# Time, cost increase but road remains unfinished

Seven years into start, the Roads and Highways Department (RHD) in Bogra is yet to complete land acquisition for construction of a 2.64 km road to ease communication between Shaheed Ziaur Rahman Medical College and Bogra.

Began on July 1 in 2003,

the Tk 13.70 crore task styled 'Shaheed Ziaur Rahman Medical College Connecting Road project' was supposed to complete within four years.

Meantime, problem in land acquisition and delay in project implementation has added Tk 11 crore to the estimated cost despite dras-Mohammed Ali Hospital in tic reduction from the amount of original work under the project.

Admitting the matter, Md Moniruzzman, executive engineer of RHD Bogra Division, said, "Project Implementation Committee (PEC) advised us to submit a fresh Revised Development Project Proposal (RDPP) to the ministry concerned. We have submitted the RDPP to the ministry through proper channel according to meeting reference of PEC on January 6."

"The project is likely to restart within April this year if the revised proposal gets approval in time. Meanwhile we have completed 15 percent of total construction work, mostly earth work," said Md Rashedul Alam, sub-divisional engineer of Bogra RHD.

"We are expecting that the project will be complete by June 2012 according to RDPP," said Md Abul

Hossain Pramanik, superintending engineer of RHD Bogra Circle.

Originally the project comprised construction of a 4.5 km road at a cost of Tk 13 crore but later the RHD authority cut the project size, reducing the road

Still the RHD has to bear additional Tk 11 crore as the estimated cost has risen to Tk24.70 crore.

According to RDPP, 2.90 hectares of land is required to construct the 2.64 km road but only 1.37 hectares of land has been acquired during the last seven years, RHD sources said.

"I have to cover additional two kilometres to reach Shaheed Ziaur Rahman Medical College from Satmatha area. The new road is needed for a risk free journey and easy excess to the college premises," said Md Shiplu Mahi, 28, a three-wheeler driver.

## BCC ignores court order, continues demolition

Barisal City Corporation (BCC) has demolished the boundary wall of a private house and cut down trees on its two decimal of land for expansion of a road and construction of a drain, violating court order.

The property belongs to the family of Prof AFM Abdul Moin, a teacher of management department of Dhaka University.

Talking to this correspondent, Moin said they filed a writ petition with the High Court on February 15 after the city corporation damaged a portion of the boundary wall to occupy their land without giving prior notice and compensation.

Upon the writ petition, the HC ordered status quo and served a show cause notice on the BCC, giving it a four-week time.

As the BCC demolished the boundary wall and chopped the trees on the land, ignoring the high court order on February 26, the land owners filed a contempt of court petition with the Additional District Magistrate's Court, Barisal, on March 3.

The BCC had continued its drain construction and road expansion work even after filing of the contempt petition, the victims alleged.

Contacted, BCC Executive Engineer Abdul Motaleb acknowledged demolishing boundary wall and cutting down trees on the private land for construction of a drain and expansion of a city road. He, however, said they stopped work on receiving the court order on March 10.

# Boy killed; shops, houses gutted Kid killed as spear

A schoolboy was killed while 43 shops and 7 houses were gutted in separate incidents of fire on Sunday and Saturday.

A schoolboy died and his father sustained injuries in a fire at Dakkhin Patuapara in Natore town early Sunday, reports our correspondent.

Police and fire brigade sources said the fire originated from an electric short circuit at the house of one Abdus Salam at about 2:00am and soon engulfed the entire house.

An 11-year-old boy fell victim to a clash between two rival groups of villagers on Saturday. Babu, a class three stu-

dent of Sajanpur Government Primary School and son of Abdus Sattar of Sajanpur Gachtala village under Nikli upazila died as he was watching the clash in front of his house.

Ten other villagers were also injured in the clash.

## Ban on vessel service on risky routes starts

The seven-month-long restriction on plying of water vessels, including launches and trawlers, on risky four routes touching 23 stations in the danger zone of Meghna River estuary and coastal areas, will be effective from today.

The ban, without an arrangement of alternative transportation will confine a large number of people to islands and endanger their lives because of travel by unsafe small transports.

Acknowledging this, deputy director of Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA) Kazi Wakil Newaz yesterday said, the ban on plying passenger transports without saving lives of the travellers.

The 210-day restriction was imposed first by the sea transportation directorate on June 18, 2000 on 3000 kilometer routes touching major stations like Shabajpur, Mozuchowdhurir Hat, Daulatkhan, Mirzakalu, Char Alexander, Serajganj Shashiganj, Betua, Aslampur, Buriabon, Barguna, Patharghata, Baro Machuakati on Meghna, Ilisha, Kocha, Baleswar, Bishkhali, Tentulia and Bura Gourango.
