A three-day-old newborn boy was stolen from Midford Hospital in the city yesterday.

The mother Salma Begum, 25, a resident of Dhupkhola in the city's Gendaria, told The Daily Star that she was admitted to the hospital's labour ward and gave birth on Saturday.

Salma said her mother Khodeza Begum took the baby for vaccination to the hospital's outdoor section around 1:00pm yesterday.

A burqa-clad (a garment covering the entire body) woman offered to hold the baby while Khodeza bought the ticket for vaccination. When Khodeza finished buying the ticket, she could not find the woman, said Salma.

Officer-in-Charge Md Salauddin Khan of Kotwali Police Station said the hospital authorities informed police and they are conducting an investigation.

**Anti-women fanatics
terrifying people**

Indigenous women in CHT still deprived

Speakers tell discussion

Rights of indigenous women in Chittagong Hill Tracts (CHT) area are not established as the CHT peace accord was not properly implemented, speakers observed at a discussion yesterday.

They said a separate chapter should be included in National Women Development Policy for the empowerment and development of indigenous women and also should have seats reserved for them in parliament

The discussion on CHT peace accord and development of indigenous women in CHT was held at RC Majumder auditorium of Dhaka University organised by Hill Women's Federation.

Zobaeda Nasrin of anthropology department of Dhaka University said the issue of development of indigenous women is not included in the five year plan or the policy.

Forty years has passed since independence but attitude toward women, especially indigenous, has not changed at all, she said.


She said incidents of rape of indigenous women by army men and settler Bangalees are state-sponsored incidents, which cannot be compared to ones taking place in the plain lands of the country.

Shaktipada Tripura, organising secretary of Parbatya Chattagram Jana Sanghati Samity (PCJSS), said it would be hard to establish rights of indigenous women if country does not establish women's rights first.

Even though women have been heading governments in the country for a long time, it is very unfortunate that women's rights are still to be established, he said.

Bidhayak Chakma, a PCJSS member, said not only army men and settlers but also their own communities suppress indigenous women.

Chanchana Chakma, the federation's organising secretary, presented a keynote paper at the discussion, chaired by Srijoni Tripura, the federation's Dhaka City unit convenor.

against bigots**

Duta urges govt

Dhaka University Teachers' Association (Duta) has urged the government to take action against those who are creating unrest and anarchy in the society opposing the National Women Development Policy 2011.

The urge was made at a meeting held at Dhaka University (DU) Club Bhaban on Saturday evening, with Duta president Dr Anwar Hossain in the chair.

DU teachers expressed worries that some religious fanatics are creating disorder in the country propagating false, confusing, and pointless information against the policy.

Protesting the conspiracies and misdeeds by the bigots, they also called upon people from all strata of society to resist the anti-women religious groups.

More support to Yunus

Leading economist Esther Duflo and Khan Academy founder Salman Khan have joined an international effort to stand by Nobel laureate Prof Muhammad Yunus.

They both joined the Friends of Grameen, an international platform formed to promote microcredit, social business and Grameen Bank, as the vice president of its executive committee.

Duflo, the Abdul Latif Jameel Professor of Poverty Alleviation and Development Economics in the Department of Economics at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Boston, USA, said: "What is at stake is not one person, Prof Yunus, but his legacy to the global poverty alleviation policy."

She said microfinance is under political strain in several countries, and its very survival may be at stake. "For the sake of Grameen's eight million shareholders, but also of the more than 150 microfinance beneficiaries worldwide, Yunus must be overseeing a management transition at Grameen Bank without political interferences."

Bangladeshi-origin Salman Khan said, "As someone with deep Bangladeshi roots, I can see wherever I travel the damage created to

Bangladesh's image with what is going on with Grameen Bank and Prof Yunus."

"The current situation does not appear to be helpful to anyone. Grameen Bank and Prof Yunus are our best ambassadors and have inspired millions around the world. Bangladesh should use them to continue to bring more positive change to the country," said Khan, whose father is from Bangladesh.

Their comments came as the Supreme Court yesterday pushed back to today the hearing on the appeal filed by Prof Yunus challenging the central bank decision to relieve him of the post of managing director of Grameen. Support continues to mount for Yunus, who has been relieved of the post last month, both at home and abroad.

On Sunday, a solidarity rally in support of Prof Yunus and Grameen Bank was held in front of Jatiya Press Club in the city where papers with signatures of 37 lakh Grameen borrowers defending the Nobel laureate were put on display. Los Angeles Bangladeshi community formed a human chain in front of the Bangladesh Consulate on the first day of April demanding for justice.
