smashed 144 before taking 4-4 to help Sri Lanka beat Zimbabwe by 139 runs and reach the World Cup quarterfinals on Thurs-

Together with fellow opener Upul Tharanga, who hit a career-best 133, Dilshan put on a new World Cup opening stand of 282 to guide Sri Lanka to an imposing 327-6 before a packed 30,000 crowd at Pallekele Stadium.

Zimbabwe made a fighting reply with Brendon Taylor (80) and Regis Chakabva (35) through a solid 116-run start before the innings fell apart, as they lost their last their last nine wickets for just 63 runs.

Dilshan, who bettered his previous best of 4-29 against India at Dambulla in 2005, also became the 11th allrounder, and the second Sri Lankan behind Sanath Jayasuriya, to score a hundred and take four wickets in an ODI.

The result meant Sri Lanka, with seven points from five matches in Group A, become the first side to enter the last eight.

New Zealand, with six points from four matches, Pakistan (six from four) and defending champions Australia (five from three) are virtually certain of filling the three other qualifying places

Dutch toughen India: Dhoni

India captain Mahendra Singh Dhoni said his team had a good workout against the Netherlands and the pressure they faced would stand them in good stead for tougher World Cup challenges ahead.

India laboured to a five-wicket win at New Delhi's Feroz Shah Kotla Stadium after bowling the Dutch out cheaply for 189, virtually sealing their place in the quarterfinals. Openers Virender Sehwag and Sachin Tendulkar tore into

the Dutch bowling, reaching 69 in the eighth over before Sehwag was the first to go, sparking a mini-collapse that reduced India to 99 for four. But Dhoni said losing wickets meant batsmen lower

down the order, including Yuvraj Singh (51 not out) had enjoyed crucial time in the middle ahead of matches against more powerful nations. It was a almost a carbon copy of the win against Ireland,

where India also found themselves in trouble at 100-4 in reply to a modest total of 207, with Yuvraj also hitting a halfcentury in that game.

"Any side you're playing, if you're 100-4 you are under a bit of pressure, especially if the wickets are slow and low and if you are expected to win easily, so that was a decent win for us," Dhoni said after Wednesday's victory against the Dutch.

"It's a good experience to have because you're all of a sudden in the quarterfinals or against a stronger side," he added. "You don't want your middle order, your lower middle

order, to get exposed. It's good that most of the batsmen have got a decent hit in the games they have played."

The skipper said the quick start when batting had been a bid to improve their run rate.

"When you're playing some of the so-called weaker sides in the world you try to get as many runs as possible with the new ball and when you're trying to do that your batsmen play aggressive shots and it's not all the time you'll be successful," he said.

Dhoni said it was important to take wickets with the new ball as a way of slowing the opposition but backed his bowlers to perform.

India have struggled to force early breakthroughs in their matches so far with the exception of the Ireland game, where paceman Zaheer Khan took two early wickets. "I think we've got quite a few talented bowlers who can

really swing the ball and even if there's no swing for them they can bowl a tight line and get the batsmen out. And the skipper said off-spinner Harbhajan Singh would

come into his own as the tournament progressed. So far he has taken just two wickets in four matches.

"I think as the tournament heats up in the coming few games you'll see a different Harbhajan Singh," adding that better opponents would bring out the best in him.

Borren a proud captain

Proud skipper Peter Borren praised his "brave" team for their efforts against India, saying the Netherlands had put themselves in a winning position but lacked the firepower to shock the hosts.

The minnows silenced a big crowd in New Delhi on Wednesday when they had India struggling at 99 for four before the home side battled back to win by five wickets.

"It's been a roller-coaster day, been up and down, up and down and in the end I'm very proud of the guys and the effort that we made in defending what wasn't a really high score against a fantastic batting line-up," said Borren.

"We told everyone before this tournament started that we were going to try and make sure that we had chances to win in every game and I think to be honest we had a chance when India were 99-4 and it only takes a couple of good moments of cricket there and you're right on top," he added.

"We were brave to come back from where we were with the batting. We were brave to come back from where we were after [Virender] Sehwag and [Sachin] Tendulkar's onslaught," said Borren.

The skipper said his players had thrived

on the atmosphere in front of a passionate home crowd but had lacked the firepower to finish India off.

The Dutch started their tournament by giving Ashes winners England a real scare before eventually slipping to defeat and went down to heavy losses at the hands of the West Indies and South Africa. The skipper said it was difficult to talk

about progress due to inconsistency during the tournament, though the side had made major strides in recent years. "To say we're progressing, getting better


in every game this tournament, that's not quite right," he said.

"We're inconsistent. It's never easy. We don't get to play at this level very often."

But he added: "The last three years we've made real progress. We've got a full-time coach now, we've got guys who put a lot more time and effort into it. "We play a lot more cricket, not against

full members, which is a shame, but among the associates. There's a lot more cricket and I think we're progressing because of it." Borren said with easier games to come

against Bangladesh and fellow associate nation Ireland, he would back his team to take future chances and "get a win or two on the board."
