Many other fleeing Bangladeshis told stories of how female nurses were detained while on their way to the Tunisia border.

"We were heading for Tunisia on a microbus with four Bangladeshi women in the back seats," said Taher, from Sylhet.

"At one of the check posts an armed man asked the women out of the vehicle and started interrogating them...As the women tried to plea, several armed men asked the driver to drive on," he added.

Since they were nurses, they were not permitted to leave, the driver told Taher.

Salauddin said when nurses submitted their resignations to their authorities recently, they were summoned to a hall room where an armed army man asked who wanted to go.

The women were so terrified of the army that they kept quiet.

According to medical aid workers in Choucha camp, Libya has been largely dependent on migrant workers almost in every sector. With thousands of this workforce leaving, the country has come to a standstill. The turmoil is causing deaths and injuries throughout the country every day. If Bangladeshi nurses and

doctors are allowed to go home, their hospitals would face severe shortage of manpower.

An official of Bangladesh mission in Tripoli, who is now in Djerba, said they had heard from scores of Bangladeshi nurses, medical assistants and doctors of being barred from leaving the hospital compounds.

Many of them kept telephoning the embassy, Ahsan Kibria, first secretary (Labour) of Bangladesh embassy, told The Daily Star yesterday.

"They told me there was a ban on their movement and therefore, they were passing days in extreme anxiety," he added.

"I obtained cell phone numbers of several nurses and doctors but was unable to find network. The fleeing migrant workers told me that loyalists of Gaddafi were controlling the mobile phone network."

The Libyan ministry of health recruited hundreds of these staff for its medical workforce over the last two years.

"There are about 500 Bangladeshi female nurses and hundreds of medical staff working in hospitals across Libya," noted Kibria.

Stranded workers in Choucha told this correspondent that Libyan forces shot dead a number of female Bangladeshis when they were trying to flee the country. The Daily Star, however, could not independently confirm the news

Sad old 'debate'

"Millions of people elected you and they cannot accept the behaviour you displayed and the language you used in parliament [on March 4, 2010], "Hamid said.

AL senior lawmaker Fazle Rabbi on March 5 last year said, "I feel ashamed of giving my identity as a lawmaker."

The just concluded session strongly demonstrated that the situation did not improve; rather it has been deteriorated to some extent. Upset by the use of indecent and vulgar words in the House, the speaker on last Sunday said senior lawmakers should feel embarrassed about fellow parliamentarians, who use indecent words in their speeches.

If the culture does not improve, it will continue to prevent many MPs who possess the qualities from debating well with their parliamentary knowledge. If it is so, how the parliamentary practice will be healthy, contributing to strengthening parliamentary democ-

To end this unhealthy culture, leaders of both the benches must take steps to rein in their MPs who use abusive and vulgar languages. The Speaker will have to exercise his ample authority to stop it. He will have to take punitive measures, if needed, for unruly behaviour of an MP as only expunging those vulgar and indecent words from the House proceedings did not contribute

Thousands crowd central London in budget protest

Tens of thousands of mostly peaceful demonstrators streamed into central London on Saturday to march against government budget cuts, with a small breakaway group smashing its way into a bank, breaking windows and spray painting logos on the walls.

Another group of blackclad protesters hurled paint bombs and ammonia-filled light bulbs at police.

Organizers of the march estimated that at least 250,000 people from across the country were peacefully joining in the demonstration, the biggest protest in London since a series of rallies against the Iraq war in 2003. Police said they were not giving out crowd estimates.

They said one group of a few hundred people broke away from the main march, scuffling with police officers and attempting to smash shop windows on two of London's main shopping streets. Others threw objects at the posh Ritz Hotel in nearby Piccadilly. At least one person was arrested for carrying equipment that could cause criminal damage, police said.

Another group pulled a giant model of a Trojan horse and said they planned to burn it.

But, the protests otherwise had a carnival feel School teachers, nurses and students all marched through central London toward Hyde Park, one of London's biggest public gardens, with banners, balloons and whistles.

Britain is facing 80 billion pounds (\$130 billion) of public spending cuts from Prime Minister David Cameron's coalition government as it struggles to get the country's large budget deficit under control. The government has already raised sales tax, but Britons are bracing for deep cuts on services.

The TUC union says it believes the cuts will threaten the country's economic recovery, and has urged the government to create new taxes for banks and to close loopholes that allow some companies to pay less tax.

In the order, the magistrate said complainant of the case Ratan Chandra Sarkar was served several notices to appear before the court to testify whether the CID report was true.

The plaintiff, however, did not appear. So the final report was accepted and all the accused in the case were cleared of the charge, the magistrate said.

According to the prosecutor, hired goons led by employees of Bashundhara Housing Project swooped on the residents of Amdiartek on November 16, 2006 in a bid to grab their lands. Several people were injured in the incident. Manik succumbed to his injuries that day.

