'Gayle left us shell-shocked'

Blown away by Chris Gayle's brutal 49-ball hundred, Kings XI Punjab skipper Adam Gilchrist said the West Indian's knock left his team "shell-shocked" during their 85-run loss to Royal Challengers Bangalore in an Indian Premier League match here.

Gilchrist described Gayle's match-winning innings of 107 Friday night as "a phenomenal knock".

"That was a phenomenal knock. The wicket was doing a bit and he did not get bat on ball for 10 balls. Then he took the game away from us. We were shell-shocked actually," Gilchrist said after KXIP lost by 85 runs.

Gayle hit a record nine sixes and 10 fours in his knock and Gilchrist said his side were thinking of chasing more than 230 when the West Indian was going great guns.

C'paul back in WI fold

Captain, coach on collision course?

Captain Shahid Afridi will meet Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) chairman Ijaz Butt on his return from the West Indies to outline the problems he is facing while working with national team's head coach Waqar Younis.

The differences between the two have spilled out into the open and reports say their working relationship on the West Indies tour at one stage got so bad that Afridi even refused to play the last two matches.

According to a newspaper Afridi had developed problems with Waqar even during the World Cup and had also been reluctant to go to the West Indies for the one-day series.

Afridi had initially asked the PCB to not consider him for the West Indies tour because of personal reasons but later changed his mind.

The flamboyant all-rounder also didn't leave with the team from Lahore and joined them a day later after departing from Karachi. The official reason given was that he had forgotten his passport at home and wanted to meet his ailing father before leaving for the West Indies.

The newspaper has reported that it was Afridi's father who convinced him to go to the

West Indies after the World Cup.

"His father told him he must not leave the team like this after such a big event and he needs to continue his good work with the team," a source said.

Sources say Afridi will meet Butt after he returns home to outline his concerns about working with Waqar.

Butt when contacted said that he had also read about the problems in the West Indies in the media.

"When Afridi returns I will talk to him to find out if this is all true," he said.

Sources say the major point of contention between Afridi and Waqar is the latter's growing authority in selection matters.

"Afridi on the West Indies wanted to give the new players ample chances in the series and insisted they were not on tour for a joyride but Waqar kept on resisting and playing the tried and tested players. Waqar's insistence on resting Asad Shafiq in the fifth match after he had scored runs in the earlier games also didn't please Afridi at all," one source said.

"Afridi wanted to try out new pacer, Sadaf Hussain. Even during the World Cup he was not happy that pace bowler Junaid Khan didn't get to play a single match in the tournament."

permissible swagger, being the best batsman in Pakistan cricket history but has all the time in the world for batsmen who are willing to iron out weaknesses.

After the 2011 World Cup, he was in the running to be a batting consultant to the Pakistan side but it was vetoed by team management because it was felt he won't be the right guy for the job. He does have a few limitations and it lies in his overeagerness, a major difficulty for great players who turn into coaches. He could be expected to do what former Tigers coach Mohsin Kamal was

infamous for: stand in the players' balcony and literally give ball-by-ball instructions to his batsmen from there.

After Pakistan had conceded a Test to India early on the fifth day during the epic 2003-04 series, Miandad brought out the team for a net session that lasted a few hours.

If his enthusiasm could be restrained and the BCB are ready to think far and wide, this addition could give the Tigers an edge.

He would be the biggest cricketer in the shed, a tag that is very much a necessity for being the head coach of these Tigers.

Manzur said that the selectors have to make sure that they watch matches at every level to hunt for future talents.

"We have to make sure that they give enough focus on the domestic and age-group cricket besides the national team and that's why we ensured specific job description and detail their duties in the terms and references," said Manzur.

Michael Hussey had stayed with Badrinath through the tough patch but his labour ended in the next over when he was offered a short ball by L Balaji and smacked it straight to Eoin Morgan at midwicket.

Albie Morkel was promoted to number five and gave himself some time to get in and the Kolkata bowlers maintained the stranglehold.

After eight balls, he had the opportunity to sink his teeth into Jaidev Unadkat, who was only brought on in the 15th over. The pace bowler seemed to misread the pitch and bowled too quick and was dispatched for back

to back fours before he pulled it back with some slower balls. Morkel was dropped in the same over, by Lee, trying to launch Unadkat over the leg-side.

While Morkel was attempting to hit big shots and even appeared to get an edge in Lee's final over but was not given out, Badrinath was sculpting his half-century. He became more comfortable after he had got in and picked the balls to hit well. Morkel had more of the strike in the last two overs and all but one of his swings failed to get to the boundary.
