## Aiming to entertain

Germany coach Joachim Loew can draw on a fully-fit squad on Saturday as the World Cup semifinalists seek to maintain an unbeaten record against

minnows Kazakhstan in a Euro 2012 home qualifier.

With Bayern Munich stars Mario Gomez, Bastian Schweinsteiger and Miroslav Klose as well as Real Madrid playmaker Mesut Ozil at Germany's disposal, the aim is not only to win, but to please the fans, said Loew sidekick Oliver Bierhoff. "We are the clear favourites and we want

all three points. But we also want the fans in the stadium to get their money's worth. We've got a strong side here and want to impress the crowd with a good performance," he said.

"Of course the opposition are not exactly household names, so we've been concentrating on our own game in training and not on Kazakhstan," he added.

Germany are overwhelming favourites to beat lowly Kazakhstan, ranked 132 in the world. They have carried all before them so far in Group A, winning four out of four, scoring 13 goals and conceding only one.

They head into the game at the Fritz-Walter Stadium, home to Bundesliga club Kaiserslautern, in tremendous form, not having lost since the World Cup semi-final to Spain in July.

In contrast, Kazakhstan have lost all four of their qualifying games for Euro 2012, scoring none and letting in 10.

In the match in Astana in October, Germany won 3-0 courtesy of second-half goals from Klose, Gomez and Lukas Podolski.

"Of course, I only know a few players from Kazakhstan," admitted 26-year-old Schweinsteiger ahead of the match.

"But the next three qualifying matches are very important for us. We can really get ahead of Austria, Turkey and Belgium," he added, referring to Germany's main rivals in Group A.

Austria are five points behind Loew's side but with a game in hand. They play away against Turkey, who are currently third in the group.

Klose added: "We've got a lot of quality. If we play the football we are capable of, we'll win. If we get an early goal, then we can look at a big win."

The striker looks set to get the nod over club rival Mario Gomez, who has edged him out at club level. "It's a completely normal competitive

situation. Mario is a world-class player. He fits well into our club team at the moment and me in the national team." Klose said he was hoping to add to his

tally of 59 goals for his country as he chases Gerd Mueller's all-time German goalscoring record of 68.

"It is my goal to break this record, but I would never compare myself to Gerd Mueller," said Klose.

#### Bangladesh fail to qualify

Bangladesh's hope of qualifying for the finals of the AFC Challenge Cup has been shattered after suffering a 3-0 defeat to Philippines in their last group match of the qualifiers at the Aung Stadium in Yangon, Myanmai yesterday.

It was a must win match for Bangladesh against the Philippines with all four teams of Group A still in the race. When hosts Myanmar suffered a 3-1 defeat to eventual group champions Palestine, it needed only a draw to take Bangladesh through as group runner-up.

Bangladesh finished third in the group with three points, two more than fourth-placed Myanmar while Palestine and Philippines qualified for next year's final with seven and five points respectively.

According to a report from Bangladesh Football Federation, the charges of Robert Rubcic failed to keep the momentum of their win over Myanmar, conceding in the 40th minute with forward Ian Araneta putting Philippines ahead.

Midfielder Aldeguer Angel doubled Philippines' lead through a low header eight minutes into the second half before scoring his second and team's third in the 79th minute to seal the

# Injuries ravage Irish



Ireland coach Giovanni Trapattoni's options have never been less plentiful as he leads his team into Saturday's 'must-win' Euro 2012 Group B qualifier at home to Macedonia.

The veteran Italian has always claimed his Ireland side could compete with any team in world football -- provided he had his front line players available.

But even before his pared back squad gathered in Dublin on Monday, he had some major absentees.

Manchester City goalkeeper Shay Given missed out on his 111th cap through injury, while Manchester United utility man John O'Shea will need to wait to win his 70th.

Skipper Robbie Keane is hopeful of starting the game up front alongside Kevin Doyle, despite barely playing over the past month and being well short of optimum match fitness.

Trapattoni's preferred 4-4-2 formation is likely to be employed once again, as the hosts try to push Macedonia out of the equation in what is a tight qualifying group.

Ireland head into the game joint second, with seven points from four games, the same tally as Armenia and Slovakia. Russia, with nine points from four, top the table.

Having already lost at home to Russia, in October, Ireland cannot afford to drop any more points at home, and so Trapattoni is likely to stick with some tried and trusted players when he names his starting XI.

Damien Duff and Aiden McGeady will resist pressure from other options on the wings, while Sean St Ledger is likely to join Richard Dunne in the central defensive pairing, although Darren O'Dea could yet play if the Preston defender fails to prove his fitness.

Kevin Foley, of Wolves, should win his first competitive start at right back following the injury to O'Shea -- and the withdrawal of Everton's Seamus Coleman from the squad on Thursday.

