Plundering goes unabated at archaeological sites in Bogra

Many archaeological sites including the Mahasthangarh have fallen into ruin in Bogra mainly due to apathy among locals and neglect by the Department of Archaeology of Bangladesh.

At least 50 sites bearing the legacy of Maurya, Gupta and Pala dynasties in Bogra are now at the risk of destruction as the archaeology department falls short of manpower to protect them.

The historic Pundranagar popularly known as Mahasthangarh and other 33 archaeological sites centring around it were declared protected in 1922 under the Ancient Monuments Preservation Act, 1904 during the British rule.

Md Badrul Alam, acting Rajshahi regional director of the Department of Archaeology, said official records show the department has purchased only 37 of the 516 acre-land in the Pundranagar.

Md Shafiquel Islam, Shibganj upazila agriculture extension officer, said, "Locals have been growing

Unfair anti-graft law to stumble on court

Warns roundtable on govt move to amend ACC Act, keep govt staffs out of its jurisdiction

Any amendment to the Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) Act contradicting the constitution will not sustain before the High Court, eminent lawyer Shahdeen Malik has said.

"This is a kind of immunity -- a kind of indemnity for a section of people that prior permission will be required before filing cases against government officials," he said at a roundtable in the capital yesterday.

"If passed, this discriminatory law will not sustain a legal battle before the High Court, as our constitution ensures equity for all before law."

Transparency International Bangladesh (TIB) organised the roundtable at LGED Bhaban in Agargaon against the backdrop of the government move for bringing 10 amendments to the ACC law.

46,000 jobs to go Govt to shut nutrition centres on WB prescription,

merge the scheme into main health programme

At least 46,000 nutrition workers are to lose jobs following a merger of the National Nutrition Programme with the mainstream health and family planning scheme in June.

Sources said the plan taken up under World Bank prescription will be finalised within this month.

Nutritionists and NGOs working on health issues say after the merger the focus on free delivery of nutrition packages to women and children will be drifted away and the nation would lose some

46,000 trained workers.

The health and family planning programme has remained ineffective due to lack of manpower and the nutrition programme is going to meet the same fate, they added.

With the new programme all the 42,000 nutrition centres at around 150 upazilas will be closed from June and nutrition packages be delivered through community clinics.

In a meeting on February 6, the health ministry decided to merge the nutrition scheme with five-year (2011-2016) Health

With each passing of the shuttle, the cloth gets longer. And longer gets the dream of Ambalika and nine others in the indigenous Tripura village in Srimongol.

Rifat Khan, a class IV student of Shamsul Huq School and College of Dagair, and his mother Rebeka Yasmin Marjina, 40, died on the spot.

Quoting witnesses, Sub-Inspector Pradip Kumar Kundu of Jatrabari Police Station said a Matlab-bound bus hit the two while they were crossing the road around 11:45am. The mother was taking the boy to his school.

Locals chased the bus, but it sped away. They staged demonstration protesting the accident and traffic remained suspended for around half an hour.



No to domestic help under-12

HC declares excesses on them illegal

Declaring all forms of violence, torture and repression on domestic helps illegal, the High Court yesterday ordered the government to ensure that no child aged below 12 is employed as domestic worker.

In its judgement on a writ petition, the HC also directed the government to incorporate a provision in the labour law, recognising domestic helps aged between 12 and 18 years as child workers.

The existing labour law does not recognise domestic helps as workers.

The HC judgement contained a set of other directives to the government that include taking immediate steps to ensure security and a congenial working environment SEE PAGE 6 COL 7
