BAD REVIEWS!

It was a bad first three hours for anyone at the ground going for the Umpires' Decision Review System, and an even worse one for the player who didn't bother to take it.

First it was Rangana Herath in the 16th over when he reviewed a leg-before decision. Ravi Bopara survived as it was an on-field call, the flighted ball more than 2.5m down and 49% of it hitting leg.

Bopara's request for the review, in the 27th over saw him being turned down after the umpire had originally given it out. He missed a sweep off Muttiah Muralidaran but the ball pitched in line and was dead set to hit the middle-stump.

One would imagine that confidence in technology would have evaporated completely. Kumar Sangakkara proved it when in the 37th over, Lasith Malinga's appeal was turned down. Nobody went for the review whereas the replays clearly showed that it was indeed out.

MILESTONE AT THE PREMADASA

It was a double whammy at the R Premadasa Stadium in Colombo yesterday as apart from hosting possibly the most important match on Sri Lankan soil, it also became only the fourth ground in the world to host at least 100 ODIs.

The Premadasa Stadium, previously known as the Khettarama Stadium, joined Sharjah Cricket Association Stadium (200), Sydney Cricket Ground (138) and Melbourne Cricket Ground (132) in the list with the Harare Sports Club ground waiting in the wings on 94 matches.

Established in 1986 and named after the country's former president, the 35,000-plus Premadasa Stadium has been a lucky venue for Sanath Jayasuriya (most runs - 2,514) and Muttiah Muralidaran (most wickets 73).

3,000 AND NOT MUCH MORE

Oram wins back critics

knocked South Africa out of the World Cup with the much-criticised Jacob Oram the match hero.

The quarterfinal in Dhaka was played only hours after the injuryprone Oram had told journalists he deliberately avoided listening to talk radio in New Zealand because he was aware he was the target of vehement criticism.

"I don't need the negativity around me," the 32-year-old said.

"If I have a bad innings or a bad stretch of games I know what's going wrong and I don't need to be actually know me."

But, after months of criticism, Oram was hailed as a hero after his match-winning four for 39 and sensational pair of catches as New Zealand pulled off a dramatic 49-run win over South Africa to qualify for the semifinals.

Radio Sport host Doug Golightly

led the praise for the man he had constantly referred to as "Jake the fake," acknowledging the tall allrounder's performance was pivotal to the outcome. As South Africa cruised towards

Ricky leaves it to selectors

Captain Ricky Ponting said Saturday his fate was in the hands of the selectors after Australia's shattering early exit from the World Cup. Ponting, whose captaincy has been under

attack since Australia's Ashes series debacle against England in January, scored a fighting 104 but it was not enough to prevent India from knocking the champions out in Wednesday's quarterfinal in Ahmedabad.

Australia's greatest Test run-scorer has endured a torrid time and a majority of cricket fans, according to newspaper polls, want him to step down as team leader in a rebuilding

Ponting, 36, confirmed in his column in the Australian newspaper Saturday that he has played in his last World Cup and that his immediate playing future was up to the discretion of the national selectors.

"I was asked before the quarterfinal and at the media conference immediately after if I was retiring. I am not,"

Ponting wrote in his column. "It is my intention to keep playing cricket, I might not be the best judge of what my contribution to Australian

cricket is. "There are a panel of selectors who have that job and I am happy to accept their judgment."

Ponting said his focus now was on what was best for

Australian cricket. "We need to rally together to review all aspects that have

contributed to our performances over the past six months," he said. "There will be casualties and change come out of this (Cricket Australia) review but I am also confident it

will highlight a number of programs, structures and people that remain the best or very close to the best in the world. "Building on our strengths while working hard on our

weaknesses will ensure that we are in the best possible shape to win back the World Cup in 2015 as well as the Ashes and other major trophies in the years ahead."

Ponting said he was "shattered" at Australia's earliest exit from the World Cup since 1992.

"In some ways we performed to expectations in this World Cup. People did not expect us to win and we didn't,' he said.

"It is fair to say that we need to examine our performances in depth and begin to plan for the future.

"A clear-the-decks policy is fraught with danger. Young players need to be nurtured and the best way for that to be done is with senior guys around them.

"It's been a difficult six months for us with the disappointing result in the Ashes and now this early exit from the World Cup."



Spain, Dutch stay perfect

France, World Cup finalists Holland and Italy all picked up away wins in

Friday qualify-

ing matches for the 2012 European Championships - while David Villa's predatory qualities rescued world champions Spain as they beat the Czech Republic.

France beat tiny Luxembourg 2-0 to continue their resurrection under new boss Laurent Blanc after a catastrophic World Cup under predecessor Raymond Domenech.

Philippe Mexes and Yoann Gourcuff were the men on target in either half and the win means France now lead opening day Group D conquerors Belarus by four points - having played a game more - after posting a sixth win on the trot to all but erase the traumas of the World Cup.

Italy meanwhile thanked Brazilian-born Thiago Motta for a typically gritty 1-0 win in Slovenia while Villa became Spain's all-time top marksman with a late brace - one from the penalty spot - to floor the Czechs 2-1 in Grenada after Jaroslav Plasil had broken the deadlock. Spain roared back and Villa

claimed his 45th and 46th goals for La Furia Roja in quick succession to surpass Raul in the goalscoring charts. Raul scored his 44 goals in 102

matches but Villa has outdone him in just 72 appearances.

Spain, for whom Villa's Barcelona teammate Xavi won his

100th cap, are romping through Group I with four wins in as many matches for a six-point cushion over the Czechs.

Motta, in only his second game for the Italians, netted with 17 minutes remaining in Ljubljana, ensuring the Azzurri took charge of Group C. Slovenia managed few

attempts on goal and much of the hosts' passion could be seen not on the pitch but in the stands as supporters of rival outfits Maribor and Olimpia Ljubljana fought amongst themselves before kick-off.

With Serbia coming from behind to edge out battling Northern Ireland 2-1 in Belgrade, unbeaten Italy are now six points

Northern Ireland looked set to cause a stir at the Serbs' expense when Gareth McAuley headed the visitors into the lead from Chris Brunt's free-kick in the 15th minute for his second international goal.

But Marko Pantelic levelled 20 minutes after the break and Zoran Tosic then scored a neat winner after a surging run by Milos Ninkovic with 16 minutes remaining at a practically empty Red Star Stadium.

Serbia had to play the match behind closed doors after crowd trouble marred their match against Italy last year.

World Cup finalists Holland are going well in Group E, and made it five wins out of five in outclassing second-placed Hungary 4-0 in Budapest.

Rafael van der Vaart bagged the opener after just eight minutes and Ibrahim Afellay made it 2-0 on the stroke of half-time before Dirk Kuyt and Robin van Persie

wrapped up a one-sided affair.

Belgium were another side who pulled out a win on their travels with a 2-0 success at Austria in Group A, where Germany are five points clear ahead of Saturday's home banker against Kazakhstan.

Axel Witsel scored both the Red Devils' goals as the Belgians went joint second with the Austrians. World champions Spain - three

wins out of three and ten goals scored to date to lead Group I were hosting the Czech Republic in Friday's late match in Granada.

Joining Germany in action Saturday are Fabio Capello's England, who travel to Wales looking to overhaul Montenegro in Group G.
