Unveiling the polls plan at a press conference at the EC Secretariat, Chief Election Commissioner ATM Shamsul Huda said the EC will leave no stone unturned to hold the polls in a free and fair manner.

"Magistrates and law enforcement agencies will be asked to take action against people, irrespective of their party affiliations, if they are found involved in creating trouble in the elections, Shamsul Huda said.

By holding the phase-2 of the polls to 3,813 out of total 4,505 union parishads, the EC will complete the over-due elections to the lowest tier of the local government.

In phase-1, elections to 568 union parishads were held between March 29 and April 3 in a largely peaceful manner.

The last elections to the union parishads, held between January and March of 2003, was marked by violence and vote rigging. Polls violence left over 80 people dead then.

Before announcing the schedule for phase-2 of the polls, the EC yesterday held a meeting with senior officials of different law enforcement agencies so that they can ensure peaceful atmosphere conducive to the polls. According to the sched-

ule, applying for candidature to returning officers will be done between May 5 and June 9. Scrutiny of those applications will be done between May 7 and June 11 and withdrawals of candidacies have to be completed between May 15 and June 19.

An EC document said deputy commissioners, superintendents of police and district polling officers, if necessary, in consultation with the upazila nirbahi officers, upazila election officers and officers-in-charge of police stations would fix the election day and date for other stages of the polls.

Ballot casting in all union parishads, fit for election, in an upazila will be held in one day, the EC

The document said there will be a 30-day gap between the date for filing applications seeking candidature and election day. The election officials were asked to keep two days for scrutinising applications.

Candidates most likely would be able to withdraw candidature 15 days ahead of election day.

After the dateline for withdrawal ends, candidates are likely to get 13 days for electioneering before election day.

approached in Dhaka today with the request to urgently provide flights to bring back the increasing number of Bangladesh nationals gathering at Al Salloum since the last three days," says the Official sources said the

government wanted to share the cost of chartered flights, as was the case of 113 previous flights chartered by the The Bangladesh govern-

ment has asked the IOM to arrange flights to bring back Bangladeshis from Al Salloum in Egypt and the IOM are looking into it, a spokesperson of IOM in Dhaka told The Daily Star yesterday. He said they have evacuated more than 1,000 Bangladeshis from Misrata and took them to Benghazi in the last four days.

About 850 Bangladeshis have crossed over into Egypt through Al Salloum border in the last three days, they added.

The consular team, which has been supporting the stranded Bangladeshis for nearly two months, is being strengthened with more staff support from the Bangladesh embassy in Cairo.

The situation is under control, reported the team adding, it will issue one-way travel permits to those without any passport.

While 222 Bangladeshis have been awaiting repatriation at Ras Jdir border in Tunisia, some 19 more crossed over on Monday.

According to official statistics, a total of 35,211 Bangladeshis have been repatriated so far. Of them, respective employers arranged trips for 3,845 persons while 27,101 more returned under the coordination of IOM.

Besides, some expatriates came back on their own arrangements.

In response to a writ petition, a vacation bench of the HC also issued a rule upon the government to explain within four weeks why its inaction to make the report public should not be declared illegal.

The bench also asked the government to explain why it should not be directed to take legal action against the people or companies responsible for the share market crash.

The court also asked the government to explain why it should not be directed to recover the money from the share market and return it to the accounts of the affected investors.

Mohammad Ziaul Karim and Justice ANM Bashirullah passed the order and issued the rule following the writ by Human Rights and Peace for Bangladesh (HRPB).

On behalf of the HRPB, five lawyers -- Asaduzzaman Siddiqui, Sarwar Ahad, Aklas Uddin Bhuiyan, Mahabubur Rahman Khan and Mahabubul Islam -- filed the writ as public interest litigation challenging the govern-

ment's inaction to make the investigation report public.

The petitioners also prayed to the court to direct the government to seize passports and freeze the accounts of the individuals or companies responsible for market manipulation until a fullyfledged investigation is made.

Petitioner's counsel Advocate Manzill Murshid said the government is bound to publish the investigation report as per the Right to Information Act as thousands of people had invested in the share market.

Around 1.5 crore people have been affected due to the disaster, he said, adding that people will be misled if the report is not published and if action is not taken against the liable persons.

Advocate Dr Kazi Aktar Hamid argued for Bangladesh Thai Aluminium Ltd saying that his client has submitted an application to the government to review and examine the investigation report.

If the investigation report is published, the review process will be hampered, he said.
