





Dasgupta played a leading role in setting up among budding directors, actors and

filmgoers. Although he donned many roles -- of a lecturer, adman and writer, it was as a film critic that Chidananda Dasgupta is best known, as he was one of those who made a niche as a serious commentator on cinema. He wrote over 2,000 articles on cinema in several periodicals and magazines and in 1980 authored "The Cinema of Satyajit Ray", regarded as one of the most authentic research works on the master director. Among his other books are "Talking about Films" and "Unpopular Cinema". The hallmark of his analysis of

Steel" (1969); "The Dance of Shiva" (1968); "Portrait of a City" (1961); "Amodini" (1994), which featured his daughter Aparna Sen and granddaughter Konkona; "Zaroorat Ki Purti" (1979); "Rakhto" (1973) and "Bilet Pherat" (1972). He was given the lifetime achievement

award at the Osian Film Festival in Delhi 2004. Dasgupta's writings in English and Bengali were confined to not just cinema but extended to literature. 
