

Victims being influenced to save cops

Victims of the robbery allegedly committed by police in Kaharol upazila kept from mentioning names of any servicemen in the case fearing political pressure and reprisal.

The victim family and locals said frequent visits and insistence by police and local ruling party leaders, including the MP, that police was not involved in the robbery had terrified the victims in naming any policeman. Prionath Devnath, elder brother of Rajendranath

Devnath whose house was robbed on May 3, filed a case Monday evening accusing 15 to 16 unidentified people. On the robbery day, locals caught five people who

claimed themselves as policemen of Birganj Police Statoin. Angry villagers confined nine more cops when they went to rescue their colleagues.

The confinement triggered a daylong clash between locals and police. Seven policemen ended up suspended in connection with the incident.

In the case filed on Monday, the complainant carefully ignored the involvement of police in the robbery and violence following that.
