# Gaddafi seeks UN, AU probe into unrest

#### Libya refugee aid operation intensifies

AFP, Paris

Muammar Gaddafi said he wanted the United Nations or the African Union to probe the unrest rocking Libya and promised investigators free access, in an interview published yesterday.

The strongman, making his first such demand since the outbreak of violent protests against his rule and the ensuing bloody riposte, also warned that the unrest would spell disaster for Europe.

"First of all I would like that an investigatory commission of the United Nations or the African Union comes here to Libya," he told the French weekly Le Journal du Dimanche.

"We will let this panel work unhampered," he said, adding that he would be in favour of France "coordinating and leading" the probe

Shortly after the unrest broke out, Gaddafi's son Saif al-Islam, long seen as a possible successor, said he wanted an independent domestic probe into the unrest.

"Thousands of people from Libya will invade Europe," he said, "and there will be no-one to stop them.'

Gaddafi repeated an oft-repeated charge that the revolt against his regime was being spearheaded by Al-Qaeda. "There is an Islamic jihad facing you from

Suspected Al-Qaeda gunmen killed four soldiers in Yemen yesterday

#### Jacques Chirac faces trial for graft

Jacques Chirac expects to go on trial Monday (today), the first former French president to face corruption charges, as alleged murky dealings in his office when he was mayor of Paris finally catch up with him.

Now 78, Chirac has become France's most popular politician since leaving office in 2007, despite being accused of using city funds to pay ghost worker salaries to political allies while he was mayor between 1977 to 1995.

#### Blast in south Iraq kills 6

AFP, Basra

A roadside bomb killed six people and wounded 12 aboard a bus in Iraq's southern port city of Basra yesterday, a provincial official said.

The blast targeted a passing US military convoy but instead struck the bus and wrecked it, the head of Basra provincial council's security committee, Ali al-Ghanimi, said.

Women and children were among the casualties of the 10:00am local time attack near a train station in the al-Maakal district of north Basra, Ghanimi said, but it was unclear how many of them died or were wounded.

Sergeant Sarah Snedden, a spokeswoman for US forces in Iraq, confirmed there had been "an incident in Basra" but did not provide further details.

#### Japan's FM resigns over donation row

Japan's Foreign Minister Seiji Maehara announced his resignation yesterday over donations received from a foreign resident in violation of the country's laws.

Maehara -- who had been seen as a likely successor to embattled Prime Minister Naoto Kan -- said he would step down after admitting he received several hundred dollars from a restaurant owner of Korean ethnicity.

"I apologise to the Japanese people for stepping down after only six months and provoking distrust over a problem with my political funding, although I have sought to pursue a clean style of politics,"

demonstrations, and escalate the peaceful struggle in all regions until he (Saleh) is left with one option, that is to leave," said Mohammed Sabri, a leading member of the Common Forum opposition alliance.

The veteran leader, who has ruled since 1978, on Saturday dismissed an opposition proposal for a quick transition of power, saying he would serve out his current term, which expires in 2013.

#### Blast kills 12 civilians in Afghanistan

AFP, Kabul

A Taliban-style roadside bomb tore through a car in eastern Afghanistan's Paktika province yesterday, killing 12 civilians and wounding five others, the provincial administration said.

The dead included five children, two women and five men. They were on their way from neighbouring Pakistan, the Paktika provincial administration said in a statement.

Mohibullah Samim, the provincial governor, blamed the bombing on Taliban who are engaged in a campaign aimed at toppling the pro-US government of President Hamid Karzai.

The rebels loyal to Taliban and other militant groups often use improvised bombs in attacks against Afghan security forces and their Western military backers.

There are about 140,000 foreign military forces operating in Afghanistan under the command of the United States.

#### Egypt gets new foreign minister AFP, Cairo

Egypt yesterday named its former ambassador to the United Nations, Nabil al-Arabi, as foreign minister in the latest move to purge the cabinet of members of toppled president Hosni Mubarak's regime.

"Nabil al-Arabi said he has accepted the foreign ministry portfolio during this critical time in the history of Egypt," the state-run MENA news agency reported.

Arabi replaces Ahmed Abul Gheit, who had been in the job since 2004.

Arabi's name was among 25 proposed by a coalition of youth movements behind the uprising that overthrew Mubarak, which also included Sharaf.

### Apology 'not enough'

Says Karzai to Petraeus

Afghan President Hamid Karzai yesterday told General David Petraeus, the commander of US-led troops in Afghanistan, that his apology after nine children were killed in a Nato air strike was "not enough".

"President Karzai said that David Petraeus's apology is not enough," a statement from the Afghan presidency said. Karzai made the comments during a cabinet meeting at

which Petraeus was present. "The civilian casualties are a main cause of worsening the relationships between Afghanistan and the US," the statement quoted Karzai as saying.

"The people are tired of these things and apologies and condemnations are not healing any pain. "On behalf of the people of Afghanistan I want you to stop

the killings of civilians. The 9 children were killed on Tuesday in an air raid carried

out by coalition helicopters in the eastern province of Kunar. Nato's International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) said the children were mistaken for rebels.

Civilian casualties -- especially involving children -- are a highly sensitive issue in war-torn Afghanistan, where a Taliban-led insurgency has raged since the Islamists were ousted from power by a US-led 2001 invasion.

Karzai says deaths of civilians in military operations turn people against his delicate pro-US administration. Civilian casualties have also been a key source of tension between Kabul and its Western backers, the US and Nato.

## I Coast civil war is aflame, but is anyone looking?

While the global eye remains fixed on Libya, a civil war has caught flame in Ivory Coast, and world leaders beyond the ailing country have all but acquiesced to letting it burn. The former French colony, planet

earth's top producer of cocoa, was designed to be the economic engine of Francophone tropics -- an cocoa, gas diamond, and rubber-producing boom nation whose overwhelmingly Muslim north would share in prosperity known by its Christian south. Instead, three months of food and cur-

rency shortages after its incumbent President Laurent Gbagbo refused to concede an election, the country has devolved into a land where mass graves are buried beyond the reach of human rights investigators, or victims of state violence are stowed indefinitely in morgues. The UN estimates that at least 365 people

have died here -- most of them apparently Muslims -- shot by a motley of soldiers and state-backed militiamen who view Islam and Ivory Coast as irreconcilable. But the UN's count is likely a low estimate because the organisation finds itself treated as an occupying army. Rebels from the country's north have

swept into government-held towns, breaking the four-year-old ceasefire that kept the

two sides at arms lengths. Gbagbo's army is reportedly recruiting Liberian mercenaries, brutes responsible for the worst atrocities committed during Ivory Coast's 2002 round of hostilities.

Ivoirians, fleeing the country in five thousands by the day, need assistance -but it isn't there. The African Union has offered to negotiate an accord, but the continent's leadership has been ineffective at any task other than publicly torpedoing one another.

More astounding a failure than Africa's disunity has been America's disinterest. Since December, Barack Obama hasn't voiced so much as a comment on the crisis, let alone a commitment to it. His silence empowers brutes on either side of the civil conflict, who have enjoyed free reign to fire on demonstrators or shovel mass graves while the planet's news cameras orbit the Arab world -- as if nothing important happens south of the Sahara.

But mostly, Obama's hush comes as painful disappointment from this president who stands a symbol of democracy to a generation of Africans sorting out the injustices of their own. The president enjoys tremendous goodwill and popular support on the continent. It's time for him to use it, publicly.

It's discouraging, how quickly those corners went back to being forgotten.
