

A second explosion has hit a nuclear plant that was damaged in Friday's earthquake, but officials said the reactor core was still intact.

A huge column of smoke billowed from Fukushima Daiichi's reactor 3, two days after a blast hit reactor 1.


The latest explosion, said to have been caused by a hydrogen build-up, injured 11

people, one of them seriously. Soon afterwards, the government said a

third reactor at the plant had lost its cooling system, reports BBC.

Water levels were now falling at reactor 2, which is to be doused with sea water, said government spokesman Yukio **SEE PAGE 13 COL 5**

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
