Repatriation at stake

IOM runs out of fund; 7,000 Bangladeshis still wait to be flown in

Repatriation of thousands of stranded migrant workers, including Bangladeshis, may be suspended temporarily from Saturday for shortage of funds, high-ups of International Organisation for Migration (IOM) in Geneva and in Tunisia said yesterday.

If the repatriation halts, nearly 7,000 Bangladeshis will be left in uncertainty at Choucha camp, according to aid workers.

The IOM has been overseeing repatriation of stranded Bangladeshis ON TUNISIA-LIBYA BORDER

from the Djerba international airport. Their number came down to 7,000 from 15,000 over the last one week.

Although fewer in number, Bangladeshi migrants are entering Choucha from Libya every day.

"Over the last ten days as we continued repatriating thousands of people, we warned the international

community about our rapidly diminishing funds and asked for more money for the operation," said Jean Philippe Chauzy, chief spokesperson of IOM in Geneva.

"There has not been any response from anyone so far. We really do not want to stop this momentum of repatriation, but we are forced to," **SEE PAGE 13 COL 5**
