**Youths keen on e-quizz contest**

Visitors flocked in thousands to BASIS SoftExpo 2011 on the fourth day yesterday.

The visitors, especially youths, are expressing keen interest on different aspects of the exhibition held at the fair-ground of Bangabandhu International Conference Centre in the city. The exhibitors said they are getting good response from visitors as well.

Kawser Jannat Momo, a marketing executive of Champs21, said visitors to Champs21 stall are showing interest on their e-learning offer and the competition, Brain Brats.

Champs21, in partnership with The Daily Star, is organising the nationwide online quizz competition, the first ever in Bangladesh for class III to VIII students of English medium schools across the country.

Momo said the initiative was taken to

divert children from spending most of their times using different social networking websites to learn and prepare themselves for the tougher competitions ahead in the future.

"Thirty-three schools from Dhaka, Chittagong, and Sylhet have registered so far by logging on to www.champs21.com," said the marketing executive.

The competition will be held in three phases and it will focus on science, math, and general knowledge as per curriculum of the English medium schools.

The second round will be offline. Ten students from each class of each school will be selected for the second round. The grand finale will take place on March 12.

An important event of the day was "BASIS Freelancer of the year 2011". From a total of 140 competitors, Basis awarded 10 freelancers for their contribution to upholding Bangladesh's image in the global IT outsourcing arena.

**BASIS honours IT movers and shakers**

The country's 12 top freelancers, including an SSC examinee, were awarded last night for their contributions to upholding Bangladesh's image in global information technology.

Bangladesh Association of Software Information Services announced the Freelancer of the Year 2011 awards at a ceremony on the sidelines of BASIS SoftExpo 2011 at Bangabandhu International Conference Centre.

The awards were split in three categories, with four winners in each. Pixel Net Technologies, Alpha Digital, Sentinel Solutions Ltd, and Alam Soft won awards in the group category, while Mohammad Al-Amin Chowdhury, Faisal Farukh, Enayet Hussain Rajib and Md Zakaria Chowdhury were awarded in the individual category.

Abdullah Al Zahid, an SSC examinee from a city school, won an award in the student category. Other awardees were Md Shabbir Hossain, Shaon Bhuiyan and Md Khairul Alam.

Bangladesh has about 30,000 freelancers, with some earning between \$1,000 and \$5,000 a month.

The organisers also handed the BASIS Digital Championship award to Bangladesh Bank.

In IT innovations, a four-member team led by F M Mahbubul Islam emerged as the champion for developing software that can translate Bangla text into Braille for the visually impaired. AppRain Content Management Framework became the first runner-up and Finder Ultimate the second runner-up.

Mustafa Jabbar, who pioneered computers and IT in the country, won the BASIS Lifetime Achievement Award.

The Code Warrior Challenge awards went to Team Dark House (student) and Team Galileo (professional). Team FreeFall and Team Matrix became the first runner-up in the student and professional categories respectively. Team Anonymous and The A Team became the second runner-up.

Yeafesh Osman, state minister for science and ICT, Md Nazrul Islam Khan, national project director of Access to Information Programme, and BASIS President Mahboob Zaman were present at the ceremony. The fair ends today.

**SAU to run 5 new courses**

BSS, Dhaka

South Asian University (SAU) based in Indian capital, New Delhi will introduce five new programmes from the next academic year 2010-11 beginning from July this year.

The programmes are MSc in biotechnology, MSc in computer science, MA in sociology, MA in international relations (IR), and LL.M.

SAU's Chief Executive Officer Prof GK Chadha told the news agency that the admission test under the next academic session is scheduled for May 21.

The admission examination will be held in capitals of eight Saarc countries simultaneously on the same day, he added.

"Currently 50 students are studying in two programmes -- MA in development economics and master of computer application (MCA)."

SAU will draw students from all eight Saarc nations in proportion to their population, but at least four percent from each country and not over 50 percent from host India, he said.
