Newlycrowned Germans champions Borussia Dortmund are **BUNDES** hoping to keep

hold of their homegrown stars after their young guns dominated the season under the guidance of coach Jurgen Klopp. Dortmund's 2-0 win over

Nuremberg on Saturday handed Borussia their seventh German league title and puts Klopp's team in the Champions League having led the Bundesliga since October. Their eight-point lead means

they can not be caught with two games left. In the Ruhr valley city, 100,000

fans partied into the early hours of Sunday morning to celebrate their first title since 2002. But some of the happiest

Dortmund fans had been celebrating on the pitch.

Teenage midfielder Mario Goetze, 18, is the son of a professor at Dortmund's technical university while fellow Germany teammate Kevin Grosskreutz, 22, is a Borussia fan who was watching from the terraces just two seasons ago. "It's an outstanding feeling to

achieve this with my club in the city where I was born," beamed Grosskreutz. "Two years ago, I was still on

the south terrace and went as a fan to the away games. This is amazing." He certainly allowed the suc-

cess to go to his head.

Having vowed last October to skip the barbers until Dortmund were German champions, Grosskreutz allowed himself to be shaved bald on the pitch in front of 80,000 fans once his side were confirmed title winners.

In just his third season in charge, the team Klopp assembled suddenly came of age with Turkey midfielder Nuri Sahin and rising Germany star Goetze helping produce some eye-catching football.

The results have been impressive as previous champions Bayern Munich were beaten both home and away while only Bayer Leverkusen posed a serious threat to Dortmund's domination of the league.

The squad was assembled with an annual budget of 35

Barcelona coach e Guardiol a says his

team's weekend defeat by Real Sociedad was a timely warning ahead of Tuesday's second leg of their Champions League semifinal with Real Madrid, who they lead

Last week they came out on top in a stormy first leg in Madrid that was characterised more by cynical challenges and play-acting than on-pitch excitement.

Billed as a contest between the free-flowing football of Barca and the more direct approach of Real, it turned into a stop-start affair. Pepe, deployed as a

defensive midfielder by coach Jose Mourinho, was controversially dismissed after Barcelona full-back Dani Alves over-reacted to a challenge by the Portuguese international.

Barcelona's substitute goalkeeper Jose Pinto had earlier been given a red card for his part in a scuffle at halftime and Mourinho himself was sent to the stands after venting his fury at the referee.

It was an ugly encounter, with both coaches playing their part in the unsavoury spectacle.

In the pre-match press conference Guardiola lost his cool, saying that Mourinho had won the battle of words but that he was ready to meet

Real on the pitch. After the match at the Bernabeu, an aggrieved Mourinho suggested that European governing body UEFA favoured Barca and

due to their promotion of the humanitarian charity Unicef.

The game's saving grace was the performance of Lionel Messi, who scored a double, the second being an excellent run where he slalomed through the heart of the Real defence before slottingpast keeper Iker Casillas.

Barca are now in the driving seat to win a league and Champions League double, with an eight-point lead in La Liga after both they and Real surprisingly lost at the weekend.

Milan owe it to Silvio

With Milan needing just a single draw from their three remaining games -- or for Inter Milan to fail to win all of theirs -- to be crowned scudetto kings, club official Adriano Galliani was quick to remind fans who the true hero of the show has been.

Not coach Massimiliano Allegri, who has delivered the title in his first season in charge, and indeed only his third in the top flight.

Nor star forward Zlatan Ibrahimovic, whose vital goals and assists in the first half of the season propelled the team to the league summit. According to Galliani it's all thanks to

club president and colourful Italy Prime Minister Silvio Berlusconi. "We said right from the start that our objective was the title and we confirmed that

with our January signings," said Galliani. "The team owes a lot to Silvio Berlusconi and the fans need to know that without his financial commitment we'd never have closed the gap to Inter."

Having signed Ibrahimovic, Robinho and Kevin-Prince Boateng in the close season and added Antonio

Cassano in January, Galliani would seem to have a point.

That is a group who could easily fetch more than 100 million euros in transfer fees but Milan forked out about

eight million euros for the four players. Take Ibrahimovic: just a year earlier he moved to Barcelona from Inter for 50 million euros and Samuel Eto'o (whose value must be considered to be at least 25 million euros).

> Twelve months on and Milan snapped him up for a mere 24 million euros and zero up front.

> Robinho arrived from Manchester City on a similar deal: 18 million euros -- less than half what City paid Real Madrid for him two years earlier -- to be paid over three installments.

> Then there was Boateng. Milan convinced Genoa to buy him from Portsmouth and send him out on loan with the promise that Milan will pay a higher fee for him at the end of the year.

And Cassano, widely regarded as Italy's greatest natural talent, was prised from Sampdoria for a one third share of the five million euro sell-on fee due to his previous club Real.

It's a trend of financial dealing that Berlusconi has exploited in recent years.

Andrei Shevchenko was sold to Chelsea for 30 million pounds in 2006 and then loaned backfor a season for free two years later. Then there was Kaka. In January 2009 Berlusconi

accepted a bid of more than 100 million pounds from Manchester City for the Brazilian.
