

REDISCOVERING TAGORE British Council's festival begins with a writing workshop

British Council's four month-long festival, titled "Rediscovering Tagore", opened with a two-day Tagore inspired writing [in English] workshop on February 9. Emerging Bangladeshi writers were encouraged to try out their ideas, narrative techniques and unique features in an open creative space. The participants discussed and shared their thoughts with British novelist Julia Bell, who conducted the workshop and in turn, disclosed her experiences and techniques regarding writing. A Senior Lecturer in Creative Writing

at Brikbeck University (London), Bell has already published two novels; coauthored and co-edited the bestselling "Creative Writing Coursebook".

A Tagore enthusiast, Bell had used Tagore's poems as a springboard for writing exercises and as examples of truly great writing to inspire the partic ipants. Impressed by the works produced by participants, Bell said, "The standard of work at the workshop has been very high -- there is some genuine emerging talent in this class which I hope we will be hearing more from in the future." She also encouraged the writers to publish their works. She asserted that the writers can also publish their works on the web portal "The Brikbeck Writers' Hub" of which she is a coordinator. "I look forward to reading some of their published work soon," she said.

Talking about her experience in teaching and interaction with the Bangladeshi writers, she said, "As a trainer, I can't teach students to be interesting, but I hope through reading and exercises I can demonstrate how to look more clearly and closely at the world around them."

Commenting on the inspiration a

writer can find in the works of Tagore, she said, "Tagore's life is an excellent example of the qualities required of any aspiring writer -- a love of literature, an interest in all aspects of human life and a tolerance which comes with constant growth and self-

She continued that the writers "can hope to follow Tagore's example by being interested and engaged in the world around them."

Michael Moore sues Weinstein Brothers

Filmmaker Michael Moore has taken legal action against producers Bob and Harvey Weinstein, claiming he is owed millions in profits for his 2004 documentary "Fahrenheit 9/11". Moore claims the brothers used "Holly-

wood accounting tricks" to keep him from receiving \$2.7 million (£1.67m). According to legal papers, an audit brought several alleged irregularities to

A lawyer for the Weinsteins called the


claims "hogwash". Moore alleges his agreement with the Weinstein brothers was to split all profits But the Oscar-winning director claims

"grossly excessive and unreasonable" expenses were deducted before those profits were calculated. He claims audits show money was deducted for advertising costs that was never

spent, and that a private jet was hired to fly one of the brothers to Europe. The Weinsteins' lawyer said Moore's suit should be dismissed

"Fahrenheit 9/11", which centred on the Bush administration's actions after the 11 September attacks of 2001, made more than \$220 million (£137m) worldwide.

The film -- whose title alludes to the Ray Bradbury novel "Fahrenheit 451" -- won the Palme d'Or at the 2004 Cannes film festival. Source: BBC






