UNFPA help assured

Nobuko Horibe, regional director, Bangkok of UNFPA, stressed the need for united work to save life of women in reducing child and maternal mortality as per the target of Millennium Development Goals (MDGs).

She was speaking at a roundtable discussion at a city hotel yesterday.

She mentioned that revitalising the national family plan-

ning programme, particularly focusing on hard to reach population, the poorest segments and increased economic opportunities for women are the key factors in further fertility decline in Bangladesh. Expressing her satisfaction over the achievement of Bangladesh in reducing child and maternal mortality from 322/100,000 to 194/100,000 live births, the regional director also said that UNFPA would continue support to the government and the people in sustaining the past successes of the programme. Maternal mortality could be cut by nearly three-quarters

by improving women's access to comprehensive reproductive health services, including family planning and strategies to prevent abortion-related complications, within the broader context of efforts to promote human rights, poverty reduction and gender equality, said Arthur Erken, UNFPA Representative, Bangladesh. Maternal mortality still needs to decline by 25 percent to

achieve the MDG-5 target of 143 deaths per 100,000 live births by 2015, which is now 194 per 100,000 live births, said Dr Ubaidur Rob, Country Director, Population Council.

Prof Nurun Nabi of the department of Population Sciences of Dhaka University, Dr Quamrun Nahar, Dr Noor Mohammad and Dr Zafarulla Khan attended the discussion among others.

The budget allocation in primary education and health sectors is inadequate though it is claimed that these two sectors get priority, said a study.

The study on the state of government-run primary education and health services conducted by the Sushasaner Jonno Procharavijan (Supro), an NGO, said it is the responsibility of the government to ensure people's access to these sectors.

In the current fiscal, budget allocation for education sector is Tk 18,402 crore (13.9 percent of total budget) while the health sector has got Tk 8,147 (6.2 percent of the total budget) which is inadequate for development of these sectors, said the study.

It also said common people are being deprived of services as they are not aware of information about the government's initiatives and facilities available in these public services.

Lack of transparency and accountability in effective use of the allocated budget is a key reason behind the poor condition of the two sectors, claimed the study which was revealed at a view-exchange meeting at Cirdap in the capital yesterday.

The study revealed that there is a scarcity of manpower in district hospitals, upazila health complexes and union health centres.

It said most of the cases, the patients purchase drugs from outsides while the officials concerned said the listed medicine for the hospitals are not sufficient to face the demand.

In primary education, the study found that 56.58 percent respondents think all school-aged children take admission to the schools while 43.43 The study suggested increasing percent think that all school-aged

schools.

For ensuring quality health services, the study provides a set of recommendations include appointing doctors in union health complexes, effective monitoring, proper distribution of medicines in government hospitals and updating citizen's charter and list of drugs.

The recommendations for primary education include setting up at least one school in every village, providing lunch, scholarship and other facilities to the children in Char areas, ensuring 1:30 proportion of teacher and student, establishing necessary classrooms and other infrastructures, providing salaries and allowance to teachers

Road accidents kill 11, injure 11

Eleven people were killed and 11 others injured in road accidents in the country vesterday.

The accidents took place in Dhaka, Benapole, Gopalganj, Chittagong, Kishoreganj, Thakurgaon and Chapainawabganj.

Our staff correspondent reports: At least five people were killed in separate road accidents in the city yesterday.

Ria Akter, 20, a worker of Al-Muslim Garments at Malibagh, was run over by a bus around 7:50am while she was about to reach her place of work.

Soon after the accident, locals as well as her fellow workers vandalised at least

seven vehicles in the area, police said. The body was sent to Dhaka Medical

Meanwhile, another factory worker, Hossain Ahmed, 23, was run over by a bus in Kadomtoli area around 10:30am.
