Gilly carnage sinks B'lore

An astonishing exhibition of hitting from Kings XI Punjab, particularly captain Adam Gilchrist, carried them to a whopping 111-run victory over high-flying Royal Challengers Bangalore at the Himachal Pradesh Cricket Association Stadium in Dharamsala yesterday.

Chasing the huge total of 233, the rot started early for the league leaders when their big-hitting West Indian Chris Gayle fell to Harris in the second over. Only AB de Villiers provided some substance with 34 as Bangalore folded for 121.

Earlier, Gilchrist won the toss and chose to bat, and after opener Paul Valthaty's dismissal, built a T20 record partnership of 206 with fellow Australian Shaun Marsh.

After a quiet start, Gilchrist let loose from the seventh over onwards and with Marsh, lay the Bangalore bowling to waste, hitting eight 4s and nine 6s in his 55-ball 106.

Marsh was not to be left behind, smashing 30 runs in the fifteenth over bowled by Johan van der Wath.

Winning start for SL

Sri Lanka enjoyed a successful warm-up ahead of their Test series against England with a four-wicket win over Middlesex on the third and final day of their tour opener at Uxbridge on Monday.

Several batsmen spent time in the middle, Thilan Samaraweera leading the way with 49, as Sri Lanka chased down a target of 213 with five overs to spare.

As Sri Lanka captain Tilakaratne Dilshan (123) and fellow opener Tharanga Paranavitana (103) both made first innings hundreds, the tourists decided to alter their batting line-up second time around.

Both century-makers had retired and on Monday off-spinner Jamie Dalrymple became the first bowler from county side Middlesex to take a wicket in the match when he had Lahiru Thirimanne and Samaraweera caught at slip.

Sri Lanka lost two wickets on 181 but

Farveez Maharoof (17) and Rangana Herath (11) saw the islanders to victory.

Middlesex, 26 for one overnight, were dismissed for 161 with seam bowler Chanaka Welegedara (three for 39) and spinner Ajantha Mendis (three for 28) doing the bulk of the damage.

Sri Lanka now play the England Lions, the national A side, in a four-day match starting at Derby on Thursday before facing England in the first of a three-Test series that gets underway in Cardiff on May 26.

Former Sri Lanka captain Kumar Sangakkara is now set to join the tour party after completing his stint in the domestic Twenty20 Indian Premier League by leading the Deccan Chargers to a six-wicket win over Pune Warriors on Monday.

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hold them on time and professionally, is something admitted by all, though the reasons are widely debated. According to Jamiluddin, lack of interest from sponsors i.e financial constraint is the major reason behind the crippling state of hockey.

"Most of the members including vice president and joint secretary do not come regularly and certainly I don't want to waste my time coming here only to have a cup of tea," said the hockey federation general alleging that none of the members were able to manage a sponsor for a tournament.

It must be mentioned here that most federations have fixed deposits with the banks or financial institutions, which get accumulated over time, even though they are not spent on sports development. Certainly hockey is one sport that has near one crore taka in the form of FDR which remains untouched.

The general secretary of the table tennis federation Shamsul Alam Anu had a different view as he underplayed the role of sponsors: "It is true that a federation like table tennis has been suffering from financial crisis but we know pretty well how to approach a sponsor and tie relations with them."

Judo federation's general secretary Muhammad Nurun Nabi came up with a different argument. "To be honest, most of our organisers do not have proper knowledge of sports management. Besides, the sub-standard coaching and refereeing are also hindrances towards taking sports forward," said Nabi also suggesting that BOA and NSC should arrange seminars and workshops on sports management for federations regularly. Nabi also suggested that BKSP has available resource personnel to conduct such semi-

nars for sports organisers.

"Like Japan and Italy, our local governments such as Union Parishad, Upazilla Parishad, Poursava and City Corporations should come forward to appoint community-based coaches considering the prospective disciplines of those areas," suggested former boxer Syed Mohiuddin, who has experience of working with community-based sports in Japan and Italy.

