












# A Mirror on Society

Dhaka Art Centre has organised a solo painting and installation exhibition titled "Contemplation", featuring works of Murshida Arzu Alpana. The exhibition features 32 artworks. The exhibition opened on March 4

and will continue till March 16. Mohammed Mijarul Quayes, secretary, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, was present as chief guest at the programme. The Ambassador of Italy to Bangladesh, Giorgio Guglielmino and director of Goethe Institut Bangladesh Angela Gruenert were present as special guests. The inaugural was chaired by veteran painter Rafiqun Nabi. Noted cultural personality Ramendu Majumdar, president of Dhaka Art Centre, delivered the welcome speech at the programme.

Alpana has been working in Berlin since 1993. She frequently comes to Dhaka and her last solo exhibition was held at Goethe Institut in the city. She is considered a conceptual artist whose works focus on the state of women in society. A woman is a symbol of grace, peace and harmony, feels Alpana.

Alpana is a socially aware painter and her themes mirror various social, political and environmental issues. She has employed various mediums and tech niques to express her views on the sub-

Mingling of eastern and western motifs is recurrent in Alpana's works which explore women's standing in



gladesh and Germany. In Dhaka and Berlin, she has clearly observed people's lives, manners and their wants and feelings.

Alpana also addresses the subconscious. Some of her works randomly feature seemingly meaningless motifs like a fragmented human body. It is often difficult to determine what is important in her works. She explains their significance in her own way.

Alpana studies landscapes too, and

scapes in the background. She studied under KG Subramanian at Shantiniketan, India and then went to

Berlin in 1993 on a scholarship. Her paintings also put human forms with inanimate objects like furniture and electronic appliances like computer, mobile phone etc. Her preferred mediums are silkscreen printing, oil, mixedmedia, acrylic, acrylic-glass, pencil, crayon, oil sticks and charcoal.

on canvas. Sizes of the canvases vary according to themes and compositions. The modes of expression are realistic, semi-realistic and abstract expressionistic. Nude and semi-nude figures, birds, pitcher, babies, cars and water lilies are recurring motifs. The drawing-based works are engrossed with meticulous lines and forms.

#### Qayyum Chowdhury Turns 79 Birthday celebration at Bengal Gallery

Qayyum Chowdhury is one of the most renowned painters of our country. He has made an enormous contribution to the enrichment of Bangladeshi art. He is also a social activist. On his 79th birthday [today] Bengal Foundation is hosting a celebration programme at Bengal Gallery of Fine Arts, in Dhanmondi, Dhaka.


Chowdhury was born in 1932 in Feni. He graduated from Govt. Institute of Arts (now Faculty of Fine Arts, University of Dhaka) in

Chowdhury's works delve deep into rural Bengali life and traditions. Most of his paintings highlight folk elements, especially rural women. The artist incorporates the essence of folk motifs in most of his works. Animals birds, fish, wild flowers and greenery are recurring objects on his canvas.

In his works, the skillful handling of colours and movements of the subjects are exceptional and the canvases are marked Chowdhury is also recognised for his

illustrations and has done many illustrations for books, newspapers, literary journals and The artist has held four solo exhibitions

and he has participated in many group exhibitions at home and abroad.



# New Horizon Opens for Bangladeshi Artists

Bengal Foundation and Skira Editore ink a 10 year deal

Bengal Foundation opened up a new horizon for Bangladeshi art and artists through inking a 10 yearlong deal with Skira Editore [Milan, Italy], one of the oldest and most prestigious publishing houses that specialise on fine arts related books.

Skira's International Commissions Editor Rosa Maria Falvo, on behalf of the institution, and Abul Khair, Chairman of Bengal Foundation, signed the deal at Bengal Shilpalaya, in Dhanmondi, Dhaka on March 6.

As part of the deal, a high quality series of books showcasing artworks of both master and contemporary artists of Bangladesh will be gradually published by Skira. International publishers Rizzoli, Random House (New York) and Thames & Hudson (London) will distribute these books all over the world.

Founded in 1928 by Albert Skira, Skira Editore's earliest editions are legendary: Ovid's "Metamorphosis", illustrated with 30 original engraving By Pablo Picasso (1930) and "Poésies" by Stéphane Mallarmé, illustrated with 29 original etchings by Henri Matisse (1932). Its first office in Paris became a creative hub for many. This gave birth to the legendary art review Minotaure, which published the works of numerous legends such as Pablo Picasso, Henri Matisse, and Salvador Dalí, and included the early writings of Jacques Lacan and the photographs of Man Ray and Brassaï.

Director General of Bengal Foundation Luva Nahid Chowdhury welcomed all and emceed the event. Chief guest of the programme was Sir Fazle Hasan Abed, founder and chairperson of BRAC. Special guests were Begum Jahanara Abedin, widow of Shilpacharya Zaunil Abedin; Giorgio Guglielmino, ambassador of Italy to Bangladesh and Mahfuz Anam, editor of The Daily

"Today is a very special day for all of us who are associated with Bengal Foundation. This initiative exemplifies its origin when Zainul Abedin founded the first art school in Dhaka in 1948," he added.

"I have three goals -- to see Bangladesh as a thriving cultural hub; to represent Bangladeshi art, theatre, literature, architecture and music both at domestic and global

"I think this is a win-win situation for both Skira and Bengal Foundation. It will truly be a landmark for Bangladeshi art and artists as from now on they will be showcased at museums throughout the world," said Giorgio Guglielmino

## James Bond Walks in a Woman's Shoes

He's romanced, rescued and lost his fai share of women over more than half a century, but has James Bond ever paused to consider the rates of sexual assault of young girls going to school in the devel-

oping world? That's one of a number of startling questions posed by a new short film by the artiste and director Sam Taylor-Wood, released to coincide with International Women's Day and starring Bond actors Daniel Craig and Judi

## International Artistes Regret Performing for Gaddafi Clan

Singer Nelly Furtado has said that she will give away \$1 million (£615,000) she was paid to perform for the family of Libyan leader Muammar Gaddafi

The star said on Twitter she had given a private 45-minute show for Gaddafi's "clan" in 2007 at a hotel in Italy.

The 32-year-old did not say which charity she would donate the money to. Meanwhile, Beyonce has revealed money she

earned from a 2009 gig was donated to charity when it emerged the promoter was linked to the Gaddafi family. In a statement the star's publicist said: "The

money paid to Beyonce for her performance at a private party at Nikki Beach, St Barts on New Year's Eve 2009, including the commissions paid to her booking agency, were donated to the earthquake relief efforts in Haiti, over a year ago."

Once it became known the third party promote was linked to the Gaddafi family, the statement went on, "the decision was made to put that payment to a good cause". Source: Internet

Another artiste, US singer Usher, is reportedly facing music industry calls to surrender fees earned from performing for Gaddafi's family.

According to Rolling Stone, the singer received

an undisclosed sum for performing at the same party as Beyonce Knowles in 2009. Mariah Carey, the magazine went on, accepted \$1 million to perform for Gaddafi's son Muatassim in 2008, while rapper 50 Cent gave a show for him

On Thursday, Carey said she had been "naive and unaware of who I was booked to perform for." "I feel horrible and embarrassed to have participated in this mess," she said in a statement. "This is


