The nine-wicket victory paved the way for the Motijheel giants to a second triumph in this competition after they had won the inaugural edition in 2009. Also, Sheikh Jamal Dhanmondi Club finished runners-up on their maiden appearance.

"I am very pleased to have won this trophy. It makes me really proud," said Mohammedan skipper Salma Khatun.

After Abahani decided to bat first at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur, the Mohammedan bowlers, especially Rumana Ahmed, used discipline as the Dhanmondi side were restricted to 94 for 8 in 40 overs with only Jahanara Alam, batting in the lower-order, scoring 20 runs from 41 balls.

Rumana took three wickets for 22 runs from six overs while Salma picked up two for 21. Tahin Tahera and Shaila Sharmin took a wicket apiece.

Rumana took the wickets of Tulika Biswas, Shahnaz Parveen and Sharmin Akhtar, making sure Abahani lost their middle-order cheaply.

Mohammedan were asked to score 83 runs from 32 overs after a spell of rain interrupted play. They managed the target quite easily, reaching 84 for one in 25.2 overs with Shaila Sharmin hammering six boundaries in her unbeaten 80-ball 39.

# June meeting pivotal in coach appointment

AHM Mustafa Kamal has said that next month's meeting will shape Bangladesh Cricket Board's decision towards hiring a new Tigers head coach.

The board of directors meet on June 3 in a regular meeting of the cricket board and, according to the BCB president, the handful of names will be mulled over.

"Around 7-8 coaches have applied so far. Hopefully we will be able to come to a decision soon regarding the coach. On June 3 when we will have our next board meeting, we will discuss the issue," said Kamal yesterday at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur.

"There is no need for short listing the options that we have as they are too small in number. So if we find any one who will fulfil the needs we directly pick them from the options that we have. So there is no need of a shortlist.

"What we want is a coach who will give his hundred per cent to our team without any circumstance of them going for any other duty," he said.

Kamal also explained why the BCB will drop one of its choices of countries when it comes to picking a coach. "Probably it won't be an Australian. It will be a South African or an Englishman because the Australians are not willing to come for the long term," he said.

According to sources, the BCB will also conduct their own searches apart from those who applied.

Former South African batsman Peter Kirsten is among the South Africans to have applied for the coach's job while it was previously reported that the BCB are in talks with Graham Ford, another South African.

Apart from finding a totally committed coach, it was learned that money has been a prime talking point in hiring a coach. Kamal, though, maintained that the financial package on offer will still attract takers.

"I don't think money will be a big problem if the coach matches our requirements. He will have to be a coach of international standard, who

will stay with us and not want to go to the IPL or the Australian Twenty-20.

"Nowadays every coach wants to be free during the IPL [Indian Premier League] as he thinks if he is not in the IPL, his potential is under-utilised.

"But we want to have a full time coach," said Kamal, who said that the cash-rich IPL is a major hindrance for Bangladesh to attract coaches.

"For IPL it is difficult to run cricket altogether. We cannot pay the way the IPL does. One of the reasons why we are not getting a coach of our liking is the IPL, as the money there is enormous," he explained.

Kamal's assertion comes as the BCB's self-declared deadline of landing a coach (June 15) is only a fortnight away with the national camp all set to begin on June 4 under trainer Grant Luden.

The board had given CEO Manzur Ahmed the corresponding authority but he will only return to office on June 7.

Kamal also confirmed that the hiring of the bowling and fielding coaches will be completed after the BCB finds a SEE PAGE 17 COL 3 SPORTS REPORTER

A stoppage-time goal from Abbas Inusah Grameenphone helped Sheikh Russel KC close the gap with the table-toppers after beating hosts Feni Soccer Club 2-1 in the Grameenphone Bangladesh League at the Shaheed Salam Stadium in Feni yesterday.

Nche Francis put Feni Soccer ahead in the first half before Mohammad Yusuf levelled the margin five minutes into the second half while Abbas ensured Sheikh Russel's 11th victory in the second-half stoppage time of the game where the spectators threw 'water bottles' on the field and later they ran after visiting team as well as the referees, who allegedly handled the match poorly.

Sheikh Russel are just a point behind leaders Muktijoddha Sangsad on 38 points, equal with second-placed Sheikh Jamal Dhanmondi Club. However, Sheikh Russel have played 18 matches, one more than the other two. At the other hand, Feni remain at the eighth position with 14 points from 18 matches.

Feni Soccer, who had earlier played out a goalless draw against Sheikh Jamal at home, were also unlucky not to secure full three points as two of their efforts were denied by woodwork either half of the break. Francis saw his low-ranger come off the bar in the first half while Towhidul's powerful shot rattled the crosspiece in the second half.

"Usually I don't like complaining about

# Humble Pep shrugs off 'greatest' tag

Barcelona may have entered the pantheon of European football's greatest teams, but coach Pep Guardiola is keeping his feet on the floor following

Barcelona lit up Wembley with one of the great performances here Saturday, mesmerising United with a bewitching display that left the English champions grasping at shadows en route to a 3-1 defeat.

It was the Spanish side's second Champions League triumph in three years and confirmed the view of many pundits that Guardiola's men are the greatest club side football has ever seen.

Guardiola, who has amassed 10 major trophies in his three years as coach of the club he graced as a player for 17 years, resisted the invitation to compare his team with legendary side of the past.

"I don't know," said Guardiola when asked for his opinion on where his stood in the annals of history. "I didn't see the Ajax of

(Johan) Cruyff, I didn't see the Real Madrid of (Alfredo) Di Stefano and I didn't see the Santos of Pele.

"But if in 10 or 15 years time people remember us for the football that we are playing now, that will make me very happy."

Former Barcelona striker Gary Lineker wrote in his News of the World newspaper column on Sunday that Guardiola's men could eventually claim the right to be called football's best ever team.

"Other teams have played wonderful football but when you add fitness and mental strength, you have a side that are well on the way to becoming the greatest club side of all time," Lineker said. "To achieve that status, Pep Guardiola's

team will have to win the Champions League two or three more times. "However pretty your football, your leg-

acy is ultimately judged on silverware. The early Real Madrid teams and Arrigo Sacchi's AC Milan lifted the trophy as well as raising the bar in terms of what football could be.

"You would not bet against this Barcelona team doing it."
