# Blast at nuke plant raises meltdown fear

AGENCIES, Japan

A massive explosion rocked a Japanese nuclear power plant yesterday menacing a nation just beginning to grasp the scale of a catastrophic earthquake and tsunami.

A huge pall of smoke was seen coming from the plant at Fukushima and several workers were injured.

The plant was damaged by Friday's 8.9-magnitude earthquake, which sent a 10-metre tsunami ripping through towns and cities across the northeast coast.

The blast raised fears of a meltdown at the facility north of Tokyo as officials scrambled to contain what could be the worst nuclear disaster since the Chernobyl explosion in 1986 that shocked the

At least three persons have been exposed to radiation, AFP added, citing NHK report.

The three were randomly chosen for examination out of some 90 bedridden patients moved from a hospital in the town of Futaba-machi near the quake-hit nuke plant.

The patients had waited for rescuers on a school ground, spending a long time outside and then being moved by helicopter at the time when an explosion hit the ageing Fukushima No 1 plant, NHK said, citing the Fukushima local government.

Japan's Prime Minister Naoto Kan declared a state of emergency at the Fukushima 1 and 2 plants as engineers try to confirm whether a reactor at one of the stations has gone into meltdown.

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
