

Syrian forces launch deadly raid on hotbed city

Opposition proposes election, US warns of more steps

Syrian forces raided the hotbed city of Baniyas yesterday and killed at least three protesters, activists said as President Bashar al-Assad's opponents proposed he offer elections to end the crisis.

Activists spoke of dozens of tanks and armoured vehicles entering Baniyas, on the northwestern Mediterranean coast, from three directions as electricity and communications were cut. Tanks also encircled the nearby town of Baida.

Six people were killed yesterday as Syrian army troops raided the northern port of Baniyas, including four women protesters demanding the release of people who had been arrested, activists said.

Another two people were killed and

several others wounded in Baniyas, where the army has been carrying out a military operation since dawn, a spokesman for the London-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights told AFP by phone.

The rights activists said residents of Baniyas formed human chains in a desperate bid to halt the military operation when it began around dawn.

Heavy gunfire was heard in Baniyas's south, a seaside sector of the city where most of the protesters live, while navy boats patrolled offshore, the activists said, reached by telephone from Nicosia.

The military confirmed it conducted an operation in Baniyas.

An Internet-based Syrian opposition group, meanwhile, proposed that Syria's embattled president offer to hold elections in six months in order to bring to an

end the crisis that has engulfed his country for more than seven weeks.

In a statement posted online, it told Assad he could be the "pride of contemporary Syria" if he transformed Syria "from a dictatorship to a democracy."

"The Syrians will be grateful and it is possible to do."

Rights groups said 26 protesters were shot dead by security forces on Friday while the military said 10 soldiers and policemen were killed in Homs by "armed terrorist groups."

The United States warned it would take "additional steps" against Syria if it continues its brutal crackdown on protesters, a week after imposing tough sanctions on the Arab nation.

It also welcomed the European Union's decision to impose sanctions on Syrian officials "responsible for human rights abuses."

Ministry oblivious, okays import

farm in Tripura, reported Associated Press on February 20.

A country can be declared "free of bird flu" only if it remains free of the disease for three consecutive months, according to regulations of Food and Agriculture Organisation and WOA.

Since India suffered a bird flu outbreak in February, it is still not safe to import poultry products from there, said a virologist of World Health

Organisation.

On April 26, Nabin Traders and Faria Enterprise Ltd obtained permissions to import one crore pieces of hatching eggs and day-old chicks respectively from India and other countries.

Their permissions will remain valid till August 31, say the documents signed by Abu Siddique Sarder, deputy secretary of the food ministry.

The permissions were given on condition that the products will have to be imported from a bird-flu-

free country. So there is nothing to be afraid of, Joint Secretary Shawkat Ali Waresi of the commerce ministry told The Daily Star.

An importer would not be able to import those from India if the Indian government does not certify their exporters. Moreover, if the Bangladesh customs is not convinced with that certificate, they would not allow those into the country, he added.

The official noted they do not have any information

about any recent bird flu outbreak in India.

The ministry cannot permit the importers without clearance from livestock department, claimed sources in the department adding it did not authorise any import from India in the last one year.

According to a gazette notification of 2010, the livestock department is the authority to give permission for importing hatching eggs and chicks, said Saidur Rahman Babu, general secretary of Breeders' Association of Bangladesh.

Minister for Fisheries and Livestock Abdul Latif Biswas did not know anything about the permission, mentioned the leader quoting the minister.

Leaders of the association met the livestock minister and published advertisements in different newspapers urging the government not to allow import of eggs and chicks from India.

A recent FAO report titled "Approaches to Controlling, Preventing and Eliminating H5N1 Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza in Endemic Countries" said eliminating the H5N1 avian influenza virus from poultry in six countries will take ten or more years.

The virus remains firmly entrenched in Bangladesh, China, Egypt, India, Indonesia and Vietnam, stated the report.

Despite repeated efforts to reach the two importers Faria Enterprise Ltd and Nabin Traders over the phone, The Daily Star failed to know their stand on the matter.

[during the Liberation War] from the government and the people of India can never be forgotten by the people of Bangladesh.

"The courage, the spirit of sacrifice, the spirit of the people of India particularly the visionary leadership of Indira Gandhi who announced her recognition of Bangladesh as an independent and sovereign nation even before the war ended can perhaps never be fully reciprocated by the people of Bangladesh," he said.

Referring to Tagore's message of peace and harmony, he said Bangladesh firmly believes that the subcontinent must get free from the scourge of terrorism and extremism to develop and achieve peace, prosperity and stability.

In this regard, the government of Sheikh Hasina

has launched an uncompromising fight against terrorism, extremism and militancy.

