Stradivarius

of Nimtoli

THE first time I saw him was at the 2008 Chawk Eid Fair. A crowd of kids surrounded him, enchanted by his violin playing. A bag full of single-string bamboo violins rested on the ground. After he finished, his admirers lined up to buy the violins.

I ran into him again at the Muharram Fair in Azimpur this year. He told me his name: Babu Mia. He was, again, busy selling and invited me to visit his house. “Go to Nimtoli and ask anyone for the Violin Man (Behala-wallah). They will show you where I live.”

A few weeks later, finding myself in Nimtoli, I asked around. Sure enough, I was led to a six-story building. Babu Mia opened the door and led me to the third-floor flat he shared with his family.

Before I could say anything, he had an announcement. “After forty years, I have stopped making violins.”

“Why?” I asked, taken aback.

“I am getting older. My six working sons insist that I don’t work anymore. I stopped a month ago. My sons will provide for me,” he replied.

Where did he learn to make those violins? From his father, Bacchu Mia. The violins are made from *Muli Baash*, a type of bamboo, and steel wire. Most months he easily sold a thousand violins all over Bangladesh.

I did a quick mental calculation. In his career, he had sold close to half a million violins!

“How much did you sell them for?”

“When I started they were two Paisa

each. Last year I sold them for ten Taka. But now the raw material costs twenty Taka, and people don’t want to pay so much for a child’s violin.”

“What songs sell most violins?” I asked.

“That depends. In villages they prefer old movie songs like *Rupban*. Bashir Ahmed’s song *Jare Jabi Jodi Ja* is also popular. City folks prefer more modern songs like Habib’s.”

He said it takes him 1-2 weeks to pick up a new song.

Babu Mia hails from Dhaka. His father owned a family home near Nimtoli, but lost it following some financial trouble. His older brother, Monu Mia, is also in the violin business. So are Monu Mia’s sons.

But Babu Mia’s sons have not entered the family business.

I asked him about his health. He got up and returned with a stack of medical reports. I squinted trying to decipher the doctor’s writing, then gave up. Helpfully, Babu Mia said he was mostly fine except for a problem in his kidney.

At the second offer of tea, I took my leave. As I walked away, I was reminded of the Stradivari family of Italy. They made violins in the 1600-1700s which are now worth millions. Stradivarius violins have been the subject of much research and speculation. And here was our local violin-maker who had made and sold half a million units. So maybe he is not Stradivarius, but he has surely made his contribution to music.

Dhaka, Delhi on good track

Says Indian Vice President Ansari

Wrapping up his Dhaka visit, Vice President Md Hamid Ansari yesterday said all parties in Bangladesh appeared to be committed to a bilateral relationship with India.

"I had a meeting this morning (yesterday) with Leader of the Opposition Khaleda Zia. I think on all sides, the commitment to a bilateral relationship is clearly there," Ansari said on his way to New Delhi.

In a reply to a question from journalists on the stand of BNP, he said the opposition too talks of having better relations with India.

Ansari said he had "good conversations" with Bangladesh Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina and Foreign Minister Dipu Moni.

"I think the basic impression I go back with is that the commitment to developing certain bilateral relationship in all fields is vibrant on both sides."

Both India and Bangladesh were on "good track" in developing their bilateral relations, he said.

"A lot of things are happening in bilateral relationship. Visit of ministers (to Dhaka) have taken place. Things are on the track. The vehicle is not in the first gear, it has moved into second gear and beyond second gear.

"In some areas, it has gone into top gear and in some areas it is in second gear. But the vehicle is moving steady," Ansari said.

He said the talks revolved around core issues of communication and connectivity, water-sharing, and people crossing the international border without proper procedure and documentation. "We have no major political issues."

Public opinion in Bangladesh, according to Ansari, is evolving and more and more people are beginning to understand the benefits of cooperation and connectivity between the two countries.

He said public opinion automatically gets translated into government policy.

Ansari said the cost of disharmony among neighbouring countries is "very high" and "unproductive".

The Indian Vice President, who had gone to Dhaka to jointly launch yearlong celebrations to mark the 150th birth anniversary of poet Rabindranath Tagore, said neighbours have only two options -- either to live in harmony or disharmony.

"...as neighbours, there are only two ways. Either you live in peace, harmony, and cooperation or you live with disharmony. Everybody understands the cost of disharmony is very high and unproductive."

Road crashes

kill 5, injure 11

Five people were killed and 11 others injured in separate road accidents in Manikganj, Pabna, Brahmanbaria and Noakhali on Thursday and yesterday.

Our Manikganj correspondent reports: A motorcyclist was killed and two others were injured as the motorcycle collided head-on with a microbus on Dhaka-Aricha high way at Muljan on Thursday evening.

The victim was identified as Mohammad Sohel, 24, son of Abdul Mannan of Gilondo village of Manikganj Sadar upazila. He was student of BBA of American International University in Bangladesh (AIUB).

The injured were admitted to Manikganj Sadar Hospital.

Our Pabna correspondent reports: A man was killed and five others were injured as a Dhaka-bound bus hit a Nasiman, locally made three-wheeler, on Dhaka-Pabna highway at Madhpur on Thursday.

The deceased is identified as Nizam Uddin, 42, son of Ezem Uddin, of village Manikdir of Sujanagar upazila.

The injured were admitted to Pabna Medical College Hospital.

Our Brahmanbaria correspondent says: A woman was killed as a speeding bus knocked her down while she was crossing Brahmanbaria bypass road at Modhyapara village yesterday.

The deceased was identified as Halima, 48, of Poyrtala village.

After the accident agitating locals blocked the road for an hour and damaged vehicles.

Police arrested the driver and helper of the bus.

BSS from Noakhali adds: Two people were killed and four others injured on Lazimipur-Chaumuhani road at Banglabazar under Begumganj upazila yesterday.

The deceased were identified as Narayan Chandra Malakar, 62 and Binda Rani, 65, of Khilpara village in Chatkhil upazilla.

The accident occurred when a speedy pick-up collided head-on with a CNG-run auto-rickshaw, leaving two people dead on the spot.

The injured were admitted to Noakhali General Hospital.

Three bodies authorised to deal with realtors

The government has empowered municipal bodies, cantonment boards, and national housing authority (NHA) to work as the line authorities for giving approval of real estate developers in respective areas.

According to a notification issued by the ministry of housing and public works, these bodies would be entrusted to register and serve other activities for streamlining real state developers and their projects in line with section 4 of the Real Estate Development and Management Act, 2010, official sources said yesterday.

However, Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha (Rajuk), Chittagong Development Authority (CDA), Rajshahi Unnayan Kartripakkha (RUA), and Khulna Unnayan Kartripakkha (KUA) will remain the concerned authorities for the capital Dhaka and three other major cities -- Chittagong, Rajshahi, and Khulna -- in this regard.

The NHA, would cover all areas across the country except some designated areas including Rajuk, CDA, RDA and KDA, city corporation areas in Dhaka, Sylhet and Barisal and all municipalities, Cox's Bazar district and Latachapli, Gongamoti, Kuarchar and Charchapali mouzas under Kalapara upazila in
