## 'Stop forced disappearance'

Odhikar, a human rights body, yesterday expressed concern over "forced disappearance" in the country.

The NGO also urged the government to ratify the international convention for the protection of all persons from forced disappearance.

Sixteen people fell victim to forced disappearance in 2010 and three in 2011, said Farhad Mazhar, an advisor of Odhikar, quoting reports of different dailies.

He said this at a workshop organised Odhikar with the help of the Embassy of Switzerland at Brac Centre Inn in the city.

## Boro farmers incurring loss: KN

Karmojibi Nari (KN), a rights body for women, yesterday said farmers are already incurring losses by selling boro rice at prices lower than the production cost, as the government delays in procurement.

The organisation cited an estimation of the agriculture ministry as saying that production cost of per kilogram paddy this boro season stands at Tk 15 while farmers are selling paddy at Tk 500-600 per maund (Tk 13-15 per kg) in many north and northwest districts.

KN chairperson Shirin Akhter and general secretary Sharmin Kabir in a joint statement also demanded the government immediately starts purchasing paddy from farmers.

## 25pc adults suffer from hypertension

## Civil society favours caretaker system

The next general elections should be held under the caretaker government system considering the existing political culture in the country, said civil society representatives yesterday.

Because of political conflict, the oppositions have very little confidence in a political government. So, anarchy will be created if the next national elections are held under the political government, said the speakers at a roundtable meeting.

Sushasaner Jonno Nagorik (Sujan), a civil society platform working for good governance, organised the roundtable styled "Debate on caretaker government and relevant thoughts" at the Jatiya Press Club.

Sujan President Prof Muzaffer Ahmad said the caretaker government

system was introduced because of non-democratic attitude of political leaders.

Due to political distrust, biased administration and "toothless" election commission, it is better to hold the general elections under a caretaker government, he added.

Presenting a keynote paper, Sujan Secretary Badiul Alam Mazumder said besides a neutral election commission, neutral administration and law enforcement agencies are essential for holding a fair and acceptable national election.

Prof Moniruzzaman Mia, a former vice-chancellor of Dhaka University, said he fears that any attempt to hold the next general polls under the political government can cause violence.

He said parliament has to enact a law to hold the national polls under the

caretaker government system as it has been cancelled in a Supreme Court verdict.

A caretaker government may be formed comprising nominees of political parties' alliances, justices, newspaper editors and vice-chancellors of public universities, said Moniruzzaman.


Awami League leader Suvash Singh Roy said the political parties need to be more democratic to hold a free and fair national election.

Barrister Rafiqul Haque suggested formation of the caretaker government with some lawmakers from the two big political alliances.

ASM Shahjahan, Justice Kazi Ebadul Haque, Prof Emaz Uddin Ahmed, Enam Ahmed Chowdhury, Syed Abul Maqsood, Prof Ajoy Roy and Asif Nazrul also spoke.

## SUBSIDENCE IN NAKHALPARA

## Firm, hospital blamed

The construction firm and authorities of proposed 14-storey Impulse Medical College and Hospital in the city's Nakhalpara are equally responsible for the collapse of the soil retention walls, said chairman of Rajdhani Unnayan Kartipakhy (Rajuk) yesterday.

The 46-foot deep pit's wall was not adequately strengthened resulting in the collapse, said Rajuk Chairman Md Nurul Huda.

He was talking to journalists at a press conference held by army engineering team at the site yesterday.

Islamic Trading Consortium Ltd was doing the piling to build a three-layer basement car park for the hospital on a 2.9-acre construction site in Tejgaon Industrial Area.

But the pit's retaining wall crumbled resulting in the cave-in and collapse of three corrugated iron sheet houses in the early hours of May 21.

Part of a road subsided and cracks appeared on the adjoining structures including two five-storied residential buildings.

Residents of the two buildings can now return, as the buildings are now stable while the road was repaired, he said.

Speaking there, Colonel Abu Syeed said they handed the site over to Rajuk after the six-day earth-filling work was completed yesterday.

But the hospital authorities would not be allowed to resume construction without compliance with Buet experts and approval of Rajuk, said Huda.

## Khaleda talks on HR issue with US congressmen

US Congressmen expressed deep concern over the human rights situation in Bangladesh as well as that of the judiciary when they met visiting BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia at the Capitol Hill in Washington on Wednesday.

Khaleda Zia had a joint meeting with four US Congressmen—Joseph Crowley, Sheila Jackson, Hansen Clarke and Brad Sherman.

Different issues including democracy and rule of law in Bangladesh were discussed in the meeting that lasted for one and half hours.

BNP Vice-chairman Shamser Mobin Chowdhury, who was present in the meeting, told UNB over phone that the Congressmen said if democracy and rule of law are threatened in Bangladesh, the US Congress will take a serious note of this as it might make uncertain Bangladesh's access to the US Millennium Challenge Account.

The US Congressmen told Khaleda that they are monitoring the evolving situation in Bangladesh and would brief the US administration.

They recalled good relation of the Congress and the US administration with the past government of Khaleda Zia and hoped the relation would be strengthened.

Khaleda, also leader of the opposition in parliament, invited the Congressmen to visit Bangladesh.

A representative of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee was present during the meeting.

Meanwhile, US Secretary of State Hillary Clinton and Senator John Kerry have expressed regret as they could not meet Khaleda.

## Sabbir tried to kill Hasina

Acting chief of Harkatul Jihad (Huji) Abdul Hannan Sabbir and his accomplices attempted to kill Awami League President Sheikh Hasina and her party leaders before the 21 August grenade attacks in 2004.

CID SP Abdul Kader Akond, also the case investigation officer (IO), said this after producing Sabbir before the court of Metropolitan Magistrate Shahriar Mahmud Adnan with a seven-day fresh remand prayer.

When Special Public Prosecutor Abul Kalam Azad made submissions supporting the remand prayer, no lawyer stood to defend Sabbir. The magistrate then granted four days.

## Workshop on autistic children held
