

Little cheers for school bus service

Three months into its operation the special school bus service is losing both passengers and money casting a shadow over the prospects of its extension across the capital city.

Introduced on January 16, the experimental 14-bus service of Bangladesh Road Transport Corporation (BRTC) is now limited to only one route: Mirpur-11 to Azimpur via Mirpur-1 and Kalyanpur.

With the launching of the service the BRTC had hoped to wean car-riding students on to the public transport and thus help ease the city's notorious traffic congestions. It also hoped to extend the service to other routes provided the experiment proves a success.

The response so far is not going the BRTC's way.

Students from car-owning families cold shoulder the special school bus service. It is being used largely by students from low-income families who use public transport. **SEE PAGE 6 COL 5**

2001 Post-Polls Violence

Focus on serious crimes

Offences include 3,270 rapes, 355 murders by BNP-Jamaat cadres; probe report handed over to govt

The judicial commission probing the 2001post-polls violence has found evidence of over 3,625 incidents of major crime including killing, rape, arson and looting by cadres of the then ruling BNP-Jamaat alliance in 15 months since October that year.

"The commission considered a total of 3,625 major offences. Of these, 355 are politically motivated murders while 3,270 are incidents of rape, arson, looting and such other atrocities," said Monwar Hossain, membersecretary of the commission, while handing over the report to Home Minister Sahara Khatun yesterday.

The 1,078-page report has five parts describing atrocities committed in Rajshahi, Khulna, Chittagong, Sylhet, Barisal, Bhola, Mymensingh, Jhalokathi, Jessore and other areas of the country.

The report was not made public yesterday.

4 cops in soup

Court orders their arrest for filing false case

A Dhaka court yesterday cancelled bail and issued arrest warrants against four police officials in a case filed for falsely implicating and torturing a Dhaka University student for the attempt on Prof Humayun Azad's life.

The cops are the then officer-in-charge Mahbubur Rahman, sub-inspectors Rezaul Karim and Naser Ali of Ramna Police Station, and sergeant Anwar Hossain, who was in-charge of Nilkhet Police Box.

Third Additional Chief Metropolitan Magistrate Mohammad Ali Hussain also framed charges against the police officials, now on bail, and fixed July 25 for trial of the case.

The defendants were not present at the court during the hearing and no prayer was submitted on behalf of them.

Mohammad Abu Abbas Bhuiyan, complainant of the case and a student of Political Science department of DU,
