## Woman detained for 'torturing' domestic help

Police yesterday detained a woman from the city's Kathalbagan for an allegation of torturing female house help.

Police said they held Sathi Mandal, 28, a nurse of a private hospital, from a house at Free School Street of the area who tortured domestic help Maya Roy, 45, of her sister Surovi Mandal's house. Sathi used to stay there.

SI of Kolabagan Police Station Sariful Islam said acting on a tip off, they conducted a raid at the house and rescued Maya with injuries in her head.

Police admitted the victim to One Stop Crisis Centre (OCC) of Dhaka Medical College Hospital.

## Two brokers jailed for cheating

A mobile court yesterday sentenced two brokers to four months on charges of pocketing money from two BRTA service seekers preparing forged documents of Bangladesh Road Transport Corporation (BRTA).

The arrestees Tusher Ahmed and Mohammad Arif are members of an organised gang of brokers.

A team of Rab-4 arrested them from the premises of Mirpur BRTA office on request from BRTA officials with whom the two cheated service seekers lodged complaints recently.

Kazi Babla Sharif, one of the complainants, said he gave Tk. 13,000 to Arif in July last year for transfer of ownership of a private car he bought, his job was not done. Rather the cheat demanded Tk 3,000 more from him recently.

## Trial of Mir Kashem begins

Trial in the tax evasion case against Jamaat-e-Islami leader Mir Kashem Ali began yesterday at a Dhaka court with deposition of complainant.

Judge Mohammad Zohurul Haque of the Senior Special Judge's Court recorded statement of complainant Mohammad Moniruzzaman, deputy tax commissioner of the National Board of Revenue (NBR).

Later Kashem's lawyer crossed the complainant partly and submitted a petition seeking adjournment of the hearing.

The court fixed May 9 for the next hearing. The Jamaat leader, also an executive member of its central committee, was present during the hearing.

Earlier on March 23, the same court framed charge against Mir Kashem and fixed yesterday for trial of the case.

NBR filed the case on August 19 last year against Kashem saying that he evaded Tk 11,28,235 in income tax on Tk 34,85,866 earned through Keari Limited as its chairman and director. It also states that Kashem repeatedly misinformed NBR about his actual income.

After the hearing, the court issued an arrest warrant against the Jamaat leader for committing such offence.

Kashem surrendered before the High Court (HC) on August 22 seeking an ad-interim bail. The HC then granted him bail for six months or till submission of the police report.

## Akkharananda's death condoled

Shamprodaikota Jongibad Birodh Mancha in a statement also condoled his death.

## 2 youths held for offering bribes to police

Police arrested them as they failed to show documents and for offering Tk 15,000 to make a deal. The police also recovered Tk 10,000 from their possession.

Police filed a case in this connection.

## Khaleda tells Rajapaksa

## Regional meet on migrant workers begins

Coordination of Action Research on Aids and Mobility (CARAM) yesterday expressed concern over the government decision to send large number of women migrant workers as domestic workers to Saudi Arabia a country that has seen increasing cases of abuse and rights violations.

CARAM, an international NGO, raised the concerns at the two-day long 4th regional consultative meeting on Asian contractual migrant workers held in the city yesterday as a part of the Colombo Process, says a press release.

Also, Human Rights Watch, Migrant Forum in Asia, and Refugee and Migratory Movements Research Unit jointly organised a press conference on the occasion at the National Press Club in the city.

At the conference, Nisha Varia, senior women's rights researcher at Human Rights

Watch, said migrant worker abuses often take place due to information gaps, poor coordination, and job competition.

Therefore, the Dhaka meeting where different country representatives will sit around the table and address these problems together will prove helpful, she said.

The International Organisation for Migration (IOM) provides technical support to the Colombo Process and serves as its secretariat.

The countries attending the Colombo Process include Afghanistan, Bangladesh, China, India, Indonesia, Nepal, Pakistan, the Philippines, Sri Lanka, Thailand, and Vietnam.

Eight observer members will represent the countries of employment namely Bahrain, Italy, Kuwait, Malaysia, Qatar, South Korea, Saudi Arabia, and the United Arab Emirates.