CID Inspector ABM Zakir Hossain, also the investigation officer (IO) of the case, on November 3 last year submitted the final report finding no evidence to press charges against the accused.

In the probe report the IO said he and nine of his colleagues had investigated the case and tried to find out the facts. They did not find any evidence against Shah Alam and the others and further investigation would not be much fruitful. So he submitted the final report clearing all the accused of the murder charge, the IO added.

Victim's brother Ratan Chandra filed the murder case against Shah Alam and several others with Badda Police Station. Police arrested

15 people in this connection. On August 23 last year, Shah Alam, a fugitive for long, surrendered before a Dhaka court and obtained bail in

According to witnesses, the number of injured was around 20.

MA Kuddus, officer-incharge of Ramna Police Station, told The Daily Star that they resorted to firing rubber bullets and hurling teargas canisters to take the situation under control.

in the first semifinal on March 29 while India and Pakistan will face off in the second semis in Mohali the following day.

The opening partnership took the home side to 231 runs in 39.3 overs in reply to England's 229-6 in 50 overs on the occasion of the 100th ODI at the venue. The win meant Sri Lanka's fourth time in the last four, their first being at the 1996 World Cup which they lifted. For England, it would be fifth time unlucky as they have remained outside the semifinals since the 1992 tournament.

Both Dilshan and Tharanga (though suffering from severe cramps) reached centuries in the end, stamping their authority over a powerless England attack that finally succumbed to fatigue and looked short of ideas. It was Dilshan's 10th ODI

hundred while Tharanga reached his eleventh with a cracking cover drive off Tim Bresnan. It was England's third ten-wicket defeat to Sri Lanka but their first in World Cups as they bowed out having entertained everyone in the first round. The no-nonsense

Dilshan was at his marauding best, hammering eight boundaries and two brilliantly hit sixes off James Tredwell and Swann in his 115-ball 108. He mostly banked on his trusted stand-and-deliver method, cutting and driving on the up and hitting some very well-timed boundaries. The left-handed Tharanga accumulated a half-century too, hitting twelve boundaries and a six in his 112-ball 102, a huge straight one off Swann.

The pair had earlier done this same job in their 282run opening wicket stand against Zimbabwe in Pallekelle during the first round, hitting centuries and sharing a 200-run opening stand.

Dilshan earlier took 1-25 from his six overs, opening the bowling and batting for the first time in his ODI career. He is, interestingly, now the seventh spinner to open the bowling and then open with the bat in oneday cricket after Wasim Raja, Mark Waugh, Virender Sehwag, Chris Gayle, John Davison and Mohammad Hafeez.

England looked flat with the white ball in hand with none of their key bowlers being given a whiff of a wicket. Off-spinner Graeme Swann, their main bowler, was kept at bay with some wily strokeplay, while Bresnan and the rest remained toothless, slowly drawing close to England's thrilling World Cup cam-

paign. "We were thoroughly outplayed. We didn't get a good start with the bat, not a fine finish as well and then our bowling fell flat," said England skipper Andrew Strauss after the game.

England's innings, after they decided to bat first on a slow surface, was built around Jonathan Trott's steady 86 off 115 balls, the right-hander playing the anchor role properly once again after early wickets jolted their progress. Trott added 64 for the

third wicket with the confident Ravi Bopara, though the duo's running left a few hearts to flutter in the England dressing room. Bopara made 31 before he fell to a straight one from Muttiah Muralidaran, the leg-before decision staying in favour of Sri Lanka despite the review. Trott then found an even abler ally in Eoin Morgan. The duo who did a similar job against Bangladesh in Chittagong only two weeks ago, added 91 for the fourth wicket in quick time as England gained advantage going into the final ten overs.

Morgan, who made 50 off 55 balls with four boundaries, was dropped thrice by the home side. After Thilan Samareera put him down at the deep cover boundary in the 32nd over, Morgan got two lives in three balls when first, he was dropped at deep cover once again and then Angelo Matthews spilled a low chance much to the great spinner's cha-

Morgan also survived a close leg-before shout to Lasith Malinga but at the other end, Trott hardly offered a chance. Only two boundaries in his essay, Trott was the master accumulator once again as he notched up his fifth half-century matching Yuvraj Singh and moving on top of the top scorers' list in the tournament with 422 Sri Lanka's bowling was a

steady effort as they began well with Malinga, Dilshan and Matthews before the spin trio of Muralidaran, Ajantha Mendis and Rangana Herath got into the act, though with varied levels of success. Muralidaran picked up two wickets (Bopara and Trott) but Mendis was only economical, giving away just 34 runs from his ten overs, picking up the wicket of Graeme Swann (sent at No 6 during the futile batting Powerplay).

In fact England lost out on a better score by taking the last Powerplay a few overs early as they immediately lost Morgan and Swann, picking up just 23 runs in the five-over spell. SCOREBOARD
