The official said they may propose the NEC meeting a higher amount than what the finance ministry proposed as more fund is required to implement the 6th five-year plan.

In health sector, a Tk 58,000-crore programme will start in the next FY which needs an increased allocation, said a planning ministry official.

The construction of the Padma Multipurpose Bridge will start in full swing next year, said the official, adding that the government wants to complete the bridge within its tenure and if there arises no problem from the development partners' end the expenditure in the sector will go up.

According to finance division, Tk 1,545 crore has been allocated for the Bridge division while for the planning ministry Tk 1,448 crore, of which a large portion will be spent in the Padma Bridge project. The allocation for the power sector may also be increased by 42 percent to Tk 7,152 crore.

The much-talked-about transit with India, Bhutan and Nepal may open next FY. The government has a big expenditure plan for introducing the transit system.

The planning ministry official said the government keeping in line with the 6th five-year plan wants to raise the GDP-investment ratio to 27 percent in the next FY. The target was 25 percent for the current FY.

A high official of the planning ministry said government investment has to increase first to increase investment. To speed up ADP implementation, the government from the beginning of its assuming to power took various steps. Some more steps will be taken in the next fiscal year.

Party sources said the process is being delayed due to Nazrul's illness. It will start after he gets well, they said adding that senior leaders of the party will help Mirza Fakhrul and Nazrul in preparing the list.

Sources close to the process said those who consistently failed to take part in the party's recent anti-government programmes such as street demonstrations are being considered as "inactive". The chairperson is annoyed with such members and they might be dropped, they said.

The national executive committee has so far met twice, the last meeting was held last month to review the political and economic situation of the country.

Committee Member Rehana Akhter Ranu, also a member of the parliament, raised the issue of "inactive" members at the meeting on April 23, and demanded they be dropped to make room for more dynamic leaders. She was cheered by a number of mid-level leaders.

Khaleda also took note of the demand and declared at the meeting that "inactive" leaders will be axed from the committee and replaced by those who are more active and dedicated to the party and its programmes.

"An indictment has been voted and filed against the defendant," prosecutor John McConnell told a packed New York court minutes after Strauss-Kahn arrived for a new bail hearing.

His defence urged Judge Michael Obus to grant Strauss-Kahn bail, with his lawyer William Taylor assuring the court that former head of the International Monetary Fund was an "honorable man" who would not skip bail.

The hearing came just hours after Strauss-Kahn resigned from the IMF vowing to battle to clear his name after being charged with sexual assault, attempted rape and unlawful imprisonment of a hotel chambermaid.

"I deny with the greatest possible firmness all of the allegations that have been made against me," said Strauss-Kahn, who before the scandal broke was considered a top contender to be the next president of France.

Strauss-Kahn's statement paid tribute to his American-born wife, top television journalist Anne Sinclair, who was in court yesterday, saying he "loved more than anything."

The veteran French politician said it was with "infinite sadness that I feel compelled today to present... my resignation."

"I want to devote all my strength, all my time, and all my energy to proving my innocence," said Strauss-Kahn.

Defence lawyers said Strauss-Kahn would put up \$1 million in bail, surrender all his travel documents and submit to 24-hour electronic monitoring. A private security team would be with him "physically" until the electronic bracelet could be fitted today.

He would also agree to be confined round-the-clock at his daughter's New York apartment.

His lawyers were also expected to tout his wife's American credentials before

right to defend itself and said that the unity deal between Fatah and the radical Islamist Hamas movement posed "profound and legitimate questions" for Israel.

He also bluntly told Palestinians that their effort to try to win recognition at the UN General Assembly in September would fail.

"Symbolic actions to isolate Israel at the United Nations in September won't create an independent state," Obama said.

But the president also made clear he expected significant concessions in any revived peace process from Israel.

"The borders of Israel and Palestine should be based on the 1967 lines with mutually agreed swaps, so that secure and recognized borders are established for both states," Obama said in the speech at the State Department.

Netanyahu has vigorously opposed to a formula that would see Israel withdraw to the borders in place before the 1967 Arab-Israeli war.

Obama also made clear he would support however another Netanyahu red line - the need for the future Palestinian state to be "non-militarised."

The swearing-in of the popular 56-year-old Trinamool Congress supremo will be held at the 208-year-old Raj Bhawan, a British era building in Kolkata in the presence of 3,200 invitees. The ceremony begins at 1:01 pm.

Mamata, who will be the eleventh chief minister of the state, will be administered the oath of office and secrecy by Governor M K Narayanan on the southwest lawn of Raj Bhawan where shamianas have been erected. She will head the first non-Left government in West Bengal since Jyoti Basu led the first Left Front government to power in 1977.

The Trinamool Congress and allies Congress and SUCI stormed to power in the state with a three-fourths majority leading to this historic shift in the state's politics.

