In spite of the reality that the students of Dhaka University as well as the general public had done nothing that could be construed as violent in intent or nature, the authorities made it known on February 20 that any assembly of five or more persons and the carrying of objects that might cause bodily harm to people had been banned under Section 144 of the Criminal Procedure Code. The government's action quickly led to rethinking on the part of the All Party State Language Committee of Action. By an overwhelming majority, 20 out of 24 members, it was decided that the general strike planned for the next day, February 21, would be called off. Only four went against the majority decision. A major factor that appeared to have guided the Action Committee into its

those present that a violation of the restraining orders could lead to a delay in the holding of provincial elections, something that was expected to be held sooner rather than later. It may be noted that elections to the East Bengal Legislative Assembly had repeatedly been delayed on one pretext or another. # **Egypt-Israel** ties: Ehud Barak ple's reach," she said.

Israel's ties with Cairo are safe and sound, Israeli Defense Minister Ehud Barak said in comments aired yesterday, adding that Egypt's uprising shares little with the 1979 Iranian revolution.

"I don't think that the relationship between Israel and Egypt is under any risk, or that any kind of operational risk is waiting for us just behind the corner,' Barak told ABC's "This Week" program.

But he did warn of the potential for an unsettling political shift in Egypt i authorities there rush too quickly to elections, a move he said would be "catastrophic" for the region if it allowed extremists to snatch power.

Egypt has maintained a historic peace accord with the neighboring Jewish state for more than 30 years -- only one of two Arab countries to do so.

With the ouster this past week of Egypt's longtime strongman Hosni Mubarak, a committed shepherd of the agreement and a Washington ally in the global fight against extremists, concern has surged over the potential for radical elements to take power in Egypt and eventually annul the peace pact.

While Barak -- who spoke to ABC Friday hours after Mubarak stepped down -- was optimistic about keeping strong ties with Cairo, he expressed concern over the political potential of the Muslim Brotherhood, Egypt's major opposition group, especially if elections take place too soon.

The real winners of any short-term election, let's say within 90 days, will be the Muslim Brotherhood because they are already ready to jump.

illegal takeover of power from an elected government in 1981.

It was the apex court that put the controversy over who proclaimed the country's independence to rest.

In a landmark ruling on June 21, 2009, the High Court Division of SC said it was Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman who proclaimed the independence of the country in 1971. It also declared illegal and unconstitutional the publications that claim the independence was proclaimed by late president Ziaur Rahman, who was also the founder of Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP).

The SC also resolved the dispute over BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia's previous residence in Dhaka Cantonment.

The High Court and Appellate divisions of SC issued directives in around 100 public interest litigations sought to protect the environment, and legal, constitutional, fundamental, and human rights of the people. In July last year, the HC

declared all kinds of extrajudicial punishment including those in the name of fatwa illegal, and directed the authorities to take steps banning corporal punishment to school students.

In March 2009, the HC ruled against import of any ship for scrapping unless hazardous chemicals are cleaned at source outside Bangladesh.

The same year the HC issued guidelines to stop sexual harassment of women at work places, educational institutions, and public places. It directed the government

to demarcate boundaries of the Buriganga, Balu, Turag, and Shitalakkhya rivers and stop their illegal grabbing.

On October 4 last year, it ruled that Bangladesh is now a secular state since the original constitution of 1972 was automatically restored following the SC judgment on the fifth amendment. In this secular state, every-

body has religious freedom, and therefore no man, woman or child can be forced to wear religious attires like burqa, cap and dhoti, it said.

Expressing grave concern over repeated instances of men stalking women and girls with tragic consequences, the HC on November 2, last year directed the government to formulate a policy and guidelines to curb the prevalence of politicians". "The nation has the crime.

The High Court disposed more than 50,000 cases over the last four months following the chief justice's initiative to speed up disposal of cases.

Since assumption of office in September last year, Chief Justice ABM Khairul Haque took measures for quick disposal of more than one lakh criminal cases pending with the HC, said an SC official wishing anonymity.

In his statement, the former army major general said he was posted in Rangoon (Yangon) as a defence attaché from December 1973 and did not visit Bangladesh until he was recalled by the end of November 1975.

He was appointed adjutant general of Bangladesh army in February 1976 and principal staff officer to the CMLA around the same time, Nurul Islam said adding president Sayem was serving as the

"Being away from the country, I had no idea or knowledge of the incident of November 7, 1975. From Burma [Myanmar], there were no telephone communications with Bangladesh. The only source of information was local press and our diplo-

matic bags," he said. Nurul Islam said the arrest of Col Taher and others must have taken place during his stay abroad. "I had no knowledge when the investigation started and by whom. Neither

Justice Sayem, nor Major General Ziaur Rahman [the then DCMLA] ever discussed this case with me."

Sayem, Ziaur Rahman and Justice Sattar, special assistant to the president and CMLA always directly consulted with the law ministry, he said adding Sattar later took over the charge of the ministry from Sayem.

The retired army officer said he had learnt more about the case "than ever before from the press recently." Earlier on January 18, the

court directed Nurul to appear before it for placing a statement on the trial and execution of Col Taher. Citing his poor health and

ongoing treatment, Nurul expressed inability to appear before the court. Barrister Rafiqul Huq stood for him. The HC bench recorded

the statement and exempted him from appearing in the court in person. The writ petition has been

jointly filed by Col Taher's wife Lutfa Taher, his brother Anwar Hossain and Fatema Yusuf, wife of Yusuf Ali Khan who was given a life sentence by the same tribunal.

Taher, a valiant freedom fighter, was tried in secret inside Dhaka Central Jail on July 17, 1976 and hanged on July 21 the same year.

gers obstructed Shamsul and his two colleagues near Madhya Badda Community Centre around 2:30pm when they were going to a nearby bank on foot to deposit Tk 16 lakh. Shamsul was carrying a

bag containing the money. As the muggers tried to snatch the bag, they resisted The muggers shot Shamsul in the abdomen. When the gang was leav-

ing the place with the money, locals chased them and managed to catch three of them. The mob beat up the three before handing them over to Badda police.

Shamsul was rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital where he died around 4:30pm.

Sub-Inspector Shahjahan Bhuiyan of Badda Police Station said the police recovered Tk4.5 lakh from the detainees.

In protest against the killing, locals staged a demonstration and vandalised vehicles after blocking the streets, which caused severe traffic jam in the area for over two hours. In Gandaria, Abdul Huq
