the border. Why in the first place there is the illegal border crossing practice? Reports have it; the lure to work in India attracts the poor Bangladeshis to risk their lives in crossing into India. It is now a regular practice in the upper middle class Indians to hire Bangladeshis to work as maids and as casual labors. These employers get them in much cheaper price and promise them better living. These employers have agents who work for them against good emoluments. More interesting is other reason..."Politicians in border states, most notably in the Communist-run state of West Bengal, have been only too willing to provide illegal immigrants from Bangladesh with ration cards to enable them access to the statesubsidized public food distribution system. The acquisition of a ration card is usually the

first step toward acquiring citizenship and thereby voting rights. Since the immigrants are generally poor and vulnerable, they are more than likely to vote for those who enabled them to change their status..." Given the complexity and

seriousness of these issues (of killings and illegal border crossing) both India and Bangladesh need to address these forthrightly and not resort to pointless mutual recriminations. Apart from these, a major area of contention has been the construction and operation of the Farakka Barrage by India to increase water supply in the river Hoogly. Bangladesh is yet to receive a fair share of the Ganges waters during the dry seasons, there have also been disputes regarding the transfer of Teen Bigha Corridor to Bangladesh. Part of Bangladesh is surrounded by the Indian state of West Bengal. On 26 June 1992, India leased three bigha land to Bangladesh to connect this enclave with mainland Bangladesh. There is dispute regarding the indefinite nature of the lease. Militants in both countries like Banga Sena and Harkat-ul-Jihad also remains in the list. Recently India and Bangladesh had agreed to fight terrorism jointly.

Only inking of treaties and deals won't be enough. Government to government friendship will not suffice. The people at large expect proper treatment from the bigger neighbor. India needs us for her journey towards the greater world. She needs friendly neighbors to make the subcontinent a peaceful region and India solvent.

Russia to unveil new air defense system...

Russian firm will disclose information about a new mobile short-range air defense system based on the Strelets launcher at the upcoming Aero India 2011 air show.

"The [Kolomna-based] Engineering Design Bureau will present for the first time details of a new ultra short-range air defense system based on the Strelets launcher for the portable Igla missiles," Russia's Federal Service for Military-Technical Cooperation said in a statement on Friday.

The Strelets multiple launcher unit was developed for use with the 9M39 Igla (NATO SA-18 "Grouse") and Igla-1 (NATO SA-16 "Gimlet") missiles. It provides an automatic remote launch capability in either single-round or salvo modes when mounted on various launch platforms.

Aero India-2011, which will be held in the southern city of Bangalore on February 9-13, will attract the record number of over 600 manufacturers, vendors and suppliers from 63 countries.

Russia will be represented by 35 companies, including MiG, Sukhoi, Almaz-Antei and Engineering Design Bureau.

New Workshop Services Front Line Vehicles in Afghanistan

purpose-built workshop for the in-theatre maintenance and repair of UK militaryvehicles was recently opened in Camp Bastion, southern Afghanistan, by Defence Secretary Dr Liam Fox.

Staffed by around 130 military engineers and Defence Support Group (DSG) civilians, the multimillion pound facility will mean that vehicles no longer have to be returned to the UK for deep repair and maintenance, saving around £50m per year in equipment rotation costs.

The Equipment Sustainability System (ESS) facility can accommodate 26 armoured vehicles and is one of the biggest buildings built in support of British operations since World War Two.

The facility was opened by Dr Fox last month. He said:

"Ensuring our troops have the armoured vehicles they need to carry out their tasks is absolutely vital. This facility will reduce the time taken to repair vehicles and get them back out on the front line.

"I imagine this is the one of the biggest, if not the biggest, building in Helmand and it demonstrates exactly what we can do in terms of innovation and excellence."

Lieutenant Colonel Phil Croager, Project Officer based at the Permanent Joint Headquarters (PJHQ), said:

"Front line equipment is worked extremely hard in tough conditions. This facility will allow us to bringvehicles in for deep maintenance, which will help to extend their time in theatre and increase their availability to operational commanders."

The DSG is a UK government trading fund owned by the Secretary of State for Defence. It aims to deliver wider defence objectives in support of key industrial strategy requirements and to be integral in future defence air and land systems acquisition and support solutions, wherever cost-effective and appropriate.

The DSG's mission is to provide expert in-house maintenance, repair, overhaul, upgrade and support services for the UK Armed Forces' air and land systems.

Iran mass producing new anti-ship missiles

RAN is mass producing a new ballistic missile which can travel at more than three times the speed of sound and hit targets on the high seas, top commanders said on Monday.

Commander Mohammad Ali Jafari, who heads the elite military force, the Revolutionary Guards, said the missile -- named "Persian Gulf" -- had a range of 300 kilometres (185 miles).

"Iran is mass producing a smart ballisticmissile for sea targets with a speed three times more than the speed of sound," state news agency IRNA quoted Jafari as saying about the new missile.

He said the missile was "undetectable and can't be

neutralised by enemies," without specifying the name. "It has very high precision in destroying targets," Jafari added.

"As the enemy's threats will likely come from the sea, air and by missiles, the Guards have been equipped with capabilities to neutralise the enemy's advanced technology," he said, according to another Iranian news agency, ISNA.

Iran's missile and space programmes have sparked concern in the West that such advanced technologies, combined with the nuclear know-how which the nation is acquiring, may enable Tehran to produce an atomic weapon.

Tehran denies its nuclear programme has military

The new missile can be fired "from surface ballistically and can hit enemy vessels from a high altitude," Amir Ali Hajizadeh, head of the Guards' air force wing told Fars news agency.

"The missile is named Persian Gulf...its warhead will carry 650 kilogrammes of explosives," he said, adding that the missile was powered by solid fuel and



designed by the Guards.

Footage on state television showed the missile being fired atop a mobile launcher from a desert terrain.

The announcement of the new missile comes as Iran holds celebrations to mark the 32nd anniversary of its Islamic revolution which toppled the US-backed shah.

Iran uses the run-up to the February 11 anniversary to tout its scientific and technological achievements. In a separate function, Iran unveiled four new home-

built satellites and engines of a rocket. Meanwhile the head of naval Guards' naval forces, Ali Fadavi, issued a warning that Iran will hit back if it

came under attack. "The Islamic republic has the ability of blocking the Strait of Hormuz if threatened," Fadavi told Mehr news agency.

"We will deliver a very firm response if any powers do the slightest thing to hurt the security of the region." Iranian military officials regularly warn of blocking the Strait of Hormuz -- the route through which 40 percent of world's oil supply by sea passes -- in case

Iran comes under attack. The United States and Israel have never ruled out the option of military strikes against Iran to stop its nuclear programme.
