Rice queue gets longer

Prices in market fall a little

Prices of rice eased marginally this week but still remain too high for the poor, forcing more of them to queue up at fair price outlets.

People in the lower middle income group have recently started going to open market sale (OMS) shops to buy the staple food at a subsidised rate.

"Nobody likes to stand in a queue. I wouldn't have been here had I not been compelled to. Prices of rice are too high to afford for a long time," said a depressed Mohammad Shahed, an undergraduate student of marketing under the National University.

Shahed stood in a queue at a government fair price point at Swamibag on Thursday to buy rice at Tk 24 per kilogram, at least Tk 10 cheaper than the market price.

According to a food ministry official, a total of 209 OMS trucks had sold rice to 125,000 families in the capital on that day. Currently, retailers sell coarse rice, mostly consumed

Hopes run high for stalled issues

Delhi keen on solution before Manmohan's Dhaka tour

Several Indian ministers and high officials will start visiting Bangladesh this month to set the ball rolling on a number of outstanding issues ahead of Prime Minister Manmohan Singh's visit later this year.

Sharing of Teesta river water, transit, exchange of 162 enclaves in each other's territory, 6.5 kilometres of un-

demarcated border and import of electricity from India are some key bilateral issues on which Bangladesh and India have been trying to make progress over the last one year.

To lay the groundwork for the Indian prime minister, Indian Foreign Secretary Nirupama Rao will visit Dhaka next month followed by a trip by External Affairs Minister SM Krishna, confirmed official sources.

Diplomatic sources said Manmohan Singh is expected to visit Dhaka at the end of the monsoon or at the end of this year. Officials of both the countries are trying to work out mutual dates for the visits of the Indian side.

Both Dhaka and New Delhi hope the visits will keep up the momentum in bilateral relations and take

A sell-out 35,000 crowd in Colombo was left disappointed after heavy rain robbed them of a potentially thrilling match between co-hosts Sri Lanka and defending champions Australia on Saturday.

The Group A clash between the 1996 winners and winners of the past three World Cups was shaping up well until heavy rain, coupled with thunderstorms, forced the teams from the field. The match was later abandoned.

The no-result gives both teams one point each, leaving Pakistan at the top of Group A with six points from three matches. Australia have five points from

three matches and Sri Lanka have five points from four.

Sri Lanka, who chose to bat after winning the toss, were recovering from a poor start, at 146-3 before heavy rain put a halt to action after 32.5 overs.

Kumar Sangakkara (73) and Thilan Samaraweera (34) were at the crease when play stopped, having added 71 runs for the unbroken fourth wicket stand.

With pools of water standing on the pitch, umpires Ian Gould and Tony Hill called off the match at the R Premadasa Stadium.

More than 10,000 endangered whales and dolphins of six species have made the Bay of Bengal and the Sundarbans estuary a safe home, a month long survey reveals.

A group of Bangladeshi wildlife scientists headed by Dr Anisuzzaman Khan carried out the survey and recently revealed that the Bay is still a good abode of aquatic animals like whales, and dolphins commonly known as cetaceans.

The team found a good number of cetaceans including Irrawaddy dolphins, fin-less porpoises, bottlenosed dolphins, Indo-Pacific humpbacks and Ganges River dolphins while cruising the part of the Bay in Bangladesh.
