4 shot dead in hills

Leaders of anti-CHT treaty blame Santu Larma's organisation

At least four activists of the United People's Democratic Front (UPDF) were shot dead yesterday at Barkal upazila in Rangamati.

The UPDF, a political platform of indigenous people opposing the Chittagong Hill Tracts peace accord, alleged that rival Parbatya Chattagram Jana Sanghati Samity (PCJSS) made the attack on its activists.

Santu Larma-led PCJSS, another political entity of indigenous people that backs the CHT peace accord, has strongly denied the accusation.

Police said they recovered one body -- that of Sukkra Sen Chakma, 37 -- and sent it to Rangamati Sadar hospital for a post mortem. They are trying to recover the other three bodies.

Rangamati Police Super Masood-ul-Hasan said the incident might be a result of ongoing conflict between the two rival groups that often clash to establish supremacy in the area.

Construction site caves in

Adjacent road, tin-shed buildings tumble inside ditch; cracks develop in nearby buildings; residents evacuated; Rajuk blames it on faulty retention piling

A construction site at Nakhalpara in the city's Tejgaon Industrial Area subsided taking with it an adjacent road and three tin-shed houses after the pilings collapsed early yesterday, also causing cracks on nearby multistorey buildings.

Five construction workers were injured as they tumbled in the ditch

formed after the cave-in. Of them, Ali Hossain, Rustam, Baker and Bashir were admitted to a local clinic. All the residents from 14 neigh-

bouring buildings were evacuated immediately. Huge cracks were seen within at

least 30 feet radius of the collapse site and two five-storey buildings nearby

have slightly tilted. Locals, police and Fire Service and

Civil Defence officials rescued many people from under the debris and pile of household items including TV sets, refrigerators and furniture.

At the site, Islamic Trading Consortium Ltd (ITCL) was digging 60 feet deep into the ground to build a three-layer basement car park for the 14-storey Impulse Medical College and Hospital on 2.9-acre land.



Online GD fails to make a mark

Only 2,082 general diaries filed in one year; unawareness seen as reason

The government move to digitalise policing initially with online general diary has failed to make an impression as most people are unaware of it even a year after its launch.

Most people, who have recently visited police stations to file GDs for snatching, lost documents or other reasons, were found scratching their heads when asked why they did not go for online GDs. In most cases it turned out that they

have never heard of it.

"I visit the police station almost every month to report of stolen goods from my garage," said Ahammad Hossain at Tejgaon police station.

"But no-one at the station informed me that I could file GDs from anywhere," said the owner of a garage in Karwan Bazar.

ADP implementation

As many as 2,082 GDs were filed elec-

tronically since the online system was introduced in March last year.

On the other hand, 38 police stations in the city received 32,721 handwritten GDs in April alone -- 15 times the number of online GDs recorded so far.

Police say the online general diary system, launched as an e-governance initiative, was intended to make it easier for citizens to file GDs. It meant no longer going to the police station to file a GD for "non-emergency" matters.

Instead, the system has remained merely as a window dressing, according to citizens and experts, who say the police have put little effort to make it attractive and useful.

"It seems the service exists only in name," said Mustafa Jabbar, president of Bangladesh Computer Samity, a national coalition of IT-based organisations. "It is

Bus operators stay beyond control

Errant bus operators remained out of control yet on the third day since the government had fixed new fare rates while the suffering of passengers doubled with CNG-run auto drivers charging extra.

After a holiday on Friday, the government yesterday conducted drives at some points in the capital and seized nine buses, filed cases against 17 operators and fined Tk 6,700 for over-charging passengers.

However, the government so far initiated no drive to monitor CNG-run autorickshaw fares which gave the drivers the scope for charging passengers whatever they wish.

Meanwhile, during the drive hours from 11:30am to 3:00pm, passengers' suffering just got into nerves as operators cleverly kept their buses off-road on routes where the drives were on.