Khandker said the joint celebration of Tagore's birth anniversary commemoration underscores the cultural and social bond shared by the two countries. India and Bangladesh share a history of struggle against colonisation and exploitation.

Indian Prime Minister Manmohan Singh, in his address, said he was delighted when the Bangladesh prime minister last year agreed to jointly celebrate the occasion in a befitting manner.

"Government of India has decided to institute a prestigious international award in the name of Rabindranath Tagore to recognise very distinguished contributions

towards the promotion of international brotherhood and fraternity," he said while inaugurating the function.

A jury headed by the prime minister will select each year from across the globe a citizen of outstanding public eminence whose work "epitomises the high universal ideals that Tagore stood for."

The first award, he hoped, would be presented by the end of the commemoration period.

Singh said a wide range of projects are being undertaken as part of the anniversary celebration to make Tagore's work more accessible to a wider audience and to preserve those for posterity.

"I can think of no more important task than the revival of Visva Bharati. As a chancellor of the university, I am personally committed to

this important task."

The Indian prime minister said a special grant of Rs 95 crore would be given to the university "which stands as a living symbol of the poet's enduring faith in the learning ability and creative power of the young mind and free spirit."

Congress President Sonia Gandhi, who released a volume of Tagore's paintings at the function, said the Nobel laureate's message of unity through diversity is all the more pertinent today while some forces mistake uniformity for unity and find themselves uncomfortable with the diversity of our country.

She said India and Bangladesh celebrating Tagore's birth anniversary together signifies the ever-lasting bond that the poet has created across the nations' boundaries.

Iraqi foreign exchange shop attacks kill 6

Gunmen attacked two foreign exchange shops in the central Iraqi city of Baquba yesterday, killing six people and stealing money before setting off a car bomb when police arrived, officials said.

The attack occurred at around 12:40 pm (0940 GMT) in the centre of the city, 60 kilometres (40 miles) north of Baghdad, a security official in the provincial security command said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

The gunmen shot dead three people in each currency exchange store before stealing an unspecified amount of money and fleeing the scene.

When police arrived at the looted shops, a car bomb exploded nearby, wounding four civilians and five policemen, including Colonel Mudhafar al-Mujama'a.

Iraqi officials have accused insurgent groups like Al-Qaeda of robbing banks, currency exchange shops and jewellery stores in a bid to fund their activities.

India as it used to be ... or perhaps as it always has been in time.

For Bangladesh, the struggle for Rabindranath, in defence of the ethos he represents, has always meant a battle against the forces of untruth and anticulture. It was the Pakistani establishment that sought to de-emphasise his place in Bangla literature in the hundredth year of his birth. And that was in 1961, when a brave band of Bangalees together in defiance of the regime. Later in that turbulent decade, when the rulers of Pakistan decided that one surefire way of keeping the faith was through clamping a ban on Tagore songs in East Bengal, resistance once more became the weapon of the Bangalees.

The years have moved on. Rabindranath stirred our political sensibilities in 1971 when Amar Sonar Bangla took pride of place in the pantheon of music adding substance to the struggle for freedom. And since then, despite every odd and every quibble placed in our way by

quarters uncomfortable with him, we have held on to him. Our minds have been without fear, our heads have been held high, our knowledge has flowed in the happiness of freedom. Rabindranath's songs have underpinned our collective societal being, encompassing as they do the purely romantic, the essentially religious, the patently political and the cheerily humanistic. His invocations to the Creator have served as potent reminders of the cultural heritage this nation is heir to; and in the songs of love have come that old message of the bonding between man and woman.

Rabindranath speaks of the land, of the fecundity of life and ideas its rivers and fields and skies have consistently put forth as metaphors of purposeful existence. There is a charming combination of the patriotic and the divine in "O amar desher maati tomar pore thekaai matha". The soul is all in the poet. Feel, in the silence of the nocturnal hours, the yearning for God in "aaji nahi nahi nidra ankhi paate", in

"amaro praane gobhro gopon moha apun shey ki". Experience too the heart-break which comes with parting in "amar praaner pore chole gelo ke boshonter batash tukur moto."

In Rabindranath we hear the myriad voices of the generations. He was a good deal more than a poet. There was the mystic in him; and in him there was the internationalist who took Bangalees to the centre of global interaction. He visited countries, lectured on issues stretching beyond the time-constrained and he conversed on poetic principles with the likes of Victoria Ocampo and WB Yeats and Romain Rolland. His fascination with science came alive in his interaction with Albert Einstein. He sought to delineate the frontiers of nationalistic politics through his conversations with Gandhi.

A hundred and fifty years after his birth, Rabindranath Tagore goes on lighting our path through the dense woods. He sang for us once. We sing in homage to him this morning.
