Transport fare up overnight

Auto-rickshaw drivers, bus operators charge extra; minister hints at fare hike

A day after the government increased the price of compressed natural gas (CNG), the burden of additional fare fell on the city commuters as public buses and CNG-run three wheelers yesterday started charging them more.

The price hike-- from Tk 16.75 to Tk 25 per cubic metre-- was brought into effect Thursday midnight.

Communications Minister Syed Abul Hossain told The Daily Star yesterday that the fares of buses and three wheelers will be increased this week.

Earlier on May 5, the government increased the prices of all petroleum products by Tk 2.

Josna, a resident of Mirpur-12, yesterday said, "A CNG driver has charged me Tk 20 extra to the metre fare to go to Baridhara from Mirpur."

Tapan Chandra Das, a bus passenger, said he had to pay extra Tk 2 in a Tarabo bus from Signboard to Jatrabari. SEE PAGE 19 COL 8

Gap between urban, rural students widens

This year's record-breaking SSC results demonstrate the gap between education standards in urban and rural areas with most urban schools dominating the top of the list in every education board.

Though the authorities say the schools in rural areas are doing well in terms of pass rate, urban schools, particularly in metropolitan cities, remain the best for the last decade.

Educationists observe, most urban students fare better than the rural area students as they have tuition in addition to extensive classroom activities.

In an education system swallowed by capitalism students from solvent families achieve glorious results, they added. On the other hand, rural students from poor families struggle to obtain even pass marks as their schools cannot provide them with quality education, they added.

They placed stress on more training and monitoring to ensure good education in rural schools, otherwise the gap would be widened further.

The results of the Secondary School Certificate (SSC) and equivalent examinations, published on Thursday under the

Delay in providing grant for workers

Govt says it will take 2 more months

As returnees from war-torn Libya cry for help, the government says it needs two more months to start providing them each with Tk 55,000 grant announced in mid-April.

"We want to make the handover process foolproof. We'll give them the grant through banks. We need some more time to process all these," said Expatriates' Welfare Secretary Zafar Ahmed Khan.

The grant is meant to meet their imme-

diate needs, Expatriates' Welfare Minister Khandker Mosharraf Hossain said on April 17.

The government is borrowing \$40 million to that end from the World Bank, whose board has approved the loan, but its agreement with the government is yet to be signed, Khan told The Daily Star. Starting from early March, nearly

36,000 Bangladeshis were repatriated from Libya. Most of them failed to bring any money home, as they were not paid **SEE PAGE 19 COL 5**

Bangladesh won't be an LDC after 10yrs

Says UN official

Bangladesh and Nepal are expected to graduate from the status of least developed countries (LDCs) within the next 10 years.

Cheick Sidi Diarra, the secretary general of the Fourth UN Conference on the LDCs, said this during a press conference on the closing day of the gathering yester-

"Samoa, Tuvalu and Vanuatu, three Pacific small islands are already in line for graduation in coming three to five years," the UN official said.

"We have five or six countries that are lining up already for graduation," Diarra said, adding three oil-producing countries to the list: Equatorial Guinea, Angola and Timor-Leste.

"They are still weak in terms of human capital development," he said, although their per capital income exceeded the threshold set by the UN.

But the secretary general said they believe they would reach the level of graduation during a decade long course of the new action plan that is adopted in the conference.
