Review body wants GB to take over Grameen Telecom

A government committee's recommendation that Grameen Bank take over the ownership of Grameen Telecom that holds over 34 percent share in Grameenphone is: unrealistic and has no legal basis, said legal and telecom experts yesterday.

The committee, appointed by the government to review the management structure and activities of Grameen Bank, in its report also said it must be ensured that the microlender has ownership in Grameen Telecom so that its borrowers can benefit directly from the telecom operations.

Grameen gets clean chit Talks invitation

The committee thinks the fund has not been used for any dishonest purpose, said finance ministry officials, quoting the review report submitted to Finance Minister AMA Muhith yesterday.

It gives Grameen Bank a clean chit for the second time after the Norwegian government cleared clouds over the issue by saying the fund had not been used for unintended . purposes.

In an instant reaction, Grameen Bank expressed satisfaction over the report's findings on two pressing issues: the handling of the fund and microcredit interest rates.

The committee, headed by Prof AK Monaw-war Uddin · Ahmad, gave details of the formations and present status · of Grameen Bank and 48 other associated organisations, in the report.

Huji hideout busted

Over 200 minority women raped

Probe finds links of several top BNP-Jamaat leaders

Over 200 minority women were gang raped allegedly by the then ruling BNP-Jamaat alliance cadres in 15 months since October 2001, finds the judicial commission probing the 2001 post-polls violence.

The barbarous act was intended to force them to leave the country. They were, in the eyes of the culprits, enemies as they voted for Awami League, said commission sources.

The commission has also found involvement of some BNP and Jamaat leaders in the oppression on minorities and Awami League workers.

Of the BNP leaders, the commission named Salauddin Quader Chowdhury, Abdul Wadud of Khagrachhari, Joynal Abedin, also known as VP Joynal of Feni, Nadim Mostafa, HM Selim of Bagerhat, Maulana Shakhawat Hossain of Keshabpur in Jessore, Abdus Sobhan of Pabna while the Jamaat leaders are Maulana Matiur Rahman Nizami and Abu

Taher of Comilla.

On Sunday, some other commission sources told The Daily Star that Delwar Hossain Sayedee, Altaf Hossain Chowdhury, Maj (retd) Hafiz Uddin Ahmed, Ruhul Quddus Talukdar Dulu, Hafiz Ibrahim and Zahir Uddin Swapan were among the leaders of the then government who led the oppression.

Talking about some incidents in Bhola, commission sources said Maj (retd) Hafiz Uddin Ahmed and his men picked up one of their rivals and shot him dead.

In another incident, Hafiz and his men tore off clothes of another rival and forced him walk around a local market.

Family members of the deceased and witnesses of the killing incidents gave depositions to the commission. Some people also appeared before the commission with witnesses of the atrocity and

brutality they faced. Hafiz, however, refuted the allegations and challenged the commission.

11 killed in Cox's Bazar

Gunfight, mob-beating leave 10 robbers, 1 villager dead

Ten robbers were killed in gunfights with police and mob beating in Cox's Bazar yesterday.

A villager was also killed in the exchange of fire between the gang and the police that left at least 21 others including four policemen bullet-hit. The robbers carrying guns and sharp

weapons also attacked villagers who chased them.

The series of incidents started at

Ratnapalong village in Ukhia upazila around 2:30am as a gang of 23 dacoits looted valuables from four houses, police Of the dacoits, six were killed in firing

while trying to escape a police dragnet and four were beaten to death by villagers. The dead were suspected as Rohingya

refugees, Cox's Bazar Superintendent of Police Nibash Chandra Majhi told The Daily Star.