The main decision remains to be made at left back where Kevin Kilbane, now of Huddersfield, is eyeing a 65th consecutive competitive international, while Ciaran Clark of Aston Villa is hoping for just his second appearance.

"I feel very fit, I've played about 20 games since I went to Huddersfield, full games, so I've got to be happy with that," offered Kilbane.

"There would be a symmetry of sorts if Kilbane didn't feature on Saturday -- the last time he wasn't in an Irish competitive fixture was 1999, when Ireland played Macedonia.

Coventry City's Keiren Westwood will make a competitive debut in goal, and goalkeeping coach Alan Kelly insists he's

ready for the challenge. "I just look back to the (friendly) games against Algeria and Paraguay last year and he (Westwood) acquitted himself very, very well," he said.

"He has just got to take what he has done in those two games in the summer and the five caps he has got and transfer that into this game coming up. He has been superb and I have no reason to think that won't continue."

# Eng face Wales test

England travel to Wales for a vital Euro 2012 qualifier on Saturday with Fabio Capello knowing only a win will do after a public relations blunder that has hurt

the Italian manager's credibility. Capello's decision to reinstate John Terry

as captain would have been controversial at the best of times -- but the clumsy way in which it was announced has substantially raised the stakes as England head to Cardiff. Trailing Montenegro by three points,

England have little margin for error following last October's dismal 0-0 draw at Wembley with the Group Gleaders. A defeat against Wales, who are bottom of

the group after losing all three of their matches, and the calls for Capello's dismissal may become deafening. Publicly, England's players have all

voiced support for the move to restore the armband to Terry, who was sacked last year after lurid allegations about his relationship with the ex-girlfriend of team-mate Wayne Bridge.

Privately, however, there is reported to be unhappiness at the treatment of Rio Ferdinand, a popular figure in the England dressing room who learnt of Terry's return as captain via a newspaper report.

Capello, who only last year said Terry would never captain England again while he remained in charge, said he changed his mind after seeing the armband moved between several players in last month's friendly against Denmark.

The Italian also believes the expected

intimidating atmosphere at the Millennium Stadium will require an experienced cap-"Wales will be a tough game. The atmo-

sphere, everything is incredible, and we need a captain with a big personality, a leader," Capello said. "When John played without the

armband, he was every time a leader. He is the biggest personality in the dressing room. "He made mistakes but is normal. The

players respect Terry as a leader, absolutely. One year's punishment is enough." Terry, meanwhile, has responded to the furore over his return with typical defiance, stating without the merest hint of contrition

that he still firmly believed he should never have lost the job in the first place. "As I said to the manager at the time, I accepted their decision. It doesn't mean to say I agreed with it, and I never will. That's

est with them," Terry said. "Over the last year I'd like to think I've personally kept my head down and done the right thing."

Terry also responded to suggestions that his reinstatement had split the England dressing room by stating that the squad was behind him whilst acknowledging he was "not everyone's cup of tea."

"When the manager confronted the team on the training pitch, he asked the players if they had any questions and nobody spoke. Nobody said a word to the manager, nobody said a word to me," Terry told reporters on Tuesday.

"I'm not going to be everybody's cup of tea, but it is the decision the manager has taken.

The man-of-the-match, however, was Jacob Oram who took a stunning catch on the boundary to get rid of Kallis, aside from taking four wickets to speed the Proteas' demise.

But Sangakkara was confident that these four would stand up when needed, something

they've done at various times in the past. "I think our middle-order is very good. I think they are the best players in Sri Lanka. Some of them are equal to the best players in

the world. It is hard to judge a middle-order when they only get to bat 5-10 overs. We are not only confident in ourselves but on each other's ability. (Thilan) Samaraweera, Chamara Silva, Angelo Matthews and (Chamara) Kapugedera are the best players and they've done it against the best opposition in the world. They'll keep doing that for us as we go along," he explained.

Bayern Munich said Friday that veteran Jupp Heynckes is set to replace Louis van Gaal at the end of the season for a third stint coaching the Bundesliga giants.

"We are very happy to have agreed a two-year contract," club president Karl-Heinz Rummenigge said. "I am convinced that our cooperation with Jupp Heynckes will be successful."

Heynckes, 65, won two league titles with Bayern between 1987 and 1991, then took over again for five games at the end of the 2009 season. He also won the Champions League with Real Madrid in 1998.

Heynckes, who is leaving Bayer Leverkusen at the end of the season, said he was looking forward to his comeback. "Quite apart from my

good personal relations with bosses at Bayern I have always been very impressed with how professionally the club is run," the silverhaired German said.

And with the speed that Bayern have got through coaches in recent years,

Heynckes said he knew what he was letting himself in for,


