Gooch calls for the title

The former England captain enjoyed a dis-ICC Cricket World Cup tinguished and lengthy career as an opening batsman, helping win a couple of Ashes series and posting the Test record score at Lord's of 333 against India in 1990.

failed as a player and win the World Cup.

But he also became the answer to a somewhat unkind quiz question: name the one England player who appeared in all

three of their losing World Cup finals in three different decades? "Winning a World Cup didn't happen for me," said Gooch, beaten in finals against the West Indies (1979), Australia (1987) and Pakistan (1992).

"I hope this team have got it within them to win the World Cup -- and I'm convinced they have," added Gooch, brought back into the national set-up by head coach Andy Flower.

Gooch said it was England's spirit that had impressed him most in a see-saw group phase where they tied with India and beat South Africa yet lost to both Ireland and Bangladesh.

They also came back from the brink of defeat against the West Indies in a match they had to win to reach the quarterfinals.

"They've come through this first stage of the competition, shown their fighting qualities and their resilience," added Gooch.

"We can get better, and if we do we have as good a chance as anyone else.

"The objective was to get into the knockout stages. We've made that; we've scraped through. We're not going to look back; we're going to look forward to the next challenge."

That sees England facing Sri Lanka in the last eight on the co-hosts' own turf in Colombo on Saturday.

Sri Lanka, who boast dynamic batsmen in Tillakaratne Dilshan and captain Kumar Sangakkara, as well as slingshot seamer Lasith Malinga and off-spinner Muttiah Muralidaran, have been tipped to repeat their 1996 World Cup triumph.



'Conditions will favour NZ'

New Zealand wicketkeeper Brendon McCullum believes his side will benefit from play-ICC Cricket World Cup ing their World Cup quarterfinal in Dhaka despite

recent painful defeats in the city. The Black Caps take on formidable South Africa on Friday at the Sher-e-Bangla stadium, the same venue where they crashed to a 4-0 series defeat at the hands of Bangla-

desh in October last year. But McCullum said the experience gained on that trip will hold New Zealand in good stead.

"It's a real positive for us," the 29-year-old said. "We have some good knowledge about the conditions in Dhaka and it will help us playing against South Africa in those conditions.

"They would probably have wanted some pace and bounce in the wicket, but they won't

get that. It is not a bad draw for us at all."

New Zealand failed to negotiate the Bangladeshi spinners on turning wickets in last year's series, but the pitches prepared at the Sher-e-Bangla stadium for the World Cup are more sporting.

McCullum dismissed suggestions that South Africa tended to choke in crunch matches, which would make it easier for the Black Caps.

"No, not really," he said. "From our point of view we should just focus on what we can achieve rather than focus on the opposition. If we can control that, hopefully South Africa will fall by the wayside.

"They have got a good bunch of players, but we will obviously have to focus on guys like Kallis, de Villiers, Morkel and Steyn.

"But I would like us to focus on what we can achieve over the next few days and get ready to give ourselves the best opportunity to win this game."

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
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Chelsea climbed above Manchester City into third

place in the Premier League after David Luiz's late goal inspired a 2-0 win on Sunday.

Luiz sunk City with 12 minutes to play at Stamford Bridge and Ramires added a second goal in stoppage time as Carlo Ancelotti's side moved one point ahead of Roberto Mancini's men.


The Blues are also nine points behind leaders Manchester United with a game in hand.

In Sunday's other game, Dirk Kuyt scored a controversial penalty as Liverpool bounced back from their Europa League exit with a 2-0 win at 10-man Sunderland.

Chelsea's clash with City was a meeting between the two most expensively assembled squads in Premier League history, with over £500 million lavished on star players by both clubs' billionaire owners.

For long periods of a scrappy encounter, there was little reason to believe the

money had been well spent. City suffered a blow before kick off when Carlos