"Until government comes with full support, disciplines like athletics will not make any headway since athletes feel insecure about their future and don't want to spend their prime years in such an occupation," said Shah Alam, the general secretary of athletics federation.

Apart from these, many have also argued that the huge number of members in executive committees of different sports federations turn out to be a hindrance rather than good.

Raza says he was 'set up'

Former Pakistan off-spinner Akram Raza said on Tuesday that he had been set up after he was arrested over betting on lucrative Indian Premier League (IPL) matches.

The 46-year-old was arrested at the weekend in a police raid on a gang of book-makers reportedly illegally taking bets on IPL matches.

Raza, who played nine Tests and 49 one-dayers for Pakistan between 1989 and 1995, was released on bail on Monday but will have to appear in a Lahore court later this week.

"It was a set-up against me," Raza told AFP. "I have nothing to do with the illegal betting in IPL and visited a friend's office where police came and arrested us."

Police said they acted on a tip-off and recovered telephones, computers, televisions and a large amount of money.

"I will appear in the court and fight out my innocence and will not allow my umpiring career to suffer," said Raza, who officiates domestic matches in Pakistan.

Kumar to give Cowdrey Lecture

Former Sri Lanka captain Kumar Sangakkara will become the first active international cricketer to deliver the MCC Spirit of Cricket Cowdrey Lecture at Lord's on July 4, it was announced on Tuesday.

Top-order batsman Sangakkara, also the first Sri Lankan invited to speak in the 11-year history of the event, is due to give his address the day after he is set to play against England in a one-day international at Lord's.

The 33-year-old Sangakkara will become the youngest speaker to give the lecture, following 2009 lecturer Adam Gilchrist, and follows the likes of Geoffrey Boycott, Archbishop Desmond Tutu and Imran Khan.

MCC President Christopher Martin-Jenkins said: "Sri Lanka have been so consistently successful in world cricket that it is very appropriate that a distinguished cricketer from this beautiful country should be giving the MCC Spirit of Cricket Cowdrey Lecture."

Greig an anti-Indian

Former England captain Tony Greig has called for an end to India's "domination" of the International Cricket Council (ICC), saying it was the first thing he'd change if in charge of the governing body.

"Number one, we have got to try and get the ICC right," Greig told the BBC in an interview.

"We have a situation at the moment where the ICC is dominated by India."

"They tell Zimbabwe, Bangladesh and one or two other countries what to do and they always get the vote."

"It's very hard, but somehow we have got to change things at that level."

South Africa-born Greig added: "We are playing too much cricket. I would be getting all the countries from the world and saying hey listen, what is this nonsense of giving Indian domestic cricket an open window?"

"To give the IPL [Indian Premier League, a domestic Twenty20 competition] an open window, and reduce by two months the time available for cricketers to play around the world, in the current environment is just ridiculous."

"We have got to look very, very closely and

make sure we do not destroy the cornerstone of the game which is Test cricket," said the 64-year-old former all-rounder, who settled in Australia after his playing days were over and has since enjoyed a long career as a television cricket commentator.

"It is laughable that [Chris] Gayle and [Kieron] Pollard are playing in the IPL when the West Indies are playing Pakistan -- that is just ridiculous."

Greig, though, stressed his longstanding

affection for Indian cricket, dating back to his time as a player which included leading England to a 3-1 Test series win in India in 1976/77.

"I took to India and the subcontinent very much...I loved the place," he said while giving an interview to coincide with the publication of a new biography, 'Tony Greig: A Reappraisal of English Cricket's Most Controversial Captain,' by David Tossell.

"It was the first time I really felt as if we were entertaining people, as the people there loved the game so much -- to go to those stadiums and find them packed full," explained Greig, who made his name in England with south coast county Sussex.

"To this day [Kolkata's] Eden Gardens remains one of my top three grounds, just because of the incredible atmosphere."
