He also said it was "unworthy" of US special forces to kill an unarmed female family member and one of Osama bin Laden's sons, identified in news reports as 22-year-old Khalid. But the exact identities of those killed remains unclear.

Bin Laden's family said it was calling on Pakistan to repatriate his three wives and several children, who are being held in military custody after surviving the dramatic US special forces raid on their Abbottabad

home eight days ago. Omar said he was assembling a "panel of eminent British and international lawyers" to help obtain answers. If the Obama administration did not respond within 30 days it would take "necessary action" including lodging cases with the international criminal court and the international court of justice, reports the Guardian.

In the statement Omar reiterated that he "always disagreed with our father regarding any violence and always sent messages to our father, that he must change his ways and that no civilians should be attacked under any circumstances".

US SENATOR TO VISIT PAKISTAN

US Senator John Kerry said he would travel to Pakistan early next week to resolve some of the puzzles linger-

AL-QAEDAWARNS OF NEW JIHAD

The leader of al-Qaeda's Yemen branch has warned that jihad will become more "intense and harmful following the slaying of bin Laden, SITE monitoring group reported yesterday.

"Do not think of the battle superficially ... What is coming is greater and worse, and what is awaiting you is more intense and harmful," AQAP leader Nasir al-Wahishi said in a statement posted on an Islamist website.

Meanwhile, a US official told CNN Tuesday that members of the Senate Armed Services Committee and the Senate Intelligence Committee, as well as those in the equivalent House committees, will be allowed to view the photographs taken of bin Laden after he was killed.

The viewings will take place at CIA headquarters in northern Virginia at a time to be decided, the official said.

Senator Dianne Feinstein, D-California, confirmed that the Senate Intelligence Committee and the Senate Armed Services Committee would be given the opportunity.
