
Javed happy that Sachin's done it



The day after the opening match of the World Cup has been one full of sighs and yawns, the lack of interest and people around the Sher-eket World Cup Bangla National Stadium, the premise so much in vogue over the last week or so, could be inter-

all is lost for the Tigers. Nor is the tournament over but after Saturday's fervour, it is safe to say that the thousands at the stadium and the millions who celebrated the arrival of the World Cup in Bangladesh, are simply catching up on some shut-eye. There were some positives from the game, Bangladesh's score of 283 being the major one and so was the approach adopted to chase the massive 371-run target. Imrul Kayes set the ball rolling, his bold approach surprising many including his opening partner. "On his day, he [Imrul Kayes] can bat beautifully. I think he is taking his game to the next level where he wants to play more shots," said Tamim Iqbal yesterday.

The partnership was of 56 runs in just 6.5 overs, but the pair's approach took everyone by surprise. While Imrul tore into the Indian bowlers, Tamim was circumspect. The lefthanded pair added 56 off only 6.5 overs with Imrul surprisingly taking more of the bowling and hitting out.

"This is how a team plan works. I wasn't having a good day. I wasn't timing the ball and was hitting the fielders. So there were two options for me.

"Either I could have hit out in that situation and got out, or could stick around, making sure I ride out the tough moments. I caught up with the strike-rate in the end. Sachin Tendulkar came to our dressing room last year and told us this exact same thing.

Whilst Bangladesh woke up to the grim reality of losing against India in the much-hyped opener of the icc cricket World Cup World Cup, their next opponents, Ireland were in a relaxed mood the

next morning.

And why would they not be. The Irish are running high on the back of two very good practice matches, one of which was a 4 wicket win over Zimbabwe. In the other they ran New Zealand very close before conceding a 32-run defeat. And of course there is the history between the sides; Bangladesh fell to Ireland in their last World Cup meeting 2007.

Naturally then, the feeling of being quietly confident was evident when William Porterfield, the Irish skipper met the press at the end of a two-

hour practice session at the Academy Ground beside the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium yesterday.

"The way we are playing right now, we'll be confident going into the match on Friday," said Porterfield.

one. We've had some good preparation. We played pretty well in the last couple of warm up games, picked up the momentum, and we will be feeling pretty confident."

From a broader perspective, the confidence stems from the constant rise in the graph of Irish cricket in the last four years since they made their World Cup debut and managed to beat Bangladesh and Pakistan.

"We have made massive strides in recent years. In the last World Cup we were pretty much unknown. People were struggling to relate Ireland with a cricket nation, but we have put Ireland on the cricket map now. Most of the players have also become fulltime cricketers in the last 18 months which makes a massive difference to our cricket."

The Irish landed in Dhaka on the 17th of "The conditions here might be different from February after playing the two warm-up matches what we are used to, but not necessarily a difficult in India. They had a fun time playing golf on Thursday when the Tigers were perspiring against the Indians. The players took a few glimpses of the match on television, but declined to read much into the result of Thursday's match. Rather they looked at concentrating on their own game.

> "We know if we can perform we can beat full member nations. We have done that in the last couple of seasons. So we are pretty confident that whoever the opposition are, we are capable enough to beat them on our day. We will go out there and back ourselves on our abilities."


