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Safety first, then import

HC asks ship-breakers again to go by rules, ensure protection of workers, public, environment

The High Court yesterday said import of ships will not be allowed for dismantling unless public and workers' safety and environmental protection are ensured.

The HC bench of Justice AHM Shamsuddin Chowdhury Manik and Justice Sheikh Md Zakir Hossain said this during hearing of a petition filed

by Bangladesh Ship Breakers Association (BSBA) seeking permission to import ships for dismantling.

The court directed the BSBA to submit a report by February 27 on experts' opinion regarding pre-cleaning of ships inside the country.

The court fixed February 27 for delivering an order on the petition.

The same bench on January 19 issued a suo moto rule directing the

government to stop all kinds of ship-breaking until further order. The order came against the backdrop of an explosion inside a ship in Sitakunda that killed four workers on January 18.

Justice Shamsuddin, senior member of the bench, yesterday said, "We'll permit entry of ships into the country's territory for scrapping on a
