Caretaker to get JS fix

Constitution amendment body readies proposals to plug loopholes in the system

The parliamentary special committee on constitutional amendment is mulling some proposals for specifying the terms and conditions for caretaker governments, including limiting their tenure for a maximum of 90 days.

Since introduction in 1996, caretaker governments held office for four terms.

A caretaker government takes over state power after an elected parliament is dissolved at the end of its tenure. An interim government's main task is to give all possible aid and assistance to the Election Commission (EC) for holding a

parliamentary election peacefully, fairly and impartially. And it is the EC's constitutional responsibility to hold a general election within 90 days of a parliament's dissolution. The interim regime hands over power to a newly elected government.

The last caretaker government led by Fakhruddin Ahmed however ended up holding state power for around two years claiming that the interim regime did not have any specific tenure as the EC had failed to hold a parliamentary election within the stipulated 90 days of the last parliament's dissolution.



Hasina sought int'l help after mutiny

She phoned Pranab, states US cable leaked by WikiLeaks

After the 2009 BDR mutiny, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina had telephoned India's External Affairs Minister Pranab Mukherjee requesting assistance from the international community, The Hindu reported citing a leaked US embassy cable.

Though Hasina had not been specific about the kind of help she needed, Pranab had offered "to be responsive" if needed and the Indian government had also rallied London, Beijing and Tokyo to support the cause, the article published yesterday said.

Nirupama Subramanian wrote that US Embassy Charge d'Affaires Steven White was surprised when he was called in for a meeting with Foreign Secretary Shivshankar Menon on the last weekend of February 2009.

That "unusual Saturday meeting" was to discuss the mutiny by troopers of the Bangladesh Rifles a couple of days earlier,

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
