England have recovered from the shock loss to minnows Ireland in a World Cup match and the team is confident of beating title favourites South Africa in tomorrow's must-win match, insisted all-rounder Paul Collingwood.

"Of course we got a disappointing result against Ireland. But this team usually bounces back from disappoint

ments very fast and immediately. We want a good result on Sunday," Collingwood said last night on the sidelines of a function to launch Slazenger sports products, for which he is one of the brand ambassadors.

On tomorrow's match, a must-win for England, Collingwood conceded that South Africa are a top team and very strong in all departments.

"But we are a very strong side ourselves. In the past two years, we have played against South Africa a fair bit and actually have a good record. We won the one-day series against them.

## Eng have recovered: Outgoing Biff at peace

South Africa captain Graeme Smith said on Saturday he hoped his decision to stand down from the one-day leadership after the World Cup would inspire his team's quest for the trophy.

The 30-year-old was thrust into the captaincy of both Test and one-day teams in 2003 following a disastrous World Cup, where hosts South Africa exited before the second phase.

Smith, who has already stepped down as South Africa's Twenty20 skipper but remains as Test captain, said he was "at peace" with his decision.

"It's not affecting us at all," the left-handed opening batsman said at the Chidambaram Stadium, where South Africa meet England in the World Cup on Sunday.

"Things have been very normal for us as a squad and providing more motivation if anything.

"It was a personal decision and I've been in the job for eight years which is more than most other captains tend to last these days.

"From my perspective I'm very proud of what I've done and I wanted to give myself the best chance of a World Cup knowing I've given it my best shot with the team and the players," added Smith, who was South Africa's youngest captain when appointed aged just 22.

"I just want that opportunity to have it all out here and get on that aeroplane knowing I've done what I wanted to," explained Smith, who in 2008-09 led South Africa to their first Test series win in Australia.

And as for rescinding his decision, he said: "I'm at peace with it now and I'm very focused on the World Cup -- that's my priority."

South Africa have looked one of the form teams of the tournament thus far, with convincing wins over the West Indies and the Netherlands, while England struggled to beat the Dutch, tied with India and were greatWorldCup upsets onWednesday.

Asked if South Africa were a better all-round side than England, Smith replied: "We hope so but the key for us is to carry on playing as a unit.

"We just have to come out tomorrow, be solid, consistent and perform our roles. Hopefully, we can be one step ahead of England."

The England side is set to feature two players in batsmen Jonathan Trott and Kevin Pietersen who both learned their cricket in South Africa, while captain Andrew Strauss and wicketkeeper Matt

Prior were both born in the country. Smith, who has the nickname Biff, though played a straight bat when asked if he found it annoying that England had so many 'South Afri-

cans' in their side. "It's probably the 50th time I've tried to find an answer to this question. It's not a thing for us

Defending champions Australia faced Sri Lanka in a mouthwatering World Cup clash on Saturday dramatically spiced up by new 'chucking' allegations over record-breaking spinner Muttiah Muralidaran.

Darrell Hair, who caused a storm in the international game when he first called the Sri Lankan star for an illegal action in 1995, said that many current match officials share the same doubts. However, he insists that

some umpires are scared to intervene, content to see the 38-year-old enjoy his World Cup swansong before slipping into international retirement.

"A couple of current umpires have said to me, 'something is wrong', but they prefer to let it go," Hair, who quit in 2008, told Australian media on Saturday.

"There is still a lot of doubt about his deliveries. "A few have told me, 'there

is definitely something wrong with his action, but I'm not going to call him'." Muralidaran has been

cleared by the International Cricket Council (ICC) after undergoing biomechanical tests on his controversial action.

But the debate continues to polarise opinion.

"I watched a few of his deliveries against Pakistan and I noticed the last few overs when he was really getting some turn on the ball, those wouldn't have complied under scrutiny," claimed Hair.

"But this is his last World Cup, he's going to bow out with a lot of fanfare and no umpire will be bothered by it."

Muralidaran, who has a record 523 ODI wickets and 800 Test victims, lined up against Australia at the R Premadasa Stadium in Colombo in Saturday's crucial Group A match.

#### Champs Trophy could get lost

The Champions Trophy could be axed as part of a reorganisation of the global cricket calendar, International Cricket Council (ICC) chief executive Haroon Lorgat said on Saturday.

The one-day tournament, which started in 1998, and has usually been held every two years since, may be squeezed out by the new Test World Championship, set to be played in England in 2013.

Lorgat said the ICC wanted to create a "pinnacle" in all three formats with a Test world championship, the 50-over World Cup and World Twenty20.

He added it was difficult to see where the Champions Trophy, currently held by Australia, would fit into such
