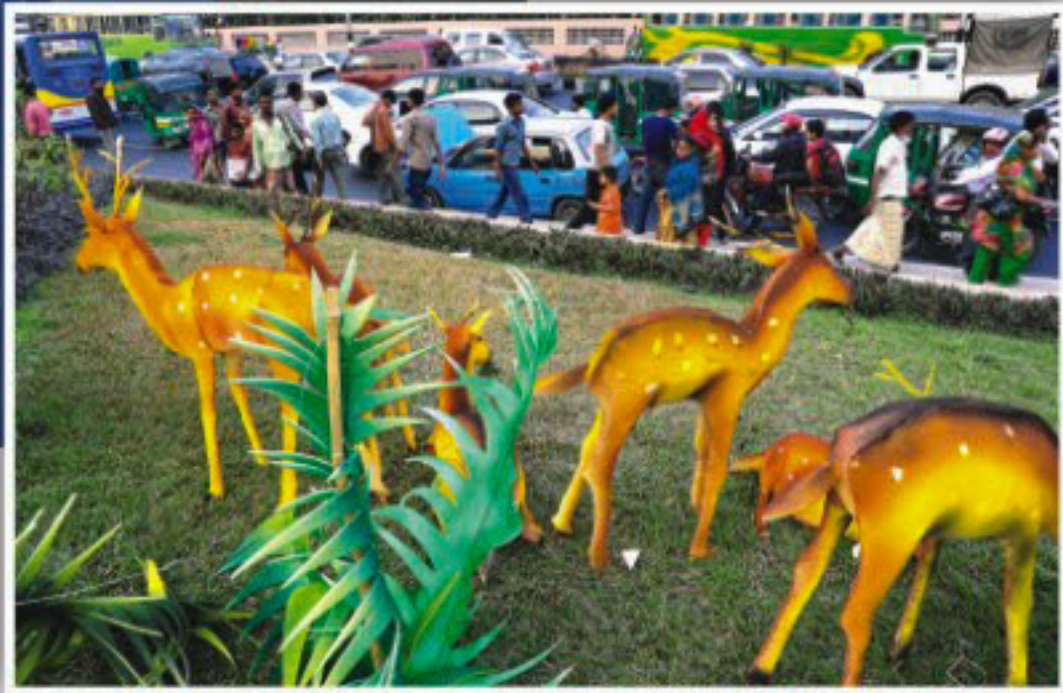

Politics of municipalities

JS told 200 out of 311 municipalities set up on political consideration

People of 200 municipalities have applied to the government for turning those into union parishads again, saying they were set up by previous governments "on political consideration".

Local Government and Rural Development (LGRD) and Cooperatives Minister Syed Ashraf Islam said this in parliament yesterday.

The government, however, will not change the status of those municipalities, he said in reply to a question.

"We want to improve the condition of those," he said.

There were 50 municipalities in 1973 when the first elections were held. There are 311 municipalities now.

The local government commis-

sion formed by the immediate past caretaker government in its report said many municipalities were set up for political reasons. The committee also recommended turning those into union parishads again.

"Municipalities were set up in those areas on political considerations without following any policy. People of those areas are not getting any municipal facilities" the LGRD

Dubious distinction

Only 5 out of 26 MPs show up to raise scripted questions for ministers at Sangsad

Wholesale absence of ruling Awami League-led alliance lawmakers, who were supposed to raise their scripted questions for ministers, put a bizarre record in parliament proceedings yesterday.

Only five out of 26 MPs, who were named to raise their scripted questions for the ministers, were present in the House during question hour.

Their absence also forced Deputy Speaker Col (retd) Shawkat Ali, who was presiding over the sitting during the question hour session, to change a decision

earlier taken not to allow other MPs to raise scripted question of specific MPs by proxy.

At the beginning of the question hour, the deputy speaker called names of seven lawmakers one after another to raise their scripted questions. But all of them were absent.

He did not allow other MPs to raise the scripted questions on behalf of absentee lawmakers for being discussed in the House.

