A group exhibition of masks by 20 contemporary artists, titled "Mukh O Mukhosh -3", is on at Galleri Kaya, Uttara in Dhaka. The exhibition is unique in its innovative themes, techniques and mediums. The exhibition bears the personal hallmarks and creative perspectives of the artists.

The exhibition features a variety of 80 masks, created by 20 renowned and upcoming artists. Masks have been used since ancient times for both ritualistic and everyday purposes. They are a familiar and vibrant element in many folk and traditional pageants, ceremonies, festivals and traditions. A mask reveals many aspects of a society. Maskmaking continues to be popular in our country and

masks on walls or rampart at homes enhance the artistic splendour of the premises.

The masks at the exhibition have been fashioned out of metal, fabric, glass, paper and pigment, wood, plaster, fibreglass, saw dust and papier-mâché etc. The styles are primitive, tribal, modern, ancient African, Asiatic and at times, unfamiliar. They are not identical and each expresses a unique look.

The face is the most visible part of the human body and it can express the language of the mind vividly. In creating so many faces from different perspectives, Bhabesh Chandra Malakar, Tarun Ghosh, Goutam Chakraborty, Faruk Ahamad and Pintu Chandra Dev, in particular have demonstrated their unrivalled creativity. The masks on display express longing, bliss, woes and jubilation. Some masks appear realistic, while some abstract and semi-abstract. 

# Black Swan Controversy

Natalie herself did most of the dancing, insist filmmakers

A claim by Natalie Portman's ballet double from the movie "Black Swan" alleging that the Oscar-winning actress did not perform the majority of that film's dance sequences has quickly been challenged. Sarah Lane, the American Ballet Theatre soloist who doubled for Portman during some of that film's most difficult dance sequences, told Entertainment Weekly that the Oscarwinning actress did only 5 percent "of the full body shots" in the film. But the filmmakers insist that simply isn't the case, saying in a joint statement released by Fox Searchlight, "We were fortunate to have Sarah there to cover the more complicated dance sequences and we have nothing but praise for the hard work she did. However, Natalie herself did most of the dancing featured

in the final film." Lane decided to speak out after a recent story in the Los Angeles Times quoted Portman's fiancé and "Black


Swan" choreographer Benjamin Millipied saying "85 percent of that movie is Natalie." "They wanted to cre ate this idea in people's minds that Natalie was some kind of prodigy or so

gifted in dance and really worked so hard to make herself a ballerina in a year and a half for the movie, basically because of the Oscar," Lane told EW. "It is demeaning to the profession and not just to me. I've been doing this for 22 years... Can you become a concert pianist in a year and a half, even if you're a movie star?"

In interviews, Portman didn't hide the fact that she had used a body double for key sequences in the film. "I do have a double for the complicated turning stuff," Portman told EW last November. "It was not anything I ever could have done in a year, nothing I could've caught up with. But I think it was just better for all of us if I did as much as