Her arch rival and outgoing chief minister Buddhadeb Bhattacharjee will be among the impressive guest list drawn from the top names in politics, business and art and culture at the ceremony today.

"On October 9, they punched on my ears every five minutes from 12:00pm to 12:30pm, although they knew that I was fasting on that day," Islam went on saying.

US to provide

The awards, which include transportation and freight costs, will be implemented under the Food for Progress (FFP) and McGovern-Dole International Food for Education and Child Nutrition programmes, said a US Embassy press release yesterday.

In Bangladesh, FFP will provide benefits valued at \$21.8 million to 424,800 people in partnership with the Small Enterprise Assistance Funds (SEAF) and Winrock International.

Provati Dev, district fisheries officer, said they collected some 150kgs fries last year.

They are being nurtured in seven government hatcheries and several other ditches dug by the locals.

The quantity of fries collected was around 250 kgs, said Monjurul Kibria, assistant professor of zoology at Chittagong University.

Provati Dev, district fisheries officer, said they released only a small quantity of eggs on April 19.

In the 1960s and 70s, Halda fish used to meet the demand of eggs for two-thirds of the country's ponds, experts say.

Now the quantity of eggs has reduced significantly due to illegal fishing. Only 20kgs of fish fry were collected in 2004, a steep decline from the 2,500 kgs collected in 1946, they added.

"But our efforts to support global food security are not just important to the many people around the world who do not have access to nutritious and safe food; they are also critically important to the sustainable economic growth of these nations, and the economic prosperity and national security of our own country," he said.

FFP projects are chosen based on their agricultural focus, programme impact, proposal quality, commodity management, the implementing organisation's capability and experience, and programme alignment with host government and US government country strategy plans, the release added.

McGovern-Dole participants either use or sell the donated US commodities in recipient countries to help support education, child development, and food security in low-income, food deficit countries that are committed to universal education.

For example, in Bangladesh, 350,000 children in more than 1,800 schools are being fed by the WFP with help from the McGovern-Dole Programme.

Thunder, duststorms kill 56 in UP, Bihar

At least 56 people were killed in Uttar Pradesh and Bihar when severe duststorms, accompanied by rain and thunderstorms, lashed some parts of the states on Wednesday evening, according to All India Radio.

In Uttar Pradesh, at least 30 people were killed in cyclonic storm that hit several districts of eastern UP. Eight people were killed in Siddhartha Nagar, seven in Jaunpur, five each in Varanasi, Badohi and Ambikapur.

They all have been posted around the country.

A source, who had gone through the letter, yesterday told The Daily Star that the finance minister suggested that the proposed provision for making it mandatory to take government permission prior to filing corruption cases against government officials.

The finance minister also opposed the proposal for curtailing the ACC's authority in appointing its own secretary, the source added.

Asked about the finance minister's letter, Suranjit Sengupta, chief of the parliamentary body, said, "He [Muhiut] gave some suggestions about the proposed changes to the Anti-Corruption Commission laws."

Suranjit said donors, diplomats and other development partners are also concerned about the proposed changes to the ACC law. He said some diplomats talked to him personally over the issue.

The parliamentary body yesterday at the meeting, held at the Jatiya Sangsads Bhaban, also questioned the proposed provision for awarding blanket coverage to government officials.

"If any government official is personally involved in corruption or assists in committing corruption, the state cannot take his responsibility. And in that case, no prior permission should be required for filing a case against the government official for the specific crime," Suranjit Sengupta said.

With the inclusion of this provision in the ACC law, no court shall take cognisance of an offence without prior government permission to file cases against government officials and begin trial of the cases under section 197 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1898.

While talking to reporters at his office at the parliament after the meeting, Suranjit said the members of the committee questioned as to how this proposed provision would

serve the nation.

He said prior permission of the government may be needed to file cases against government officials who make decisions for implementing government policies for the country's welfare.

The main purpose of the law is to protect honest government officials, not the corrupt ones," Suranjit said.

On the day the bill was placed in parliament, eminent jurist Shahdeeb Malik told The Daily Star, "The ACC's independence will be curtailed greatly if the proposed amendments are brought."

He said the proposed provision of prior government permission to file cases against government officials is discriminatory. It also goes against the constitutional provision that says all citizens are equal before the law and are entitled to equal protection by it, Malik said.

The committee decided to examine other laws, jurisdictions and formations of reputed criminal investigation agencies like the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) in the USA and the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) in India, Suranjit said.

He said the committee will sit soon to complete scrutinising the proposed changes to the ACC law while the ACC officials strongly opposed them.

The committee also discussed the anomalies in the appointment of 190 sub-registrars in 2009. They had forged documents to prove they were members of the Mujibnagar government in exile to get the jobs.
