

## Turkey hosts poor nations' forum

AP, Istanbul

The acute problems of the world's poorest countries form the agenda of a UN-backed conference this week in Turkey, which has sought to balance its traditional Western alliances with growing ties to Africa, the Middle East and other developing regions.

Up to 10,000 delegates are expected to attend the five-day forum, which starts today.

The goal of the meeting is to promote ways to reduce poverty and hunger in impoverished countries, in coordination with international partners. Social issues such as gender equality will also be discussed.

Turkey's role highlights its strategic position linking the European and Asian continents, as well as its expanding regional profile and robust economic growth.

briefing after the 10th meeting of the government committee on "Militancy Prevention and Resistance" at the education ministry.

Private television channels and print media will also be asked to run documentaries, short dramas and other programmes provided by the government highlighting adverse consequences of sexual harassment, drugs, and militancy, the minister added.

He said the information ministry will prepare the documentaries, short dramas and programmes. Accordingly, the next meeting of the committee will be held at the information ministry.

Education Minister Nurul Islam Nahid said they have already prepared manuals on the issues for teachers. The issues will also be incorporated in the curriculum so that students cannot go astray.

It is not a matter for the

government or a particular political party; rather it is a national issue to save the country from militancy and sexual harassment, he observed.

He added his ministry will form a committee headed by a high official to monitor the activities of educational institutions and mosques across the country.

Home Joint Secretary Kamal Uddin Ahmed told reporters the education ministry will prepare performance reports of academic institutions and mosques in this regard.

Home ministry sources say militant organisations target students, especially madrasa students in remote areas. So, guardians will also be asked to attend meetings on adverse impacts of militancy, drugs and sexual harassment. He said the meetings will be arranged by the managing committees of the institutions concerned.

He said the number of educational institutions and mosques is very large compared to other organisations and government agencies as these exist at every community across the country.

The meeting was also attended by Home Secretary Abdus Sobhan Sikdar, the education board chairman, inspector general of police and high officials of both ministries.

## THAI-CAMBODIA CONFLICT

## ASEAN summit fails to resolve skirmishes

Southeast Asian leaders failed to achieve any breakthrough yesterday to end deadly border skirmishes between Thailand and Cambodia that overshadowed a regional summit in Jakarta supposed to showcase progress toward economic integration.

The clashes around crumbling Hindu temples in disputed areas have starkly illustrated the tensions between countries in the Association of South East Asian Nations (ASEAN) that could derail plans to create a single economic community by 2015, and the apparent inability of the bloc to deal with disagreements.

Indonesia, host of the 18th ASEAN summit, has been pressing for a deal that would prevent the meeting being marred by the border dispute. But in the end all that was achieved was that the Thai and Cambodian foreign ministers would stay an extra day in Jakarta for more talks.

The two sides have spoken plenty of times in recent weeks, but without finding a resolution to clashes that have killed 18 people since April.

ASEAN has a policy of non-interference in each other's domestic affairs, and so has struggled to resolve the border dispute which is being driven by domestic political dynamics in both Thailand and Cambodia.

## Syrian regime hunts rivals in protest hub

A 12-year-old boy was among several people killed yesterday as Syrian troops hunted down opponents of President Bashar al-Assad in two restive cities, activists said, despite world anger over the bloody crackdown.

Tanks rumbled into several districts of the central industrial city of Homs and deployed along the corniche in the northwestern coastal city of Banias, two flashpoint protest hubs, activists said.

Meanwhile justice authorities charged prominent dissident and former MP Riad Seif, a 64-year-old who suffers from cancer, with violating a ban on protests, his lawyer Khalil Maatuk said.

Overnight the military cut electricity and communications before entering several Homs districts that are home to opponents of Assad's regime, after having taken up positions inside the city on Friday, an activist said.

Gunfire reverberated in Bab Baba and Sebaa Amr, two neighbourhoods in the city of one million inhabitants which has been the scene of almost daily demonstrations

since the protests erupted mid-March.

A video posted online at YouTube showed around 20 truckloads of soldiers heading into the night towards Bab Sebaa. The authenticity of the video could not be verified.

Qassem Zuheir al-Ahmad, 12, was killed by gunfire in Homs, where other people also died, said an activist who was unable to specify who shot the boy or give an overall casualty toll.

"Snipers are posted on rooftops," the activist said.

The military conducted a similar operation after cutting electricity, communications and water in the Mediterranean port city of Banias, said Rami Abdel Rahman of the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights.

According to the Observatory, more than 250 people, including a 10-year-old, were arrested during raids Saturday night and yesterday in Banias.

Al-Watan newspaper, which is close to the government, said the army was locked "in a fierce battle against groups using heavy weapons, anti-tank rockets and machine guns" in and around Banias since Friday night.

## MEXICAN MINE BLAST

## All 14 bodies recovered

Rescue crews have recovered all bodies from a coal mine in northern Mexico hit by a gas explosion earlier this week, putting the total death toll at 14.

Mexican Labor Secretary Javier Lozano says the rescue phase has ended and the government will start a rigorous investigation into mine safety in Mexico.

The last body was found early yesterday and was that of a 38-year-old miner.

Mexican officials said it was caused by a gas buildup. The national mine workers' union said the mine's work force was not unionized and criticized the unsafe conditions in which Mexico's mines are allowed to operate.

## Nine killed as storm slams into Philippines

Tropical storm Aere slammed into the eastern Philippine coast yesterday, bringing heavy rains and landslides that have so far killed nine people and forced thousands to leave their homes.

The Philippines' state weather bureau said Aere made landfall over the island of Catanduanes before noon and moved northwest over the main island of Luzon.

Nine people were killed due to landslides, drowning and fallen power lines, mostly in the eastern Bicol region and Catanduanes, the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council said in a statement.

Authorities in Bicol scrambled their rescue and relief missions but were hampered by the rough weather.

"The provincial road going to the (area) is not passable due to flooding" said Inspector Ayn Natuel, a spokesman at the Bicol regional police headquarters.

Aere, the first major storm of the year, hit Catanduanes, an island of about 250,000 people, with winds hitting 85 kilometres (53 miles) per hour at its centre.

Storm alert warnings have been hoisted over most of Luzon which is forecast to face heavy rains into Monday, the government weather station said. The disaster management council said more than 70,000 people were evacuated to safer ground as a pre-emptive measure in the eastern Bicol and in central Visayas regions.

## SC appoints 3

A six-member bench of the Appellate Division, headed by Chief Justice ABM Khairul Haque, asked the lawyers to place their opinions before it today.

The apex court passed the order during hearing yesterday on an appeal filed against the High Court verdict that declared the seventh amendment to the constitution illegal.

One Siddique Ahmed of Chittagong, who earlier challenged the seventh amendment to the constitution with the HC, has recently filed the appeal with the SC, seeking bail in a criminal case against him.

Siddique surrendered to a court in Chittagong on April 7 in connection with the murder case, as per the HC order.

On August 26 last year, the HC delivered the verdict