The deputy speaker finally found one MP, Murad Hasan, to raise his scripted

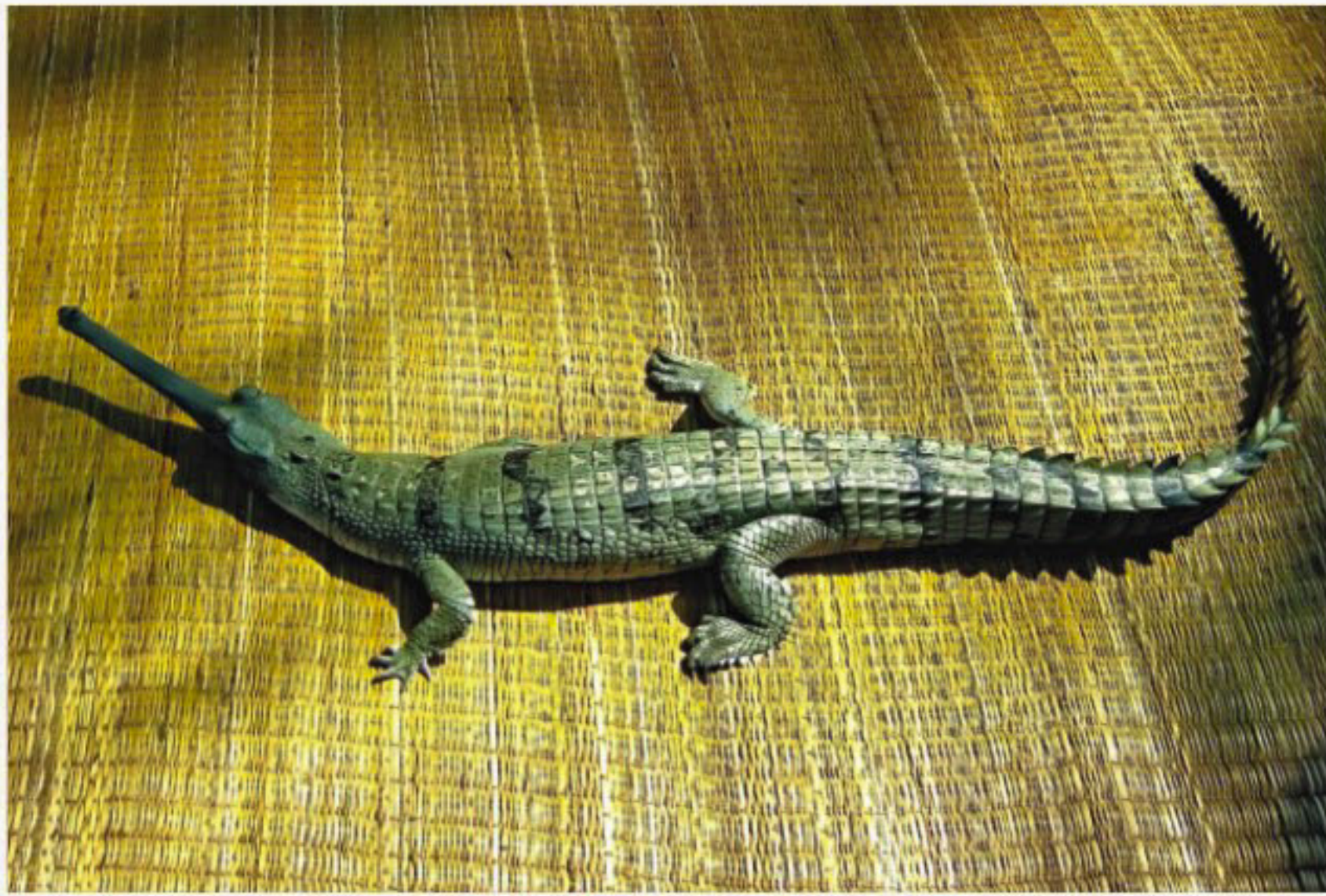

Buriganga freed of 80 structures

BIWTA demolishes illegal establishments in Lalbagh area

About 80 illegally built structures were demolished on a 1.5-kilometre stretch of the river Buriganga in Lalbagh yesterday as part of the move to free rivers of encroachers.

A joint team comprised of the officials of Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA) and an executive magistrate of Dhaka district administration knocked down the structures which were mostly makeshift and multi-decked tin-sheds in Kamalbagh and Islambagh.

As the team started pulling down a plastic factory in Kamalbagh, its employees started throwing brickbats at them. One of eight Ansar personnel of BIWTA received a minor injury and took treatment at Mitford Hospital, said Afzal Sharif, deputy director of BIWTA and port officer of Dhaka River Port.

Moreover, the team also demolished concrete, semi concrete and portions of two three-storied buildings when they embarked on the drive with two lists of illegal
