

Steady start at 'Ekushey Boi Mela'

There is a notice board placed on the wall of Bardhaman House dedicated to providing updates about everyday new books. The board usually displays flaps of the day's books. Though on the second day a total of 29 new books were published, the board showed only seven flaps.

While enquiring about the discrepancy from the Bangla Academy authorities, it was learnt that it is not a must for the publishers to provide flaps of new books to the Academy. The publishers only provide information such as the name, price, publication house etc. about a book. "Though it is not a must, we can request the publishers to provide flaps so that we can provide

detailed information to booklovers," said Murshiduddi Ahmed, Deputy Director of Bangla Academy.

lished a book on the game titled "Cricket Ebong Biswacup Cricket" by Ashrafuzzaman. The information booth was also

not prepared till the evening of the second day of the fair. Consequently, many booklovers had to negotiate a veritable maze to find the stalls of their choice. In explanation, volunteers at the booth said that they had not received adequate information about the stalls yet, as the authorities had said that it would take an extra day to fully prepare the Enthusiastic crowds streamed

into the fair till the evening, as the mela remained open for half an hour more after the closing time of 8pm. Yesterday, as it was a weekly holiday the crowds were much large in numbers than they were on the preceding days.

PUTHI LITERATURE

Reviving a dying tradition

The significance of literature of puthi is undeniable in any study of Bengali language and literature that aims to understand the development of modern Bengali language. Literary critics have often referred to the importance of understanding how puthi literature has influenced the works of some of the most celebrated writers and figures. During the British colonial rule of the

subcontinent, the majority of Bengali who were



themselves reciting and listening to puthipath. As a result, a study of puthi literature allows an insight into the custom and language used in that society, suggested literary critic Ahmed Sofa. Notwithstanding its popularity among the illiterate, the tradition has been represented by leading Bengali poets and novelists like Kazi Nazrul Islam and Akhtaruzzaman Elias.

Mosharraf Hossain, the most successful 19th century Muslim literary figure, wrote "Bishad Shindhu" adapted from the puthi "Shahidey Karbala". Kazi Nazrul Islam, one of the most celebrated Bengali poets, much later made extensive use of Arabic and Persian words in his poems, which is a defining characteristic of the puthi literature. Sofa observed, "Nazrul had spent a considerable part of his childhood surrounded by the puthi literature. He respected the tradition."

Puthipath has not lost its appeal altogether in the rural agricultural communities. However, this seemingly quaint tradition is being revived by an informal group of friends who sit around and listen to puthipath at leisure times in Dhaka University Campus. No matter how outlandish it may seem, the rhymester puthipathak (reciter), Kabbo Kamrul has released an album of puthi written by him Retaining the stylistic elements and tune of

traditional puthi, Kamrul has written rhymed verses that tell the tale of our social crises, price hike, widespread discontents and inconsistencies the political and economic system. Unlike the traditional *puthi*, he has picked up the language we use everyday. "In the tale, Ihalmuri, I have impersonated a jhalmuriwala and tried to

satisfaction he finds in love," said Kamrul. Similarly, the tales called, "Kadam Alir Malam" and "Pan Boyatir Biroho Gatha" represent the emotions and thoughts of vendors of herbal balms and betel leafs. The underlying coherence of his views is evident in "Manush Bikri Hochchhe" and "Rajdhani Dhaka". One finds an impressive array of urban issues in these rhymed verses.




