

ADB study focuses on more challenges for Bangladesh

Bangladesh will face mounting challenge of resettling and rehabilitating the people displaced by climate change, says an Asian Development Bank study.

The country is already at high risk of catastrophic environmental hazards and

floods from sea surges, river flow, rainfall and coastal and riverbank erosion that are likely to force more people from their home.

Those together with economic factors are causing rural-urban and international migration, said the study titled Climate

Army acted like land-grabbers

Environmental, human rights bodies tell press

The attempt to purchase land by force for an army housing scheme at Rupganj in Narayanganj is a violation of people's constitutional right to life and livelihood, said rights activists and environmental-

ists at a press conference yesterday.

They demanded cancellation of the housing project and also a judicial probe into a villager's death in a battle between law enforcers and the locals protesting the scheme.

Tannery owners not helpful

Environment state minister tells JS on relocation

STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Hazaribagh tannery owners' responses are not at all conducive to implementing the High Court verdict that ordered their factories to be relocated, State Minister for Environment Hasan Mahmud told the House yesterday.

In response to lawmakers' queries, Hasan mentioned the government steps to execute the High Court verdict and move the tannery industry to Savar to protect the city's residential areas as well as the Buriganga from pollution.

The verdict delivered in June, 2009 asked authorities concerned to complete the relocation by February 28, 2010. But the government failed to do the job and sought more time from the court. The High Court had extended
