small investors by training and proper monitoring of the overall mechanism were also stressed.

Encouraging retail investors in portfolio investment, broad research and consultancy services and education and training of retail investors are crucial needs of the moment, the discussants observed.

Speakers also said the supply side of stocks should be strengthened, shares of state-owned enterprises should be floated and large companies should immediately enter into the market.

They emphasised capacity building of the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC), the stockmarket regulator and establishing a guideline-based research and information cell.

They urged the commercial banks not to invest in the capital market and recommended a flexible process of listing of companies in stock market.

They also called for an immediate reassessment of the actual asset base, turnover, debt/equity ratio of all the Z category listed companies.

All banks and other financial institutions in Bangladesh will have to adopt the guidelines on environmental risk management by June 30 this year.

The environment in Bangladesh is deteriorating significantly and the key areas of decline include land degradation, air pollution, water pollution and scarcity, biodiversity resources and impacts of natural disasters.

So, banks need to protect their financing from the risks arising from the deteriorating environment scenario and climate change, the circular said.

The BB circular also said the cen-tral bank will conduct training programmes, seminars and workshops for the capacity building of the financial institutions.
